

Sussex North district Canada in the World Community

The Sussex North district serves as an avenue that shows visitors the international face of Canada. As a scenic touring experience, visitors see official residences, embassies and high commissions. At its western edge, Rideau Hall, residence of the Governor General, a powerful symbol of our State, welcomes and is open to visitors, inviting them to walk the grounds. A short distance away, the Canada and the World Pavilion is a major attraction that highlights Canadians' work and contributions on the world stage. Together, these sites provide a dynamic programming node. Because of its distance from the ByWard district, this area is made more amenable to visitors by the addition of services and facilities.

There are wonderful windows into the landscape in this area: scenic lookouts, pathways along the river, and parks. Future plans include exploring non-motorized access such as boat, bicycle, horse and carriage, and people movers that encourage visitors to come and experience the area in a more leisurely way. There are some visitor amenities such as cafés or street vendors.

Future programming for the Sussex North district

- A discovery pathway encourages visitors to explore the appealing green spaces and lookouts in this district.
 Maps and signage highlight routes for the more adventurous traveller. Picnickers are encouraged to visit the Rideau Falls.
- Live performances at the Canada and the World Pavilion and Rideau Hall invite visitors to relax in these special spaces. Public activities relate to international themes, and highlight Canada's roles in the international community.
- An international garden complements the theme of Canada and the World.
 This is an area where family programming related to green spaces and gardening can be offered. The international community in Ottawa is encouraged to host special days.
- Public activities, cafés and vendors enliven the main floor and plaza areas of the old Ottawa City Hall building allowing visitors to enjoy the architecture and outstanding natural setting.
- Innovative transportation methods bring people to the area without their cars, and accommodate tours of the area that link sites that are too far apart to access by foot.
