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

Waste Disposal Information



Please place garbage, yard trimmings and recyclables at the curb by 7:00 a.m. PLEASE do not set them out the night before, as it encourages conflicts with bears and other animals.



Acceptable Containers and Limits

- Maximum of two (2) 95 litre cans/bags
- Maximum weight per container: 23 kgs (50 lbs.)
- No loose garbage inside cans





An extra two (2) cans/bags may be put out with Garbage Tags. Tags may be purchased for \$1.50 at City Hall, Glen Park IGA, KLO Super-Mart, Lakeview Market, Harvest Grocery, Rutland Shoppers Drug Mart, Sunshine Market, Orchard Park Shopping Centre, the Regional District Office at 1450 KLO Road, Ellison Market, Mac's Convenience Store (Boucherie), Westbank Chamber of Commerce, the Westside Landfill, the Lake Country Municipal Hall (\$2 per bag), and the Peachland Municipal Hall (\$2 per bag).


HAPPY 5TH ANNIVERSARY TO THE BLUE BAG PROGRAM

Since the start of the program more than 49,000 tonnes of recyclables have been collected. This amount would fill more than 7,600 garbage trucks. If we parked those trucks bumper to bumper from Kelowna along Highway 97 northwards, the line would end near Armstrong!

Residents have recycled:

- Enough tin cans to supply steel for the production of 2,300 high-end Porsche 911 Turbos
- More than 40,000 tonnes of paper and cardboard, which has resulted in 700,000 fewer trees being cut down.
- More than 600 tons of #2 cloudy plastic containers (milk jugs). This is enough plastic to provide the citizens of the entire nation of Slovenia with polyester suits (more than 1.8 million suits).

All these materials have been diverted from our landfills and into the recycling industry; saving natural resources, space in our landfills and providing important jobs for our economy.





When the weather gets chilly...

It's time to think about maintenance on your furnace.


- Schedule a maintenance check-up for your furnace, so it's working as good as new when the cold sets in.
- Check and change filters regularly. It's easy! Dirty filters can reduce airflow and make your furnace work harder and less efficiently.
- Don't crowd your furnace or boiler! Leave space and air around it. Make sure there are no combustible materials stored nearby.



CONTROLLING THE TEMPERATURE IN YOUR HOME IS A GOOD WAY TO SAVE ENERGY

- Turn your thermostat down to 20 degrees Celsius during the day and to 17 degrees Celsius at night to save as much as 15 per cent on the heating part of your energy bill.
- Buy a programmable thermostat to make setting temperatures easy. It will automatically save energy at night and when you're away from home.
- Try getting comfortable by putting on a sweater or slippers instead of turning up the thermostat.



EcoTips:

- Use ladybugs to control aphids and other garden pests.
- Manually dig or pull weeds before they go to seed to reduce nuisance and invasive weeds.











BE PESTICIDE FREE!

Do you know that the average gardener has enough chemicals, including pesticides, insecticides, fungicides and wood preservatives to kill your family several times over?! These chemicals can also be a threat to streams, lakes and our drinking water.

Many common household pesticides are no longer registered for use in Canada. Check the pesticide label and make sure it does not contain these active ingredients:

- Diazinon (pest control for lawns and gardens)
- Chlorpyrifos (ants and wasp bait)
- Methoxychlor (pest control)
- Benomyl (pre-harvest fungicide)

These pesticides need to be disposed of properly. You can drop all pesticides that have a 'skull and crossbones' on their label to the Battery Doctors (1972 Windsor Road) year-round or at the Household Hazardous Waste Round-up in October.

CONCERNED ABOUT PESTICIDES?

Then register for the City of Kelowna Commercial Pesticide Registry. Residents on the registry will be notified prior to commercial spray activity occurring on abutting residential properties. Register by March 15 by phoning 469-8556 or by emailing ask@kelowna.ca
















Household Yard Waste Collection

Grass, leaves, pine needles, pine cones,



cornstalks, pumpkins, garden plants and prunings up to 1 cm (1/2") in diameter are picked up in the spring and fall. Use clear bags or reusable containers for loose material. Bundle prunings and stalks. No orange or black bags.

Residents with municipal or regional garbage collection receive yard waste pick-up on their regular garbage day during the weeks indicated throughout this calendar.

Residential only – no commercial or agricultural waste. Note that garbage and yard waste are collected by different trucks.


Not Accepted



These items should **not** be placed with Yard Waste:

- Branches larger than $1 \text{ cm} (^{1}/_{2}")$
- Kitchen scraps
- Rocks, dirt, sod

- Flower pots and trays and other non-organic items
- Painted or treated wood
- Animal droppings



Summer is here, and that's when water use skyrockets – but it doesn't have to. Most people water their lawns far more often than is necessary. Follow these tips to save water.

YOU CAN USE LESS WATER AND STILL HAVE A GREEN LAWN. HERE'S HOW YOU DO IT..

- ✓ Do NOT water every day, or even every other day. This leads to thatch, which repels water, and encourages shallow roots. This creates a "monster" lawn with a voracious thirst for more water.
- ✓ Avoid fertilizers that are high in nitrogen. They stimulate temporary growth only, and are a major contributor to shallow roots and thatch.
- ✓ Aerate your lawn and top dress with organic material. Aeration helps water and vital nutrients to penetrate the soil and get down to the root zone.
- ✓ Leave grass clippings on the lawn. They contain moisture and all the nitrogen your lawn will ever need.



FREE SOIL SAMPLE & IRRIGATION SYSTEM ASSESSMENT

Staff from the City of Kelowna Water Smart Program will take a soil sample from your yard to determine the health of your grass. We'll look for things like root depth and thatch. Then we'll assess your irrigation system and make recommendations on how you can maintain a healthy green lawn with less water. Be aware: 4 quick electrical safety tips

These electrical safety tips could save your life:

1. 10 METRES TO SAFETY

Stay back at least 10 metres (33 ft.) from any downed power line, exposed underground cable, or where there is contact with an overhead power line.

2. CONTACT IS MADE - STAY WHERE YOU ARE

If your vehicle comes in contact with downed power lines, stay in your vehicle and wait for assistance, do not get out!

3. LOOK UP AND LIVE

All workers who operate machinery or equipment should look up and check for overhead power lines before beginning work.

4. CALL BEFORE YOU DIG



Okanagan Lake and its tributary streams home to many species of fish



Over 20 species of fish call Okanagan Lake and its tributary streams home, including species that are native to the area and species that have been introduced over the years. The number of spawning kokanee salmon in Okanagan Lake was estimated to be greater than 1 million before the 1970s. In 2004, the number of kokanee stream and shore spawners was estimated at 93,668. Human activities and impacts such as agriculture, mining, hydroelectric dams, forestry and urban development affect fish and fish habitat.

Fish habitat has also been impacted by a loss of wetlands as urban areas expand, channelization of streams for flood control and introduction of invasive/exotic species. Exotic or introduced species such as carp, Eurasian water milfoil, purple loosestrife and mysis shrimp can establish themselves quickly and out-compete native fish and vegetation for resources.

TO HELP PRESERVE THEIR HABITAT:

- Obey the closure on kokanee fishing in Okanagan Lake, which has been in effect since 1995.
- Maintain and plant native trees and shrubs along streambanks, as they keep the water temperature cool, provide food and habitat for fish and wildlife, filter out pollutants, and prevent streambank erosion.
- Leave boulders and fallen trees, stumps, and branches in streams; they provide fish habitat and stream complexity.
- Keep trash and debris, including yard waste, away from streams and wetlands.

MONDAY

 Avoid walking or biking in streams and trampling streambanks. This will reduce the amount of sediment entering the stream and will protect aquatic life.

Understanding the Storm System

The Storm Drainage System...

collects, conveys and disposes of storm water (*rain and snow melt*) directly into Lake Okanagan, or nearby streams, without treatment. Please do your part to protect our source of drinking water by never allowing anything to drain into the storm system but clear, clean water.



Storm water and groundwater are funneled by gravity into the City's storm drain system via:

- 1. Roof drains
- 2. Foundation drains
- 3. Curb and gutter ditches
- 4. Catch basins
- 5. Storm main pipes
- 6. Manholes

The Big Bad Five Household Hazardous Wastes are:

- Automotive fluids (e.g., motor oil, anti-freeze, brake and transmission fluids).
- All types of paints and stains

- Solvents (e.g., thinner, paint stripper, varsol).
- Fertilizers and pesticides (e.g, pest sprays, creosote, weed killer).
- Cleaners (e.g. oven cleaner, bathroom disinfectant, drain opener, auto cleaners).

Paint, Solvents, Pesticides & Gasoline

These items, when used and disposed of improperly, are harmful to humans, animals and the environment. Product Care is the non-profit organization that collects these products free of charge to the public. Funded by eco-fees, Product Care operates more than 100 Paint Drop Depots (that accept paint only) and 42 Paint Plus Depots in BC.

- Return products in their properly sealed and labelled original container.
- Don't mix different types of paint or products together.
- Don't leave products in your car trunk for long periods of time, particularly during hot weather.





What is **NOT** ACCEPTED at Product Care?

- Inappropriate containers and containers that are leaking or improperly sealed
- Products that cannot be identified
- Commercial, industrial or agricultural products, colourants & tints and automotive liquid paint
- Cosmetics, health & beauty aids


Reduce your holiday and year-round energy demands: keep your lighting low, turn off unnecessary electrical lights and appliances, use energy efficient Christmas tree lights.

REUSE

- Some Christmas wraps and trimmings are not recyclable, because of the shine, the foil, and the bright inks – but they are fun to re-use!
