Area 3

Above average returns were forecasted for Nass sockeye. Available commercial fishery surplus after Nisga'a Treaty obligations is 300,000 to 400,000 sockeye. Pink return expected to be average.

In Season Management

Nass sockeye and pink returns were moderate.

□ Skeena sockeye returns were poor.

First Gill net opening (June 7) with 150 vessels participating.
 Peak Gill net fleet (July 11) with 421 vessels.

A3 GN In season management cont'd

July 11, ribbon boundary around Wales Island to reduce incidental Gn Chum catch.

□ July 12 & 28: ribbon boundary extended to include the Pearse Island shore.

Total of 16 openings for 3,968 vessel operating days compared to the ten year average of 27 openings and 3,890 vessel operating days.

Gill net fishing terminated July 29 in Area 3 as catches of Nass sockeye decreased and Area 3 chum escapements became a concern.

A3 Sn In Season Management

First Seine opening occurred July 11 with 22 vessels participating.

On July 18, A3 opened to Coho Ret. for the duration of the season as a result of improved Coho returns to A3 and the acknowledgement that outside A3 (Skeena Coho area) would not likely open because of poor Skeena returns.

July 18 & 21, seines permitted to retain chum because of high catches . This was a test to see what was better fishing 2 days per week retention or 4 days non-retention.

After the 21st in order to harvest pink and sockeye it was decided to fish 4 days a week non-retention. A3 SN In Season Management cont'd Peak Seine fishing took place July 28 & 29 with 39 seines actively fishing.

August 22 - Last seine pink fishery.

Total of 18 openings for 436 VOD's compared to the ten Year avg. of 21 openings and 944 Vessel operating days.
Area 3 Results:

□ Total hailed net catch of 181,239 Sockeye and 2,499,501 Pinks compared to the ten year average of 471,889 Sockeye and 2,186,683 Pinks. (odd 5 yr. avg.)

■ The net catch of Coho was 43,744 for seines & 4,008 for gill nets.

Area 4 Skeena River Gill Net Chinook fishery:

June 10 & 11 for 30 hours, 98 GN for a total catch of 851 Chinook.

June 17 & 18 for 18 hours, 101 GN for a total catch of 909 Chinook.

Total Chinook catch for the two openings was recorded at 1,760 pieces.

Generally poor Chinook fishing due to low returns of Chinook to the Skeena River.

Area 4 Sockeye:

Area 4 was closed to Gill Nets and Seines due to Low sockeye figures past the Skeena Tyee Test fishery.

Gill net ten year average of 11 Openings, 6,599 Vessel operating days and 791,137 Sockeye.

Seine ten year average of 10 Openings, 442 Vessel operating days, 303,011 Sockeye and 597,031 last 5 odd year Pinks. Area 5 Area 5 pink returns were expected to be good with a surplus of 0.5 million.

Area 5 chum returns were expected to be very poor.

In Season Management

No gill net opportunities due to lower than expected returns of sockeye to the Skeena River.

First Seine opening delayed until August 8 due to Skeena sockeye. Non-retention sockeye as well as coho, chum and chinook.

Peak Seine fleet occurred on August 15 with 10 vessels taking part.

A5 In Season Management cont'd □ Local area pinks were below forecast.

Poor Skeena sockeye and good Skeena Pink returns.

Last Seine opening August 22.

Total of 6 openings for 31 Vessel operating days compared to the ten year average of 14 openings and 101 vessel operating days.

Total catch of 191,219 pinks compared to the ten year average 239,724 pinks. (5 odd year average).

Area 6 In Season Management

Area 6 Pink returns were expected to be good with a surplus of 3.5 million.

A forecast of weak wild Chum and a small surplus of Kitimat enhanced Chums.

First Gill net fishery took place (July 11) with one vessel actively taking part.

Hatchery chum returns much better than forecasted.

Peak Gill net fleet for total area was 153 vessels on July 25.

A6 In-Season Management cont'd

I (August 1) Foche and Giltoyees boundary change due to Wild chum stock concerns.

(August 1) Dala and Kildala boundary change due to Wild chum stock concerns.

(August 1) Kitimat Arm boundary extended up to Wathslo Creek in order to harvest hatchery surplus.

Total of 16 Gn openings for 1,396 Vessel operating days compared to the last 10 year average of 17 Openings and 499 Vessel operating days.

□ The last Area 6 Gill net opening occurred on August 9th.

A6 Sn In-Season Management

July 11, First Seine opening with non-retention Coho, Chum,
Chinook and steelhead.

The season was dominated by strong return of Pinks, better than forecasted returns of hatchery chum and a continued wild chum conservation concern.

Peak Seine effort in Area 6 occurred (July 21) with 70 vessels.

July 18, Coho retention was in effect for both Gill net and Seine. As per the pre-season plan good returns seen along with reduced commercial troll time.

Total catch for Douglas channel was 7,270 Chums & 245,601 pinks from a total of 11 Openings of which 7 had any recorded effort.

A6 Sn In-Season Management (Gil Island)

July 18, Gil Island fishery/retention chum- due to high incidental chum catch.

July 18 & 21 large fleets/fishing time was reduced by half. Returned to non-retention chum to increase fishing time to harvest pinks.

July 28, Chum catches high/retention permitted for the last 6 hours of the opening and the next day with reduced time to minimize impact on chum.

All fisheries following July 29 were non-retention chum.

A6 Sn In-Season Management cont'd

July 29, Eagle Bay fishery opened for two hours to harvest surplus pinks migrating through to the Kildala arm. ~ 42,000 pinks were harvested.

Total of 18 openings for 589 Vessel operating days compared to the ten year average of 9 Openings and 189 Vessel operating days.

August 15, Last Seine fishery.

A6 In-Season Management Results

Total Gn catch was 146,401 Chums compared to the ten year average of 81,007.

□ The Coho Gill net catch was 1,363 pcs.

Total hailed Seine catch of 4,510,843 Pinks and 86,759 Chums compared to the last five odd year average of 1,355,652 and ten year average of 81,642 Chums.

□ The Coho catch for seines was 35,949 pieces.
