Town of South Bruce Peninsula: Upgrading of the Amabel-Sauble Well System

The Town of South Bruce Peninsula is proposing to upgrade the Amabel-Sauble Well System, located in Sauble Beach. The purpose of the project is to address the need for additional supply capacity within the community for a 20-year planning period and bring the water supply system into compliance with the Ontario *Drinking Water Systems Regulation*. The project is proposed under the Canada-Ontario Infrastructure Program.

The project is subject to a comprehensive study under the *Canadian Environmental Assessment Act.* Pursuant to subsection 21(1) of the Act, Industry Canada and Infrastructure Canada, as the federal responsible authorities for the project assessment, now invite the public to comment on the proposed scope of the project. The public is also invited to comment on the factors to be considered, proposed scope of those factors, and the ability of the comprehensive study to address issues relating to the project.

Comments received by Industry Canada no later than February 10, 2006, will be considered. Interested persons may submit their remarks in the official language of their choice to:

Availability of Participant Funding

The Government of Canada, through the Canadian Environmental Assessment Agency, has established a \$10,000 participant funding program to assist groups and/or individuals to take part in the environmental assessment of the proposed upgrading of the Amabel-Sauble Well System.

A Participant Funding Review Committee will be established to review funding applications and recommend to the President of the Agency the distribution of available funds to the successful applicants.

To receive funding, successful applicants must participate in the development of the comprehensive study and/or in the review of the completed comprehensive study report. They must also sign a contribution agreement with the Agency. Funding applications received by the Agency at the address indicated below no later than February 10, 2006, will be considered.

Should the Minister of the Environment determine, at the conclusion of the review of the scoping document and upon the recommendation of the responsible authority, that the proposed project be assessed instead under an independent environmental assessment review panel, the comprehensive study participant funding will be withdrawn. A new fund will be established for the public to participate in the review panel process and the public will be invited to re-apply.
