How to collect your ants:

- Look for ants in ant hills, under rocks or around rotting logs.
- Use the spoon to put ants into a plastic bag. Look for an extra-large ant, the queen. Close the bag.
- Search for white ant eggs, cocoons, and larvae. Put them into a plastic bag and close it.
- Put some soil in the glass jar. The soil will make the ants feel at home.
- If your parents will let you, put the bag of ants in the refrigerator for half an hour or so. The cool air will slow the ants down before you move them to the glass jar.
