Integrated Fruit Production

IFP is a systems approach to apple production which promotes environmental sustainability, economic viability and social responsibility



Important Principles

- IFP emphasizes pesticide reduction
- IFP is a process
- IFP provides measureables and traceability (= credibility)
- IFP is dynamic
- IFP requires strong partnerships





Objectives of the National IFP Guidelines for Apples

- Supply packers with quality fruit produced under world-class, nationally endorsed IFP standards
- Assure retailers and consumers that Canadian apple producers are leaders in integrated pest management, food safety, and environmental responsibility
- Increase consumption of Canadian apples and ensure continued access to export markets

- Integrated Pest Management
- Land Stewardship
- Best Management Practices
- Record Keeping
- On-Farm Food Safety
- On-going Learning





On-Farm Food Safety Component

To reassure and maintain a high level of consumer confidence through:

- Awareness
- Implementation of GAPs
- Identification of potential hazards
- Documentation
