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Preface

This publication was first published in 1987. It was then presenting an analysis of 1985 data. Originally, the intent was to present an overview of the co-operative system in Canada to a wide and diverse public. However, since 1995, this publication was transformed to replace another one entitled <u>Co-operation in Canada</u>, which had been our main publication for more than 60 years.

Data on co-operatives are presented by group. Non-financial co-operatives are divided by membership: producers, consumers and workers. Credit unions and *caisses populaires* are looked at separately even if their membership is made up of consumers.

Methodology:

The statistics used in this publication are based on:

- reporting by non financial co-operatives to the Canadian Annual Survey on Co-operatives and
- similar information collected by provincial governments.

Because it is not possible to collect information on 100 percent of the non-financial co-operatives, estimates are used in the case of non-reporting co-operatives deemed to be active. However estimates were made only in the case of co-operatives for which data was collected within the past five years.

CO-OPERATIVES IN CANADA

SITUATION - 1998

The 1998 statistics are based on data received from 5,853 non-financial co-operatives representing over 5 million members, a combined business volume of \$29 billion and \$16.6 billion in assets. These co-operatives also employed nearly 80,000 people of which 75 per cent were full-time employees. Of these 5,853 co-operatives 974 are agricultural, representing 641,363 producers with a combined business volume of of \$19.8 billion and assets of \$6.7 billion. This includes data provided by wholesale co-operatives and federations.

Compared with 1997, the number of co-operatives reporting to the 1998 survey increased by 4.3 per cent. Total membership was also up by 6 per cent. Volume of business and assets grew by 0.9 per cent and 5.5 per cent, respectively. For 1998, co-operatives personnel was up 9.1 per cent over 1997. The number of agricultural co-operatives reporting to the survey, was up 5.1 per cent and membership increased by 2.0 per cent. Volume of business and assets of agricultural co-ops were also up by 0.5 per cent and 8 per cent, respectively.

PRODUCER CO-OPERATIVES

Co-operatives play a crucial role in the agricultural sector of the Canadian economy, especially in farm supply and in the processing and marketing of grains and oilseeds, milk and dairy products, poultry, honey, maple products, fruits, vegetables and livestock.

Agricultural marketing and processing co-operatives are, for the most part, modern enterprises that use the latest technology. Some are even leaders in their industry. Such as, AGROPUR and Agrifoods International Cooperative in dairy and Saskatchewan Wheat Pool and Agricore in grains. Altogether, agricultural processing and marketing co-operatives are a major economic force with a combined business volume of more than \$16.3 billion and assets of \$5.2 billion. In 1998, they marketed nearly \$13.0 billion in agricultural products in Canada and abroad, (See Table 4).

The market share of agricultural marketing co-operatives varies from over 64 per cent for dairy products to 4 per cent for egg production, (See Appendix F).

In **farm supply**, co-operatives play an indispensable role in the sale of fertilizers and

chemicals, animal feed and farm machinery, and provide members and producers with seed and other inputs, including building materials and petroleum products. In 1998, supply co-ops had a combined volume of business of \$3.1 billion, virtually unchanged from 1997.

During that same year, the top 10 agricultural co-operatives reported combined revenues of \$14.7 billion and assets of \$4.7 billion, an increase of 8 per cent over 1997. Membership rose 13 per cent and they employed over 22,000 persons, a 5 per cent rise over 1997, (See Appendix I).

In 1998, fifty-one **fishery** co-operatives responded to the survey, one more than in 1997. These reported \$137.8 million in revenues for 1998, a 16.4 per cent increase from 1997. Assets also rose 21.4 per cent to \$63.5 million, while total liabilities almost doubled to \$40.1 million for 1998, (See Tables 10 and 11).

Production co-operatives include feeder, grazing, agricultural machinery, artificial insemination, forestry and handicraft co-operatives. The 582 production co-operatives responding to the survey reported a combined volume of business of \$924.8 million, an increase of \$49 million over 1997. Co-operatives in Quebec and Alberta accounted for nearly 80 per

cent of the total volume of business of this group. In Quebec, revenues were primarily derived from the sale of forest products, while in Alberta the sale of livestock (cattle and hogs) was the primary activity. Saskatchewan has the largest number of production co-operatives, with 213 organizations reporting. Management of grazing operations and farm feeder operations were the two main activities of production co-operatives, with 157 and 140 enterprises respectively, accounting for 51 per cent of all production co-operatives, (See Tables 12 and 13 and Appendix B).

CONSUMER CO-OPERATIVES

At the local level, **consumer** co-operatives vary in size and sophistication, from small buying clubs, to large supermarket organizations and wholesalers. At these "conventional stores", sales are made in the usual manner and any "surplus" is returned at year's end based on patronage. In 1998, sales from this group amounted to over \$7.1 billion, with food products accounting for more than 51 per cent of overall sales. Petroleum products, dry goods and home hardware were the other main types of products sold, (See Table 6).

The 334 member co-operatives of Federated Co-operatives Limited had total sales of over \$2.7 billion during 1998, giving them the strongest presence in any region in Canada. Calgary Co-op Association Ltd. is considered the largest consumer co-operative in North America, with nearly 40 per cent of the local retail market. Sales include food products, hardware, clothing, furnishings, petroleum products and building materials, as well as travel services and pharmaceuticals. Mountain Equipment Co-op (MEC), headquartered in Vancouver, British Columbia, specializes in the sale of gear and clothing for outdoor activities. It provides a catalogue sales service and operates three stores outside British Columbia, in Toronto, Ottawa and Calgary. In 1998, MEC listed nearly 1.2 million members across Canada and reported revenues of \$130.4 million.

In Atlantic Canada, the 172 member co-operatives of Co-op Atlantic showed sales of over \$1.1 billion in 1998, virtually unchanged from a year earlier.

Although not as large or influential, Quebec and Ontario consumer co-operatives are strong organizations, however, they have little penetration in large urban areas.

A number of consumer co-operatives operate as "direct charge" co-operatives. In 1998, 52 reported to the survey, most of them located in Quebec, New Brunswick and Nova Scotia. They reported revenues of \$373 million with 81,344 members. The concept of the "direct charge" system is that goods are provided to members at cost and a weekly service fee is charged to cover operating costs. Some add a surcharge to build capital for the development of the co-operative.

A more specialized consumer co-operative which emerged in the late 1970s, especially in urban areas, is the **natural health foods (bulk)** co-operative. In addition to retail sales, some of these co-operatives sell goods wholesale to other co-operatives. The majority of these co-operatives are located in Quebec with a few in Ontario and British Columbia, (See Appendix A).

Student supply co-operatives have gained a strong foothold, especially in Quebec, where over 100 are active. These co-operatives reported a volume of business of nearly \$163 million in 1998 with over a million members, mostly students. They provide the various goods students may require, from pens to textbooks. Several operate cafeterias and offer driver education courses. Sales of computer equipment (hardware and software) accounted for approximately three-quarters of the volume of business of these co-operatives. Cybernétique Technologie, a subsidiary of the Fédération des coopératives québécoises en milieu scolaire, which was sold in 1999, now ranks first among computer assemblers in Quebec, thanks to its "Supra" brand of compatible computers, (See Appendix A).

Service co-operatives make up the largest number of co-operatives in Canada. In 1998, there were 4,201 service co-operatives responding to the survey, accounting for 72 per cent of all non-financial co-operatives. They reported a combined volume of business of \$1.4 billion, virtually flat from 1997.

The largest single area of co-operative activity in

the service sector is **housing** co-operatives, since the mid-1970s, these have experienced a significant expansion. In 1998, the 2,118 housing co-operatives who reported had combined assets of nearly \$5.7 billion with over 115,000 members. There are other types of co-operatives involved in housing activities. In 1998, 62 of these other co-operatives reported to the survey. Most of them are co-operative housing resource groups involved with development of emerging housing co-operatives. Equity housing co-operatives are involved with the management of common assets, (See Appendix E).

There are two major types of **child care** co-operatives: daycare and nursery school co-operatives. Daycare co-operatives are formed by parents to provide daytime care for their children while the parents are at work. Nursery schools are formed with an emphasis on education and social interaction, and also provide parents with time for other pursuits. Child care co-operatives are found in greatest numbers in Ontario, Saskatchewan and Manitoba. In 1998, there were 431 daycare and nursery school co-operatives reporting revenues of nearly \$51.5 million with 28,818 members. Nearly 74 per cent of revenues was used to pay salaries and wages.

Health care co-operatives play an important role in a number of communities across Canada. A report entitled *Co-op/Consumer Sponsored Health Care Delivery Effectiveness* found that this type of health care delivery offers significant economic and other advantages. Health care co-operatives maintain the quality of our health care system while still ensuring fiscal responsibility.

In 1998, th survey found 44 health care co-operatives these comprised nearly 26,000 members, and reported \$28.3 million in assets and revenues of \$51.8 million.

Community development co-operatives foster local leadership skills and grassroots participation in innovation and solving socio-economic problems. Community development co-operatives are found throughout Canada, but most are in Saskatchewan. In 1998, the 232 development co-operatives reporting had 14,333 members, assets of \$17.6 million and revenues of \$12

million.

Funeral or burial co-operatives are located mostly in Quebec, although they have made some in-roads in the Maritimes. In 1998, 56 funeral co-operatives reported assets of \$76.6 million, nearly a 50 per cent increase from 1997. Their more than 149,000 members represents an increase of ten per cent over 1997.

According to the 1998 survey, there are 180 water supplying co-operatives, found mainly in Alberta, Quebec and Manitoba.

Natural gas and rural electric co-operatives are found almost exclusively in Alberta. There were 209 such co-operatives reporting to the 1998 survey with nearly 119,000 members, assets of \$490.1 million and revenues of \$139.4 million.

Although **recreational** co-operatives are found in most provinces, they are most prevalent in the West, particularly in Saskatchewan. In 1998, the 292 recreational co-operatives reporting were engaged in various activities, including the management of community centres, skating and curling rinks, golf courses, campgrounds and swimming pools.

Transportation and communication co-operatives, although small in number, are found throughout Canada. (For other service co-operatives, see Appendix C).

WORKERS' CO-OPERATIVES

During the 1980s, workers' co-operatives became more and more common and well established in Canada, especially in Quebec. In 1998 there were 273 workers' co-operatives reporting with a total of 15,905 members. They had combined revenues of \$577.3 million and assets of \$329.1 million. They employed 8,664 persons, with more than 91 per cent working full-time. These co-operatives operate in a wide variety of fields, as the following examples show.

Founded in 1960, the *Coopérative Laterrière* is the largest forestry co-operative in Quebec and also the largest workers' co-operative in Canada. With a volume of business of \$76.7 million in 1998, this

co-operative was the first worker co-operative to be listed in the Top 50 co-operatives in Canada. Among other things, it operates a sawmill and tree nursery and exports part of its production, primarily to England. It is owned by its 981 members and employs a total of 400 full-time workers.

In 1998, **forestry co-operatives** accounted for 73 per cent of the overall volume of business of workers' co-operatives in Canada, a total of \$420.9 million, (See Appendix D).

The Coop des inséminateurs du Québec, with a volume of business of over \$22 million in 1998, generates the most revenues among non-forestry workers' co-operatives in Canada.

In recent years, a new type of workers' co-operative has been developed in Quebec. This is known as **worker/shareholder co-operative**, these co-operatives are usually created when a business is seeking new capital and asks the employees to invest. The employees can then form a co-operative and buy shares in the business. There are now 96 active in Quebec.

This is an example of people employing themselves in a productive manner. The increasing interest in workers' co-operatives reflects the tremendous shortage of jobs and the determination of better educated and informed people in having more control over their jobs and, consequently, their lives and communities.

Another type of co-operative gaining in popularity in Quebec is, the **multi-stakeholder** or **solidarity co-operative**. Membership is made up of different categories of partners: service users, employees and community organizations. Almost non-existent a few years ago, there were more than 85 multi-stakeholder co-operatives incorporated by 1998. They are mainly providing home care services to seniors and people with minor health problems.

CREDIT UNIONS AND CAISSES POPULAIRES

Credit unions and caisses populaires can be found in all provinces across Canada. In 1998, they reported assets of \$110.6 billion, a rise of 3 per cent over 1997. Quebec accounts for 50 per cent of this figure. For more details about caisses populaires and credit unions statistics, see appendices G and H.
