

Kelley Jo Burke, CBC

Session Presenters

Writing To Read Dan Danforth, SIAST Wascana Campus

This workshop will present and practice methods for assisting learners and practitioners with reading by understanding that how they write impacts on how they read and how they read impacts on how they write. Reading is about forming ideas in one's mind based on a series of characters on a page. A key element to forming ideas is being able to generate a flow that makes sense. When we write, we create a flow that makes sense to us, but possibly not others. If the sense in writing has a flow to it, the sense of reading will obtain a flow.

All programs are designed and evaluated for their effective use of assistive technology, individualized and qualified instruction and tutor supports. as needed.

Oxford Learning Centre-Oxford Learning is the only after-school learning program of its kind, which is based on Dynamic Diagnostic Assessments and individualized programming to teach your child to learn and study more effectively - to reach his or her full potential. Better grades, motivation and confidence follow. Whatever the age or stage in learning, we have a program to develop literacy and learning skills. From the Little Readers Academy for ages 3-6 to the core or immersion French program, the High School Advantage, or the SAT Plus programs, and our new English as a Second Language program, we give each child or adult a lifetime of learning success.

Regina Catholic Schools-Regina Catholic School Division is comprised of twenty-nine schools serving more than 10, 000 students. Regina Catholic schools include 4 high schools, French Immersion program in two high schools and four elementary French Immersion Schools, alternate placement school, a school for students with multiple handicaps and nineteen elementary schools. We believe in partnering with others in the community to ensure a wide range of opportunities exist for everyone.

SCEP Centre – Early Intervention and Training

Services—The Socialization Communication Education Program was designed in 1968 at the request of a group of parents of troubled teens for whom there were no services at an early age. SCEP continues to provides services for families and agencies in Southern Saskatchewan who are concerned with young children.
