

Crown Land Fuelwood

Are you looking for fuelwood?

Here are four different ways that you can harvest some from Crown land.

A permit is required.



Wood is subject to availability. All options may not be available in all regions. Check your local Natural Resources office to learn what is available in your area.

Roadside Cleanup

You can clean up fuelwood from roadside slash left after logging operations. (This includes tops, broken pieces, undersized trees, etc.)

Volume limits may apply.

The permit holder must be on site when harvesting occurs.

Cost: \$20

Fuelwood Cleanup



You can harvest fuelwood in low volume areas. These areas are selected by Natural Resources.

Each household is limited to 14 cubic metres (approximately seven cords) each year.

The permit is issued to the householder.

He or she must be on site when harvesting occurs.

He or she is responsible for the harvest and removal of wood.

Wood is provided on an "as is, where is" basis.

Cost: \$20

Contractors

Private contractors can cut fuelwood for resale.

Harvest areas are selected by Natural Resources.

The standing wood is then sold by tender or public auction.

The successful bidder will be given a permit. He or she will be responsible for:

- accessing
- harvesting
- selling
- delivery

The market price will be set by the contractor.

Cost: By tender

You can harvest from Crown fuelwood stands.

The permit holder must be on site when harvesting occurs.

Each household is limited to 14 cubic metres (approximately seven cords) each year.

The permit is issued to the householder. He or she must be on site when harvesting occurs.

He or she is responsible for the harvest and removal of wood.

Wood is provided on an “as is, where is” basis.

Cost: \$9.59 per cubic metre

Contractors

Selected areas will be advertised for tender.

Other Options

Contact Natural Resources for:

- a map of fuelwood locations
- a permit

Other Facts

All permits expire March 31.

HST is charged on all fuelwood sales.

Anyone wishing to buy fuelwood on a delivered basis must contact a successful contractor. A list is available from your local Natural Resources office.

The permit holder must ensure all permit conditions are met.

Harvesting is carried out at the sole risk of the permit holder.
