



Notice of Public Hearing

The Canadian Nuclear Safety Commission (CNSC) will hold a one-day public hearing on the Environmental Assessment Guidelines (EA Guidelines) for the proposed production increase at Cameco Corporation's Key Lake and McArthur River facilities, located in northern Saskatchewan.

One-Day Hearing: September 15, 2004

Place: CNSC Public Hearing Room, 14th Floor, 280 Slater Street, Ottawa, Ontario

Public hearings begin at 8:30 AM and follow the agenda published prior to the hearing date.

Cameco Corporation has applied to the CNSC for the authorization to increase production at its Key Lake and McArthur River facilities. Under the *Canadian Environmental Assessment Act*, the CNSC must complete an environmental assessment of the project before deciding whether to proceed with a licensing decision on Cameco Corporation's application. Based on the results of the environmental assessment, the CNSC must determine if the project is likely to cause significant adverse environmental effects, taking into account the application of appropriate mitigation measures.

The draft EA Guidelines (scoping document) will be made available to the public on July 16, 2004. The public is invited to comment on the EA Guidelines either by oral presentation or written submission. Requests to participate and text of oral presentations or written submissions must be filed with the Secretary of the Commission by August 16, 2004. Please send interventions to:
