Meeting Brief No:3 February 6th-7th, 2001 Ottawa

Background

First Nations and Inuit have identified the need to place INJURY on Canada's health agenda as a major health priority, in line with mental health, diabetes and HIV. Although there is growing momentum in injury prevention within Canada, it remains largely uncoordinated and unsupported. As a beginning, this group has come together to provide a 'national voice' for direction, specifically dedicated to:

- the development and promotion of a national framework for injury prevention and control, which is culturally relevant to First Nations and Inuit populations; and
- 2) ongoing work on injury prevention.

The group receives Secretariat support from the First Nations and Inuit Health Branch of Health Canada. National and regional (injury prevention related) information updates will form a standard agenda item for all meetings. Significant highlights, issues and or upcoming events will be reported in **Meeting Briefs.**

February Meeting Outcomes

National First Nations and Inuit Injury Prevention Working Group goals for the upcoming fiscal year were drafted.

National work plan recommendations were developed, for the 2001/2002 fiscal year, and were forwarded to the First Nations and Inuit Health Branch.

National information highlights:

A proposal, drafted by the NFNIIPWG, to the *Change Management Committee of the First Nations and Inuit Health Information System* to incorporate 'injury surveillance' as a component of the system, has been accepted.

Input into a *Comprehensive Mental Health Framework*, through regional information feedback sessions, is currently being completed.

An environmental scan regarding the problem of injuries has been initiated among Inuit regions. *Inuit Tapirisat of Canada* anticipates completion by March 31st, 2001.

An *Injury Knowledge Management Project*, involving the development of a web site to bring together scattered First Nations and Inuit injury prevention resource information, has started placing information on the site. See <u>http://www.hc-sc.gc.ca/fnihb/chpd/ipc/</u>

A discussion paper has been prepared by the Assembly of First Nations Social Development Secretariat entitled 'To the People Who are Able: A Perspective on First Nation Children and Disability.' The work identifies the need to examine injury and its relationship to injury.

Regional information highlights:

The Québec version of the First Nations and Inuit Regional Health Survey will include an injury component for the first time. The survey is to take place in 2001.

Our Vision: to unite in creating injury free and safe communities for today and tomorrow *Our Mission:* to develop and guide a coordinated injury prevention journey The Federation of Saskatchewan Indians is trying to integrate injury prevention into educational curriculums. A resolution is needed to move this forward.

An RCMP Youth Suicide Prevention Program has been initiated, with support of a one-year training program by the Suicide Information and Education Centre (SIEC) out of Calgary.
