Meeting Brief NO: 5 October 11th-12th, 2001 Ottawa

Background

First Nations and Inuit have identified the need to place INJURY on Canada's health agenda as a major health priority, in line with mental health, diabetes and HIV. Although there is growing momentum in injury prevention within Canada, it remains largely uncoordinated and unsupported. As a beginning, this group has come together to provide a 'national voice' for direction, specifically dedicated to: *1*) *the development and promotion of a national framework for injury prevention and control, which is culturally relevant to First Nations and Inuit populations; and 2) ongoing work on injury prevention.*

We are working to:

- Make the problem of injuries more VISIBLE.
- Promote the problem of injuries as a PRIORITY AMONG LEADERSHIP (First Nations, Inuit and Government).
- SHARE INFORMATION AND ENCOURAGE INPUT on the National First Nations and Inuit Injury Prevention Framework.
- Provide GOOD INFORMATION on injury prevention initiatives and resources.
- SUPPORT TRAIN THE TRAINER approaches in injury prevention.

The group receives Secretariat support from the First Nations and Inuit Health Branch of Health Canada. National and regional (injury prevention related) information updates will form a standard agenda item for all meetings. Significant highlights, issues and or upcoming events will be reported in **Meeting Briefs**.

October 2001 Meeting Outcomes National First Nations and Inuit Injury Prevention Working Group

- *Working group membership was reviewed.* Final recommendations are pending regarding a co-chair structure.
- A communication-planning document was reviewed, with a key recommendation forwarded to the First Nations and Inuit Health Branch to include communication planning as a budgeted item for 2002/2003.
- National level activities required to forward action on injury were drafted for discussion by the working group. Further planning will be conducted in February 2002. Selected activities for 2002/2003 will be prioritized and submitted for work plan consideration and budgeting.

National information highlights:

Most regional proposals, for new 'one-time regional First Nations and Inuit injury prevention funding' available for 2001/2002 fiscal year have been received by Health Canada. Proposals have been submitted by Atlantic, Ontario, Manitoba, Saskatchewan, Alberta and British Columbia regions.

During the summer months, the National First Nations and Inuit Injury Prevention Working Group (NFNIIPWG), Assembly of First Nations, and Inuit Tapirisat of Canada, have continued to promote Aboriginal participation at the 6^{h} World Conference on Injury Prevention and Control. A number of abstract submissions and a round table proposal have been forwarded to the conference's scientific planning committee for consideration.

Regional information highlights:

In British Columbia, members of the Chiefs Health Committee, Health Canada and external partners met to begin laying the groundwork for a regional First Nations injury prevention strategy.

In the *province of Alberta*, injury prevention consultations held with First Nations communities have been completed. A report is pending and will be shared at the next working group meeting in February 2002.

Regional information highlights (continued):

Health Canada, Saskatchewan Health and the Saskatchewan Aboriginal Injury Prevention Program (SAIPP) recently joined efforts to complete a report called 'Injuries Among Saskatchewan First Nations: An Analysis of 1997/98 Hospital and 1998/99 Physician Data'. This document is the first of its kind in Canada to use and report on First Nations injury morbidity data. Further injury data analysis will be conducted to examine the problem of accidental poisoning among First Nations toddlers.

In Manitoba, a new injury prevention coordinator will be hired to work with First Nations communities. The coordinator will be housed at Injuries Manitoba-Prevention of Adolescent & Childhood Trauma.

In Ontario, training in injury prevention will be provided to workers from First Nations communities.

In the Atlantic provinces, individual communities are raising awareness of injury issues, and a scan is being carried out to identify needs and priorities.
