The organization's ongoing activities include researching and preparing briefs, reports, and educational materials; communicating with government and networking with other organizations; taking part in conferences and meetings; sponsoring and implementing projects; hosting forums and workshops; and providing information on numerous topics that are of interest to the public.

Employment

Human Resource Centres of Canada (HRCC)

EI earnings that may affect the benefits you receive include retirement income such as employment pensions. The centres can provide you with information about EI.

Workers' Compensation Board of Nova Scotia

The Workers' Compensation Act of Nova Scotia protects both the injured worker and the employer. It provides financial assistance, medical aid, rehabilitation, re-employment and protection from participating in court processes.

Financial assistance may include:

- temporarily paying a portion of the workers' salary while he/she recovers enough to return to work.
- paying a portion of earnings for an extended period of time (if there is financial loss due to permanent impairment).

In some cases of permanent impairment, more comprehensive financial arrangements are made. As well, if a worker dies as a result of a workplace accident, the act allows for survivor benefits and dependent child benefits.

Driver's Licenses

Photo driver's licenses are issued by the Registry of Motor Vehicles, a division of Service Nova Scotia and Municipal Relations. The cost to renew a Class 5 (regular) licence for a five-year period is \$60.

Appointments for Seniors — People with special needs, including seniors, may schedule a time to renew their license rather than waiting for extended periods of time.

Mobility Disabled License Plates and Permits — The Registry of Motor Vehicles ensures that those needing to park close to buildings due to mobility impairments, are able to do so. See details on page 26.

Veteran's Plates — Qualified individuals can apply for Veteran's plates by completing

the application form and supplying proof of eligibility. The registration fee is an additional \$5 added to the usual cost of registering your vehicle.

Refunds — You can request a refund if you move out of the province or have stopped driving. Additionally, refunds can be requested by the estate on behalf of deceased drivers. The refund will be for the time remaining in the five-year period for which the driver has paid, minus the \$9 fee and an administration fee of \$11.50.

Federal Retirement Income Programs

Old Age Security Program and Canada Pension Plan

Human Resources Development Canada (HRDC) administers the Old Age Security Program (OAS) and Canada Pension Plan (CPP).

You can contact HRDC to arrange an appointment or ask questions about CPP or OAS.

Seniors not receiving Old Age Security please call HRDC.

Old Age Security Program (OAS)

This monthly benefit is available to most Canadians 65 years of age or older. You must apply for this pension benefit and you must also meet OAS residence requirements. See page 61 for information about OAS identification cards.

Your employment history is not a factor in determining your eligibility, nor do you need to be retired to receive this benefit. You can apply for OAS benefits any time from six months to a year before your 65th birthday. OAS benefits are indexed quarterly and are subject to income tax.

The amount of your pension depends on how long you have lived in Canada. If you do not have enough periods of residence in Canada to qualify for a pension, you may still qualify if you lived in and/or made social security contributions in a country with which Canada has a social security agreement.

Information for Higher Income Seniors

In 2003, pensioners with an individual net income above \$57,879 must repay part or all of the maximum Old Age Security pension amount. The repayment amounts are normally deducted from their monthly payments before they are issued. The full

OAS pension is eliminated when a pensioner's net income is \$94,148 or above.

Other Benefits

Other benefits available through the Old Age Security Program are:

- Guaranteed Income Supplement (GIS)
- The Allowance (formally known as the Spouse's Allowance)
- The Allowance for the Survivor (formally referred to as the Widowed Spouse's Allowance)

Guaranteed Income Supplement (GIS) — This benefit is a non-taxable, monthly benefit paid to residents of Canada who receive a basic, full, or partial Old Age Security pension, and who have little or no other income. To determine if you qualify for the GIS, call 1-800-277-9914. Remember,



to receive the GIS you must re-apply each year by filing an income statement or completing an income tax return.

Allowance — This benefit provides a modest income if you have a low income, are 60-64 years old, and are the spouse or commonlaw partner of an OAS pensioner. The Allowance stops when you become eligible for an Old Age Security pension at age 65, if you leave Canada for more than six months, if there is a change in your marital status, or if you die. You must re-apply every year for this benefit by filing an income statement or completing an income tax return.

Allowance for the Survivor — This benefit provides a modest income if you have a low income, are 60-64 years old, and if your spouse or common-law partner has died. The Allowance stops when you become eligible for an Old Age Security pension at age 65, if you leave Canada for more than six months, or if you die.

If your income and/or marital status change, your benefit rate can go up or down, or stop altogether (i.e. you can't qualify if you've remarried or entered a common-law relationship since your partner's death). Remember that you could be entitled to benefits now even if you were turned down in the past. If your benefits



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are stopped at any point, you should check each year after that to find out if you qualify again. You must re-apply every year for this benefit.

Important Notes

- If you or your partner receive the GIS or the Allowance based on "single" status, you must declare both incomes to calculate your eligibility for GIS and the Allowance. Should you not declare your common-law status, future benefits for these and other Government of Canada programs may be affected.
- The GIS or the Allowances are intended for low-income seniors who live in Canada. They must stop if you leave Canada for a period of more than six months, following the month of your departure. When you return to Canada, you can apply to have your benefits restored.
- Your OAS pension, the GIS, and the Allowances are adjusted every three months for inflation. While the OAS pension is a taxable benefit, you are not taxed on the GIS or the Allowances. If you qualify for these benefits you may also be eligible for other programs or benefits offered by the Province of Nova Scotia.

Canada Pension Plan (CPP)

This plan offers benefits to people who have contributed to the Canada Pension Plan or to both the Canada Pension Plan and the Quebec Pension Plan. You must apply for these benefits.

The Canada Pension Plan, which began in 1966, provides benefits when a contributor to the plan retires, becomes disabled, or dies. The amount of the benefit depends on the amount of earnings and contributions to the plan. All Canada Pension Plan benefits are paid out of the CPP fund and are subject to income tax.

Retirement Pension — This is a monthly benefit payable to eligible contributors who are 65 years of age or older. If you are 60–64 years of age, you may receive a reduced benefit if you are working parttime or have completely ceased working. This benefit will continue even if you return to work at a later date. Once you begin to receive your retirement pension you must stop contributing to the Canada Pension Plan. When you become 65 years of age you do not need to stop work to receive these retirement pension benefits.

Disability Pension — This is a monthly benefit payable to eligible contributors who are disabled (according to the terms of CPP legislation), who are under the age of 65, and who have made sufficient contributions to the plan. The Disability Pension includes benefits for dependent children of disabled contributors.

Surviving Spouses' Benefit — This is a monthly pension paid to the spouse of a deceased contributor, if that contributor made sufficient contributions to the plan. The amount of the pension is determined by the deceased's contributions to the plan, the age of the surviving spouse at the time of death, whether there are dependent children, or if the surviving spouse is disabled.

Death Benefit — This is a lump-sum benefit paid to the estate of the deceased contributor, if contributions were made

to the plan for a minimum qualifying period. *Maximum Benefit:* \$2,500.

Childrens' Benefit — This benefit is paid on behalf of the dependent children of a deceased contributor, if the contributions have been made for a minimum qualifying period. This is a flat-rate benefit.

Provincial Financial Aid Programs

Property Tax Rebate Program

This program, administered by the Department of Community Services, is designed to help eligible seniors remain in their own homes by providing them with an annual rebate on their municipal property taxes.

The program provides eligible homeowners with a 50 percent rebate on the municipal property taxes paid the previous year, up to a maximum of \$400 per year. The rebate in 2004 will be for property taxes paid in 2003.

Eligibility

You are eligible to receive the rebate if you meet the following criteria:

- You were receiving either the Guaranteed Income Supplement (GIS) or The Allowance in January of this year. To find out if you qualify for the GIS or The Allowance, call Human Resources Development Canada at 1-800-277-9914.
- You are living in your home at the time you apply for the rebate and continue to reside in the home.
- Your 2003 property taxes were paid in full.

Application Process

Previous Applicants — If you received the Property Tax Rebate last year and were in receipt of the Guaranteed Income Supplement or The Allowance in January 2004, an application form will automatically be mailed to you in June. To receive the rebate, simply complete the application

form and return it to the Senior Citizens' Financial Aid Program by December 31, 2004.

New Applicants — To determine your eligibility for the rebate, call the Senior Citizens' Financial Aid Program, toll-free, at 1-877-296-9338. If you are eligible, an application form will be mailed to you in August 2004. To receive the rebate, simply complete the application form and return it to the Senior Citizens' Financial Aid Program by December 31, 2004.

Vital Statistics and Proof of Age

Birth, Marriage, and Death Certificates

If you were born in Canada, you may obtain your birth certificate by writing to the Vital Statistics Branch of the province in which you were born. To request marriage, birth, or death certificates within Nova Scotia, contact the Vital Statistics Division of Service Nova Scotia and Municipal Relations. You may go to the Vital Statistics Office in person, or apply in writing.

When you apply for a certificate, you must give the following information: your full name (first, middle, and last); the date and place of the event; and, in the case of birth certificates, your parents' full names (including mother's maiden name) and your father's and mother's birth place. You must also state the reason for your request. The fee for each wallet-sized certificate is \$25. Applications may be made on-line using Visa or MasterCard.

If you need additional assistance or if you were NOT born in Canada, the Vital Statistics Office may be able to give you information on where to write for a foreign birth certificate.

Proof of Age

Many reductions and benefits are available to seniors. To receive them you are expected to prove your age. Many businesses will accept your Old Age Security (OAS) Identification Card, passport, driver's license, or a general photo ID card, such as

the one available from the Registry of Motor Vehicles.

Seniors' Card — OAS

You will receive an Old Age Security (OAS) Identification Card in the mail the same month you receive your first OAS cheque.

Personal Income Tax

Canadian citizens are required to fill out forms to calculate the amount of taxes they should pay each year. These must be returned to the Canada Customs and Revenue Agency (CCRA), formerly called Revenue Canada.

Depending on your situation and if you filed an income tax return last year, you may receive a personalized income tax package through the mail.

General income tax returns and guides are available from your income tax office or local post office. It is now possible to file your income tax return via the internet.

When calling about your income tax, be sure to have your questions ready and your tax papers handy.

Caregiver Tax Tips

Seniors are entitled to a number of tax credits including: Basic Personal Credit, Age Credit, Personal Disability Credit, and Credits for Medical Expenses. Caregivers are also entitled to additional tax credits, including: Caregiver Credit, Spousal Credit, Dependent Disability Credit, Spousal Transfer Credit, Eligible Dependent Credit, and Infirm Dependent Credit.

GST Credit

The Goods and Services Tax (GST) Credit is designed to offset the cost of the GST for individuals and families with moderate or lower incomes.

To apply, you must file a tax return and complete the Goods and Services Tax Credit information section on Page 1 of your tax return. If you are eligible, you will receive payments in July, October, January, and April. Only one member of each family unit is eligible to apply.

Public Trustee

The Public Trustee is a lawyer named by the provincial government to help adults and children who are unable to look after their financial affairs. The Public Trustee serves several functions, including:

- Managing the estates of people who need someone they can trust to handle their finances. In some cases the Public Trustee will help locate a friend or relative willing to act on an individual's behalf. In other cases, the Public Trustee may decide it is appropriate for a bank or trust company to handle their affairs.
- Administering the estates of a person who has died without leaving a will or where there is a will but the executors or next of kin cannot or will not act.
- Consenting to medical or surgical treatment of a mentally incompetent hospital patient when consent cannot be obtained from the patient's guardian, spouse, or next-of-kin.

Fees for services are based on a percentage of the value of a person's estate. There is a minimum fee of \$100 a year.

Small Claims Court

This court provides a quick, informal, and cost-effective method for deciding claims up to \$10,000 (not including interest). If you are making a claim, neither you nor the person whom the claim is against will need a lawyer. Small Claims Court is less formal than other courts. The case is heard by an adjudicator, not a judge. The adjudicator is a lawyer. Small Claims Court is usually held in the evenings.

You can make a claim for up to \$10,000 or for the return of goods valued up to \$10,000. If your claim is for more than that, you can forego the extra and claim for \$10,000. You cannot use this court for matters dealing with ownership of land, wills, landlord and tenant disputes, or for malicious prosecution, false imprisonment, or defamation (libel and slander). To start an action, you need to file a *Notice of Claim*. This form is available from the Small Claims Court. Fees range from \$75 to \$150 depending on the amount and type of your claim.

Contact the clerk of the Small Claims Court nearest you for more information. Look for the telephone number in the government section of your telephone directory, under the heading of Courts.

Human Rights

The Commission is an independent government body charged with the administration of the province's Human Rights Act which protects Nova Scotians from discrimination.







Insurance

Overview

Hints for Consumers — Because of the importance of insurance in our lives, before you purchase insurance, it would be wise to consult with a qualified insurance agent or broker who is able to assess your needs and give you advice on how to meet those needs. Regardless of the type of insurance you are purchasing, it can pay to shop around. Obtain quotations from a number of insurance providers and compare both the coverage and the price.

Life Insurance — For many people, the major obstacle to purchasing life insurance is the existence of medical problems. In some cases, seniors have health conditions that would result in denial of application for life insurance. Some companies will issue policies with a moderate amount of life insurance, say \$25,000, to anyone, regardless of health conditions.

Home Insurance — Seniors who own homes or condominiums or who live in rented premises should have their property insured.

Automobile Insurance — Contact the Senior Citizens' Secretariat at 1-800-670-0065, for brochures about auto insurance.

Health Insurance — Health insurance plans cover some of the health benefits not provided by your provincial health care program, such as semi-private hospital rooms, ambulance benefits, and vision care. Dental insurance is also available.

Travel Health Insurance — Travellers would be wise to purchase travel health insurance if they are leaving Canada—even for just a few hours. You may even consider purchasing it when you travel to another province, since some health services, such as ambulance fees, are not covered when you are there. Travel health insurance policies are available from a number of sources, including insurance agents or brokers and travel agents.

Insurance Providers

Refer to the yellow pages of your telephone directory for local information on insurance providers.

This office supervises the business of insurance in the province and enforces the Insurance Act. It licenses all insurers operating in the province and all insurance agents/brokers, agencies, and adjusters. The Superintendent has the authority to take disciplinary actions if the Act is not followed.

The Office responds to complaints, inquiries, or information about insurance matters, but does not settle insurance claims.

Elder Abuse

Elder abuse is any action or inaction that threatens the health or well-being of a senior. This includes all types of abuse such as physical, sexual, emotional and financial abuse as well as neglect and self-neglect. Abuse can occur in a family home, hospital, nursing home, or anywhere in the community. If you or someone you know has

been abused there are people and organizations who can help, including the following:

The *Vial of Life* provides emergency medical personnel with vital and perhaps life-saving medical information about you if they are called your home and find you unconscious or very ill.

The vial is a small plastic container. It contains a specially designed form on which you record medical information such as your name, medical history, allergies, medications, blood type, and a contact person. The vial is kept inside your fridge and a *Vial of Life* magnet is placed on the outside of your fridge to

alert emergency personnel to your vial.

Home Improvement Grants and Loans

The following home improvement grants and loans programs are offered through the Department of Community Services, Housing Services. The programs are intended to help low income seniors and families maintain their homes:

Grants for Home Repairs (do not have to be repaid)

Provincial Housing Emergency Repair Program (PHERP)

Provides grants of up to \$2,500 to lower-income households to carry out emergency and health and safety-related

repairs to their homes. The income limit on eligibility varies depending on location and household size.

Senior Citizens' Assistance Program (SCAP)

Provides grants of up to \$3,000 to seniors who are at least 65 years of age, to carry out emergency and health and safety-related repairs to their homes. The amount of the grant available depends on the household income level. The income limit for eligibility varies depending on location and household size.

Access-A-Home Program

Provides grants of up to \$3,000 to help homeowners renovate their homes to make them wheelchair accessible. The amount of the grant available depends on the applicant's income level. The annual income limit for eligibility is \$30,000.

Emergency Repair Program (ERP)

Assists eligible homeowners in rural areas to carry out urgent repairs to deal with health and safety hazards. Examples include repairs to unsafe wiring and heating systems and installing new wells and septic systems. The maximum grant available is \$6,000. The income limit for eligibility varies, depending on location and household size.

Provincial Loan and Mortgage Programs

Family Modest Housing Program

Provides mortgage funds of up to \$70,000 for Nova Scotians to build or buy a modest house. Annual income must be less than \$50,000.

Parent Apartment Program (PAP)

Provides homeowners with loans of up to \$25,000 for the creation of affordable accommodation for family members who are at least 50 years of age. Parent apartments may be located either within or attached to existing single-family houses. The annual income of the parent(s) must be less than \$20,000.

Small Loans Assistance Program (SLAP)

Provides homeowners with low-interest loans of up to \$20,000 for home renovations, additions, or repairs. Annual income must be less than \$35,000.

Help for Major Repairs and Adaptations

Residential Rehabilitation Assistance Program (Homeowner RRAP)

Provides a forgivable loan of up to \$16,000 to qualifying homeowners who own and occupy sub-standard housing, to make repairs so that the home will meet minimum health and safety standards. The amount of assistance available depends on the cost of modifications, household income, and household size. The income



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limit for eligibility varies depending on income, location, and household size.

Disabled Residential Rehabilitation Assistance Program (Disabled RRAP)

Provides a forgivable loan of up to \$16,000 to qualifying homeowners to carry out work needed to modify homes occupied by someone with a disability. The amount of assistance available depends on the cost of the modifications, household income, and household size. The income limit for eligibility varies, depending on location and household size.

Home Adaptations for Seniors' Independence (HASI)

Provides financial assistance of up to \$3,500 to qualifying homeowners and tenants who have their landlord's consent, to carry out home adaptations needed to extend the time that lower-income seniors, who are at least 65 years old, can live in their home independently. The income limit for eligibility varies, depending on location and household size.

The Department of Health has many responsibilities related to the overall functioning of the health care system, including health planning and evaluation. It is also responsible for the province-wide management and delivery of Insured Services, Emergency Health Services, and Continuing Care Services.

District Health Authorities and Community Health Boards

Many community programs and services are offered through the District Health Authorities. Together with the Community Health Boards in each health district, District Health Authorities work hard to understand communities and plan health services and programs to meet the needs of local people.

District Health Authorities are responsible for hospitals and offer a full range of patient care programs and support services. They also offer health promotion, primary prevention, and treatment programs through public health, mental health, addiction services, and provincial programs.

Community Health Boards are made up of volunteers who work with residents of the health districts to build a health system that meets the needs of local communities and improves health. Community Health Boards develop health plans for local needs, help support local health initiatives, engage in public consultation, and nominate individuals for membership on the Board of Directors of District Health Authorities.

Nova Scotia Health Insurance

Nova Scotia's health insurance plans, generally referred to as Medical Services Insurance (MSI), provide eligible residents with coverage for medically required hospital, medical, dental, and optometry services, with some restrictions.

For more information, contact:

 Eligibility — To be eligible for insured health services under the health insurance plans you must be:

- a Canadian citizen or be legally entitled to remain in Canada
- a permanent resident of Nova Scotia
- ordinarily present in Nova Scotia for at least six months in a 12 month period.

Some people are not eligible for insurance coverage in Nova Scotia, as they are covered by other health plans. These include: regular members of the RCMP and the Canadian Forces, tourists and visitors to the province, students from other provinces, and inmates of federal penitentiaries.

Persons moving to Nova Scotia from elsewhere in Canada will become eligible for insured health services programs on the first day of the third month following the month in which they become a resident of Nova Scotia.

During this waiting period, you will continue to receive coverage from your former province of residence. It is your responsibility to contact that province to ensure your coverage is continued.

Persons from outside Canada establishing permanent residence in Nova Scotia may apply for coverage. Please contact the MSI office for details.

Registration — You can register through the MSI office by phone or in person.

Nova Scotia Health Cards — When your application has been processed, each member of your family will receive a Nova Scotia Health Card which must be presented whenever you require insured services. Please carry your signed health card with you at all times.

Renewal — Nova Scotia Health Cards have a four-year term. Renewal notices will be mailed three months prior to the expiry date. There is no charge to renew your card. If you use an expired health card, you may be asked to pay for services.

Lost or Stolen Cards — There is a \$10 charge to replace a lost or stolen card. Visit or contact the MSI office at the address and phone number listed above.

Change of Address — It is in your best interest to ensure MSI has your most upto-date contact information and mailing address. When you have a new address, you should contact MSI.

Insured Health Services

The pamphlet, *Insured Health Services in Nova Scotia*, provides detailed information about eligibility, registration, and the plans themselves. Copies are available from the MSI office.

Highlights of the services covered under Nova Scotia's Health Insurance Plan are outlined on the next few pages.

Physician's Services

The following services may be provided at physicians' offices, hospitals, residences, clinics, institutions or at the scene of an emergency. They are covered under the health plan when medically required.

- All necessary surgical services
- Complete obstetrical care
- Sterilization procedures
- Treatment of fractures and dislocations
- All necessary referred specialist services
- All necessary diagnostic services, except those which are available under the Insured Hospital Services

- Physical examinations where deemed medically necessary
- Supervision of home dialysis
- Pap smears and other preventative measures.

Optometry (Eye-Related) Services

Optometry Vision Analysis

This service is covered when performed by an optometrist to determine the refractive status of the eye and the presence of any abnormality in the visual system.

Routine Vision Analysis

Coverage is provided, once every two years, for those 65 years of age and over and children up to their 10th birthday. For all others, routine vision analysis is not covered.

Dental Services (Adults)

Dental Surgical Program

Coverage is limited to a specified list of insured services. Not all services are covered.

Uninsured Health Services

The services listed below and a number of others are NOT insured or covered by Nova Scotia's Health Insurance Plan. Each doctor can set their own fees for uninsured services or may choose not to charge. A doctor must inform a patient of any costs before providing a service that is not covered. Uninsured services include:

- Eye Refractions/Routine Vision Analysis

 These services are uninsured for the
 10 to 64 age group.
- *Health Aids or Devices* Items such as eye glasses, hearing aids, dentures, surgical appliances, trusses, wheelchairs, and crutches are uninsured.

• *Mileage Fees* — Uninsured for house calls by a physician.

Contact the Medical Services Insurance office for a complete list of uninsured services. Information is also available from your doctor's office.

Ambulance Services

Users of ambulance services pay a portion of the cost of providing the service. If your ambulance bill is related to a motor vehicle accident or work-related injury and you have Stipulated Third Party Insurance, you must submit your bill to your insurer for payment.

Tip: Since ambulance fees are not an insured service, anyone who travels outside of Nova Scotia may wish to purchase travel insurance to cover ambulance fees incurred in other provinces.

Ambulance Fees

The following fees are subject to change:

No Fee — There is no fee for medically essential transportation between approved health care facilities providing you have a valid MSI card or are a resident of another

province. The same pertains to the transportation of Acute Home Care patients.

\$105 — Applies to an individual who is transported from the scene to an approved facility, providing they have a valid MSI card. The same fee will apply to an individual who is transported from an approved facility to their place of residence, with a physician's approval.

Note: The fees listed above pertain to patients who do not have stipulated third-party insurance coverage. The fees below apply to patients with that insurance coverage.

\$150 — Applies to a mobility challenged patient whose transport either begins or ends at their place of residence and is to or from an approved facility, physician's office, dentist's office, physiotherapist's facility, or respite care facility.

\$600 — Applies to an individual who is transported from a motor vehicle collision to an approved facility. The same fee will apply if an individual has a work related injury and Workers' Compensation coverage.

\$600 — Applies to all non-interfacility transports for Non-Nova Scotian, Canadian citizens.

\$900 — Applies to all transports for Non-Canadian citizens.



Payment Process

An invoice will be sent to you in the mail advising you of the fee and where to send your payment.

Special Arrangements — If you cannot afford to pay the invoice all at once, contact the billing office nearest you to set up payment arrangements. This will make it possible for you to pay the invoice over time, interest free, until such time as the invoice is paid in full. As long as there is an amount owing, an invoice will be sent to you each month.

Appeal Process — If you feel you have been billed incorrectly or have an issue with the service you received, you should discuss the matter with your local billing office. If the matter cannot be resolved by the billing administrator, you can make a formal appeal. 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Seniors' Pharmacare Program

Pharmacare is a provincial drug insurance plan that helps seniors with the cost of their prescription drugs. More detailed information is available on the Department of Health website at:

Eligibility — You are eligible to join Pharmacare if:

- You are a Nova Scotia resident.
- You have a valid Nova Scotia Health Card
- You are at least 65 years old; and you do NOT have drug coverage through Veterans Affairs Canada, First Nations and Inuit Health, or a private drug plan*.
- * **Note**: Members of the Public Service Health Care Plan who receive the Guaranteed Income Supplement (GIS) are eligible for Pharmacare.

New Residents — Seniors who move to Nova Scotia must apply for and receive a Nova Scotia Health Card before applying for Pharmacare (see page 90).

Benefits — Pharmacare covers drugs listed as benefits in the *Nova Scotia Formulary*. The Formulary is managed by a committee of experts who decide which drugs should

and should not be covered by Pharmacare. The experts include family doctors, geriatricians, pharmacists, and drug information specialists. The formulary is available on the Department of Health website, at: www.gov.ns.ca/health/pharmacare.

Coverage — Medications and supplies covered by Pharmacare include:

- Prescribed medicines that are listed in the Nova Scotia Formulary
- Some prescribed ostomy supplies
- Prescribed diabetic supplies (including testing materials), needles, and syringes

Note: Medications and supplies must be prescribed by a doctor, dentist, recognized nurse practitioner, or authorized optometrist. Prescriptions must be filled in Nova Scotia to be covered.

Generic Drugs — Generic drugs are dispensed under Pharmacare. Generic drugs are the same as the name-brand drugs but cost less.

Note: If you choose a more expensive brandname drug when a generic brand is available, you will have to pay the difference in price between the two. If you have tried the generic brand and have had a reaction to it, and your doctor reports this reaction to Pharmacare, the program may pay for the brand-name drug.



Application Process — You are eligible for Pharmacare on the first day of the month in which you turn 65. An information package will be sent to you two to three months prior to that date. Once Pharmacare has received any required payments, prescriptions can be billed to the program. To join the program, you must complete the enclosed application form and send any payment required to Pharmacare.

Note: When filling a prescription, make sure you notify the pharmacy of your Pharmacare coverage.

Pharmacare Card — Your *Nova Scotia*Health Card is also your Pharmacare card.

Your card must be shown to the pharmacist to get your Pharmacare benefits.

Annual Renewal — An information package and a form to complete and return to Pharmacare will be sent to you in February or March, provided you were covered by Pharmacare the year before.

Pharmacare Fees

Most seniors who join Pharmacare pay an annual "premium" for coverage under the program. They also pay a "co-payment" fee, which is a portion of the prescription cost for each prescription filled.

Pharmacare fees are reviewed annually and are subject to change.

Co-payment — Each time you receive a prescription, you must pay 33 percent of the total prescription cost for each prescription filled, keeping in mind that the minimum co-payment is \$3 and the maximum is \$30 per prescription. You will not be required to pay more than \$350 a year in co-payment fees.

Co-payment fees are paid to your pharmacist when you pick up your prescription. When you have reached your maximum

annual co-payment limit of \$350, your pharmacist will notify you. Co-payment totals are calculated from April 1st to March 31st each year.

Premium — Depending on your family income, you may be required to pay the full premium, a reduced premium, or no premium at all.



Full Premium — \$336 per year.

Reduced Premium — If you are a lowincome senior who does not get the GIS, you may qualify for a reduced premium if:

- you are single, and your income is less than \$24,000 a year, or
- you are married and your income plus your spouse's income add up to less than \$28,000 a year.

Premium Exemption — If you receive the Federal government's Guaranteed Income Supplement (GIS), you are not required to pay the premium unless you have an outstanding balance from the previous year. To find out if you qualify for GIS, call 1-800-277-9914.

Premium Cost for People Who Apply Late

— If you do not apply for Pharmacare coverage within three months of your eligibility date, or decide to leave Pharmacare and join again later, you have to wait 90 days for your coverage to start and pay one and a half times the premium for your coverage, every year thereafter.

Payment of Premium — The premium can be paid all at once, quarterly, or monthly via cheque, money order, Visa, MasterCard, or automatic withdrawal. You will get a receipt when you have paid your full premium. Call the Pharmacare toll-free line at 1-800-544-6191 for details.

Refunds — A refund can be requested if a senior moves out of the province or passes away. The refund will be for the number of months left in the year for which the premium was paid.

Travel Arrangements — If you plan to be out of the province for more than 100 days and you need medicine for that time, you can get up to a 180 days supply if your pharmacist or doctor agrees.

Note: Pharmacare does not pay for prescriptions that you get outside of Nova Scotia. So if you plan to leave the province, you should arrange for extra health care insurance coverage before you leave.

Income Tax Deductions — Your premiums and co-payments are eligible to be included in the calculation of your income tax deduction for medical expenses.

Change of Address — If you are moving, contact Pharmacare by mail or phone and advise them your new address. See contact information on page 93.

Private Health Insurance

Private insurance carriers offer coverage for health services not covered by the provincial health insurance programs. These include such items as preferred hospital accommodation, prescription drugs, extended health services, and long-term care insurance.

Insurance Providers — The yellow pages of your local telephone directory will list local health insurance providers under the heading of Insurance, Life and Health.

Continuing Care Services

Continuing care is an integral part of Nova Scotia's integrated health system. It serves people who need ongoing care, either on a long term or short term basis. Services include:

- Home Care
- Long-Term Care (such as a nursing home or a residential care facility)
- Protection for Vulnerable Adults

For specific information on continuing care services, or to talk to a qualified staff person about your needs for care and the services that would best meet them, call the Continuing Care toll-free line from anywhere in Nova Scotia. *Hours:* Seven days a week, 8:30 am–4:30 pm.

Home Care

Home Care provides community based health care services and assistance with the daily activities of living to Nova Scotians of all ages who require support to stay in their homes for as long as it is safely possible. The services are meant to add to the help people can receive from others, such as family members, the community, or friends. Home Care is always the first option considered for care in the community and Home Care works together with other parts of the health care system.

Home Care services can support and prolong independent community living, prevent or delay admission to either a long term care facility or hospital, and promote earlier discharges of patients from hospital, when appropriate. Home Care also helps clients link to professional services and other community based resources such as Meals on Wheels or foot care clinics. The following direct services available through Home Care are delivered by a network of health care professionals and home support workers. All service providers meet standards for training and competency set by Continuing Care and by their respective professional associations and governing bodies.

Supportive Care: A range of personal care and home support services are available. Personal care services help the client daily living tasks such as dressing/undressing, bathing, toilet use, feeding, and/or help with mobilization. Home support services help the client with tasks such as light housekeeping, laundry, and/or meal preparation. In-home respite services for caregivers are also available.

Nursing Services: Home care nurses provide a variety of nursing services in clients' homes. Nursing services through home care include nursing assessment, health teaching, health monitoring and treatment. Direct nursing care in the home can include activities such as intravenous therapy, dressing changes, catheter care, post-operative care following hip or knee replacement surgery, and/or assistance with medication management.

Home Oxygen: Home oxygen services provide oxygen concentrators and related supplies in the home, to individuals who require long-term oxygen therapy and who meet program and medical eligibility requirements.

Assessment Process — If you require an assessment for Home Care, a care

coordinator employed by the Continuing Care branch of the Department of Health will call you and arrange for a time to meet with you to complete the assessment. Urgent assessments take priority and are addressed first.

Ongoing Case Management — The care coordinator provides ongoing monitoring and adjustment of the services, as your needs change. The care coordinator can also help you to connect with programs in the community, such as meal programs or foot care clinics. If your needs exceed what Home Care can provide, your care coordinator will provide you with information that may include an application for long term care placement. Home care services may be provided up to the approximate equivalent of the public cost

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of a long term care placement. If you require long-term care, they may assist you with the process for placement in a home that will best meet your needs.

Client Fees — Depending on income and family size, there may be a minimal charge to Home Care clients for the supportive care and/or home oxygen services they receive. There are no charges for home care nursing services or for the supplies used during a nursing visit. The fees charged to the client are not intended to recover the full costs of providing the service.

The care coordinator will determine applicable client fees during the assessment. The amount you pay is determined by your income and family size. A sliding fee scale is used and fees for each income category are outlined in a table that is available upon request. There is a monthly maximum amount that any client can be charged, depending on the client income category. Here are a few examples of the fees charged according to annual income and family size:

Annual Family Income \$0 to \$15,720

Regardless of family size, there is no charge for supportive care services and no monthly oxygen fee.

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\$15,721 to \$31,440

If you are single, there is an \$8 per hour fee for supportive care services, \$60 monthly fee for oxygen and a maximum fee of \$80 per month. If there are two people in the family there is no charge for supportive care services and no monthly oxygen fee.

\$31,441 to \$36,672

If you are single, there is an \$8 per hour fee for supportive care services, \$120 monthly fee for oxygen, and a maximum fee of \$160 per month. If there are two people in the family, the hourly rate for supportive services is \$8, the monthly oxygen fee is \$60, and the maximum fee is \$80 per month.

\$36,673-\$41,904

If you are single, there is an \$8 per hour fee for supportive care services, \$180 monthly fee for oxygen, and a maximum fee of \$240 per month. If there are two people in the family, the hourly rate for supportive care services is \$8 per hour, the monthly oxygen fee is \$120, and the maximum fee is \$160 per month.

Long-Term Care

If your care needs exceed what Home Care can provide, Continuing Care Services staff can help with your admission to a licensed long-term care home for seniors, depending on the type of care you need. Call the Continuing Care toll-free line at 1-800-225-7225 for a listing of the homes in your area.

Levels of Care

Seniors who require long-term care usually fall into one of two categories:

- Level 1 Care: for those who need supervision and limited help with personal care.
- Level 2 Care: for those who require help with personal care and professional nursing care.

One of the biggest differences between the individuals classified as needing Level 1 or 2 care relates to their physical and mental ability to exit from a building unassisted in an emergency. Individuals requiring Level 1 care would be expected to have that ability, whereas those requiring Level 2 care would not.

Other Types of Homes

For information on other types of seniors housing, refer to the following pages: boarding homes (p. 83), retirement homes/assisted living facilities (p. 81), and enriched housing units (p. 80). Many of these facilities offer a range of services to seniors. However, they are not licensed to provide care and their residents are not eligible for financial assistance.

Long-Term Care Homes

Individuals applying for long-term care through the Department of Health's singleentry access system are admitted to one of the following types of homes, depending on their care needs:

Nursing Homes—These homes are mainly licensed to provide accommodation and primarily Level 2 care. There are 71 nursing homes with a combined total of 5,728 beds. The homes are regulated and regularly inspected by the Department of Health. All individuals requiring Level 2 care, even

those who can afford to pay the cost of care themselves, must apply through the Department of Health's single-entry access system for continuing care, by calling 1-800-225-7225.

Residential Care Facilities—These facilities are licensed to provide accommodation and Level 1 care to four or more persons. There are 35 facilities with a combined total of 774 beds. The facilities are regulated and regularly inspected by the Department of Health. Individuals requiring Level 1 care generally apply through the Department of Health's single-entry access system for continuing care, by calling 1-800-225-7225.

About 30 percent of residential care facilities operate outside of the Department of Health's single-entry access system for continuing care. To access those facilities, you may apply directly to the facility, as long as you can afford to pay the fees for at least 18 months. Should your resources be depleted after 18 months, you may apply for assistance through the Continuing Care toll-free line at 1-800-225-7225.

Community Based Options—These homes are approved by the Department of Health to provide Level 1 care for one to three persons. The cost of care for one or more of the residents in these homes



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is financed by the Department of Health. Approved homes are inspected by the Department of Health and must follow the Interim Guidelines for Community Based Options. To apply to an approved community based options home, call the Continuing Care toll-free line at 1-800-225-7225.

Licensing and Standards

Application/Assessment Process —

Contact the Continuing Care toll-free line at 1-800-225-7225, to apply for a long-term care home. A care coordinator will call you and arrange for a time to meet with you to complete the assessment and application process. Together with you, the care coordinator will determine whether home care or long-term care is best for you. The care coordinator will also collect the information that starts

the financial assessment process for help with nursing home costs.

Eligibility/Approval — After the care coordinator assesses your care needs, they will send your application to an eligibility authority in the Department of Health for final approval to determine the kind of facility that best meets your needs. Your name will then be placed on the waiting list for the homes of your choice, according to the date your application was approved. The Department's eligibility authority decides each case based on an individual's needs, the legislation (Social Assistance Act, Adult Protection Act, Homes for Special Care Act), and the provincial policies.

Eligibility Appeal Process — If you disagree with the decision made on your eligibility for long-term care, there is an appeal process. Contact your care coordinator for more information.

Choosing a Home — If you are currently living at home, you will be asked to identify the long- term care home or homes you wish to live in when an opening arises. The nursing homes you select could be in a community where relatives live or anywhere else in Nova Scotia.

Note: If you agree to be placed on the waiting list for more than one home, you must accept placement in the first home that becomes available.

Waiting Lists — A person is placed on the waiting list for a long-term care home on the date they are officially confirmed by the Department of Health as needing long term care. The Department of Health co-ordinates the waiting list chronologically by that date. Waiting for Admission from Home — The amount of time you will be required to wait before being admitted into a home depends on how many people are waiting to get into the home or homes you selected. If your situation worsens after you apply for care and while you are waiting for an opening, your care coordinator can arrange for other services, such as additional home care or respite care. If you feel you need hospital care, don't hesitate to call your family doctor.

Respite Care — Some long term care homes have beds set aside to allow your care needs to be met in a long-term care home while your caregivers have a break. This service is called "respite care". Each home has its own daily rate for respite care beds. If you can pay for your respite care, you may contact the facility directly to make arrangements. If you do not have the means to pay, contact the Continuing Care toll-free line at 1-800-225-7225. Staff will do an assessment to see if you are eligible for a government subsidy.

Refusing Admission from Home — If you are living at home and are offered a place at a long term care facility you had chosen and you refuse to accept it, you will be considered not ready for admission to any home. Your name will then be removed from all waiting lists.

Transferring from One Home to Another

— If you are placed in a nursing home and

— If you are placed in a nursing home and decide you want to move to a different home, contact the Continuing Care toll-free line to arrange for your name to be placed on the waiting list for the facility of your choice.

Waiting for Admission from Hospital — If you are in hospital and the doctors have said you are ready to leave for a

long-term care home, you will be offered an admission to the first available home within a 100 km driving distance of the community where you want to live. This policy is called the "first available bed" policy. As soon as your name comes to the top of the list for your preferred facility, you will be offered the opportunity to transfer. This policy ensures you receive the right kind of care as quickly as possible. Since hospital beds are urgently needed for people requiring medical services that only hospitals can provide, it is not possible for you to stay in the hospital until a room comes up in a home of your choice. When your doctor says that your medical condition no longer requires hospitalization, the hospital may discharge you or begin to charge you for care.

Hospital Fees —

Hospital patients whose doctors have said their medical condition no longer requires hospitalization, and who are waiting for the first available bed in a home within 100 km of the community where they want to live, may be charged \$50 a day to remain in hospital while awaiting placement. Patients who refuse the first available bed in their area, may be discharged or charged \$205 a day if they remain in the hospital. If you are concerned about hospital fees,



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contact your hospital social worker who can explain this policy to you in detail.

Fees for Long-Term Care — In 2003, the province began covering some of the health care costs of long-term care. The amount the province contributes will increase each year until April 2007, when seniors will no longer pay for the health care costs of long-term care. Instead, they will only pay the accommodation costs, which will substantially reduce the amount their fees. The average cost of nursing home care in Nova Scotia is \$140 a day, which is consistent with rates in other parts of Canada. Seniors pay only a portion of this daily rate and during the assessment process, are advised how much they will be required to pay.



Seniors applying to a nursing home prior to April 2007, are required to pay the accommodation costs and a portion of the health care costs of nursing home care, if they can afford to do so. Those who need help with their costs can apply for financial assistance as part of the assessment process.

Financial Assessment Process

— As part of your application to a long-term care home, your care coordinator will help you get started on the financial assessment process. You will be asked

about your income and assets, and asked to sign consent forms that will allow the financial assessment review officers from the Department of Health to verify financial information with your bank and other financial institutions. This information is kept confidential.

The financial assessment determines whether you are eligible for financial assistance. Government support begins after you have paid all you can towards the cost of your care, including your income and your eligible assets. Approximately 80 percent of people living in long term care homes are receiving government help to offset their costs. In Nova Scotia, no senior goes without the long term care they need, regardless of their ability to pay.

Everyone who applies to a nursing home must complete the financial assessment process, except in exceptional circumstances when an individual may decide to sign an *Agreement of Total Support*. This is a contract confirming you understand the full potential costs of care, you have sufficient income and assets to over these costs, and you will not apply to the Department of Health for long-term care funding in the future.

Funding-Related Legislation and Policies

- The Department of Health provides funding under the Social Assistance Act and Community Supports for Adults policies. In November 2002, changes were made to these policies which allow seniors to keep more assets and reduce the amount of paperwork involved. For instance:
- The "look-back" period was reduced to two years from three which means that the financial records of the senior are reviewed for a two-year period from the date the financial application is signed.

- The province will exempt \$25,000 of assets if the person applying for nursing home care has a spouse or legal dependent living at home.
- Since family homes are completely exempt from the financial assessment, individuals no longer have to fill out a form to designate their home. As well, the home may be transferred to another person. That person may sell the home, and the proceeds will not be considered an asset for the cost of care.
- One vehicle per family is now exempt.
 However, new vehicles purchased within
 the two-year look back period may be
 reviewed if it seems the purchase made
 was beyond one of reasonable value or
 inconsistent with an applicant's vehicle
 purchasing habits.

Required Financial Information —

You will need to report your income and assets. Generally speaking, your assets and income must be used to pay your long-term care costs, but there are a number of exemptions. The items currently exempt from the cost of nursing home care are listed below:

- Family home
- Household contents
- One car (some restrictions apply)
- Family cottages
- Family land: (farms and woodlots)
- Life insurance
- Pre-paid funerals
- Paid burial plots
- GST refunds
- Lump sum compensation payments for Merchant Mariners in WWII
- Veterans' disability pensions

- Employment income earned by the spouse
- Ownership of a private business by the spouse
- Refundable child care credit
- Federal child tax benefits
- Contributions to a Registered Education Savings Program*

Splitting Income and Assets Between Spouses — Generally speaking, the income and assets belonging to you and your spouse will be evenly divided between the two of you, excepting any employment income earned by your spouse and keeping in mind the other exemptions listed above. Additionally, you will be able to keep \$25,000 of your joint assets before any remaining assets are split.

If your spouse is entering a nursing home and you believe your half is not enough to live on, the Department of Health will review your budget to determine whether more of your spouse's share should remain with you. If you wish to have your budget reviewed, speak to your spouse's care coordinator, and the Department of Health will contact you for further assessment.

Financial Assessment Appeal Process —

To appeal a decision about your eligibility for financial assistance, you must fill-out the *Appeal Form* that is attached to the eligibility letter sent by the Department of Health. The letter informs you of the amount you will be expected to contribute toward the costs of your care. The *Appeal Form* will ask you to explain why you want to appeal. The *Appeal Form* must be received by the Department of Health within 30 days from the receipt of the eligibility letter.

There are two steps in the appeal process. Step 1 is an administrative review where the Department of Health makes sure all the right things were done to arrive at the decision. If you are not satisfied, you may participate in Step 2, an appeal hearing by the Social Assistance Appeal Board. The board will listen to your side of the story

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and decide if the Department's decision should be changed.

Paying for the Cost of Care — When you enter a nursing home, you will pay the home directly for your care. When the value of your assessed assets is depleted, you will be eligible for financial assistance. At that time, your income will continue to be applied to the cost of your care and the province will pay any additional costs.

Publicly assisted residents of nursing homes and other long-term care facilities are provided with a Personal Use Allowance (PUA). This allowance is intended to provide monthly spending money to be used for items of personal comfort and enjoyment by the resident. Purchases made by third parties (including family members) may be reimbursed by the Nursing Home Administrator if the person seeking reimbursement provides a receipt. Examples: hairdresser and barber fees, magazine or newspaper subscriptions, phone bills, candy. The current amount of the Personal *Use Allowance is \$105 per month.* The allowance is claimed by the home on behalf of the resident and a maximum accumulation limit applies.

Managing Your Affairs

Everyone should take the necessary legal steps to ensure their affairs will be properly managed if they become unable to manage their affairs themselves. For more information on Power of Attorney, Enduring Power of Attorney, and Guardianship, contact the Legal Information Society of Nova Scotia (see contact information on page 64).

Protecting Vulnerable Adults (Adult Protection)

Adults in need of protection are people 16 or older who are abused or neglected and who cannot physically or mentally protect or care for themselves.

If you suspect that an adult is in need of protection, the Adult Protection Act requires you to report any such information, even if the information is confidential or privileged.

Adult protection workers with the Department of Health have the authority to intervene and offer services to help people live safely.

Vulnerable Adults — Individuals are vulnerable for many different reasons. For instance, they may have an intellectual, physical, or mental disability that makes it impossible for them to protect themselves from emotional or physical abuse. Or, their personal circumstances may prevent them from caring for themselves properly.

Other Adults — Adults who are capable of making choices about how they'd like to live are not considered adults in need of protection, even if their personal hygiene becomes poor or their housekeeping drops off. If they have no physical problems, are mentally competent, and are capable of looking after themselves, the Adult Protection Act does not consider them to be in need of protection.

Reporting Process — If you know of an adult in need of protection, you must report it immediately to the Department of Health by calling 1-800-225-7225. An adult protection worker will assess the situation. If, after the assessment, the worker believes that the person you have reported does need protection, the department will begin a more detailed investigation. If the adult is found to need protection, the worker will provide services to help.

Financial Abuse — The Adult Protection Act does not cover situations of financial abuse. However, if financial abuse is discovered during an Adult Protection investigation, the adult will be referred to an authority who can help safeguard their financial interests.

Physiotherapists

Physiotherapy is the health care profession dedicated to enhancing and restoring mobility. Physiotherapists have the education, the applied knowledge and treatment techniques to help seniors improve and maintain their physical mobility and independence.

Physiotherapists are primary care professionals (just like doctors and dentists) meaning you can go directly to a physiotherapist without a doctor's referral. Physiotherapists provide health care to seniors in many different settings including hospitals, private clinics, long-term care facilities, seniors complexes, or your own home.

Physiotherapy treatment provided in hospital settings in Nova Scotia is covered by MSI, however funding varies when services are offered outside a hospital. Many (but not all) private insurance policies cover physiotherapy services.

To inquire about seeing a physiotherapist, look in the yellow pages of your telephone directory or contact your community hospital.

Podiatrists and Chiropodists (Foot Care)

These specialists treat all types of foot disorders. Their services are not covered by MSI; however, most private and employer health plans, and some government agencies will partly or totally cover the cost. You do not need a physician's referral. Your physician can tell you if a chiropodist or podiatrist is a certified member of a recognized association (such as the Maritime Association of Certified Chiropodists-Podiatrists).

For a list of practitioners in your area, look in the yellow pages of your phone book under the heading *Podiatrists*.

Pre-Planning Your Affairs

The period following a death is a highly emotional one. Some pre-planning can spare your friends and family from confusion, worry, some agonizing decisions, and legal entanglements. Do you know where your important papers and documents are located? If you don't, it is unlikely that your survivors will be able to find them either.

Important Documents — Your immediate family or friends should be entrusted with the location of your personal documents. This matter is best done by preparing a list of your most important documents, and keeping them in one location. You should include these documents in your record: birth certificate, social insurance number, will, insurance policies, mortgages, deeds, tax bills, leases, debts, and bank accounts.



Preparing for an Expected Death at Home

A brochure is available on the Department of Health website at www.gov.ns.ca/health/reports.htm to assist persons who are preparing for an expected death at home. It has two sections: the first is written for the person who is terminally ill; the second will help family, friends, and others understand what is happening to their loved one during the last days and hours of life.

Funeral Arrangements

When someone dear to you dies, it is important to find out his/her instructions concerning funeral arrangements and bequeathing the body for medical research or organ donation. Funeral arrangements can be very expensive. Ask for detailed estimates before committing yourself, and try to cut costs by eliminating the items you consider to be least important. Cremation is one available alternative.

In situations where there is little or no money for funeral expenses, assistance may be available through the Nova Scotia Department of Community Services.

Death Benefits

Several pension plans include survivor benefits. All sources of income for the deceased should be checked to see what provisions are made for survivors. Because of the way pensions and annuities are treated under the Income Tax Act, it is important for a surviving spouse to examine all options. Plans to consider are: Old

Age Security, Canada Pension Plan Death Benefit, Surviving Spouse's Benefit, Dependent Childrens' Pension, and any private pension plans, i.e. military pensions, company and/or other work related plans. If you need assistance with this, consult an accountant.


