Based on the concept of learning through play, these multi-sensory, interactive programs promote students' awareness of themselves and others. As students take on the roles of market vendors, postal carriers and builders, they work together to help bring goods to the community.

Students take a trip around the world as they experience a number of cultural celebrations held at this time of year. With passports in hand, they discover universal themes such as food, games, decorations, clothing, music and dance and learn how festivities such as *Divali*, *Los Posados* and *Loi Krathong* are celebrated.

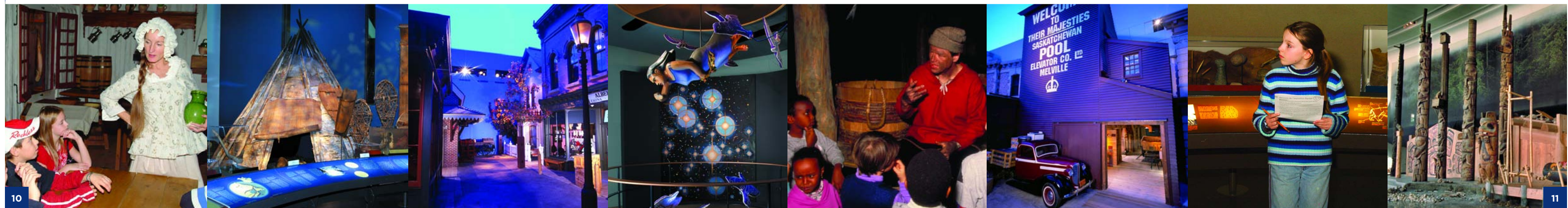
The First Peoples of Canada

This Year's Theme: Canada's Changing Role in Afghanistan

On the morning of September 11, 2001, terrorist attacks on the United States killed over 3,000 people, including 25 Canadians. Canada responded in October 2001 by joining an American-led invasion of Afghanistan, which had sheltered and supported many of those responsible.

The student's original work should explore how Canada's presence in Afghanistan has changed in the past five years. Some questions to consider: Are Canadian interests served by the ongoing military mission? How has it affected Canadians at home and internationally? How have the Afghan people responded?

This exhibition looks at Canada's participation in the international security mission in Afghanistan — Canada's most visible, most dangerous and one of the most significant military actions since the Korean War. Journalist Stephen Thorne's photos, news articles and experiences provide glimpses of Canada's involvement in the "war on terror", and in rebuilding a country shattered by years of war. The exhibition also shows no one has been more affected by the war than the Afghans themselves, and no one is more actively involved in the rebuilding effort. *An exhibition by the Canadian War Museum featuring the photographs of Stephen Thorne.*

Impacts: The Battle of the St. Lawrence (Working title) (December 22, 2006 to April 15, 2007)

In the middle of the Second World War, a German submarine sinks a Canadian ship. But the attack does not occur in the mid-Atlantic, or along the shores of Europe. It happens here in the heart of Canada's Gulf of St. Lawrence. Over a period of two years, German U-boats will infest the River and the Gulf, sinking more than 20 ships. Witness their impact on Canada's small east coast communities. The war is on their doorstep. *A traveling exhibition jointly created by the Naval Museum of Quebec and the Musée de la Gaspésie.*

War Brides (Working Title) (May 13, 2007 to January 6, 2008)

At the end of the Second World War, nearly 48,000 European women, mainly from Great Britain, traveled across the Atlantic to begin new lives in post-war Canada. They are known as war brides, a generation of young women who fell in love and married Canadian service personnel during the war. Inspired by her own mother's experience as a war bride, contemporary artist Beverley Tosh tells personal stories collected from war brides who settled across Canada. This intimate exhibition features original artworks, artifacts, photographs, and letters evoking these women's personal accounts of romance, adventure and their Canadian journey. *An exhibition by the Canadian War Museum presented in collaboration with Beverley Tosh.*

Arrival
