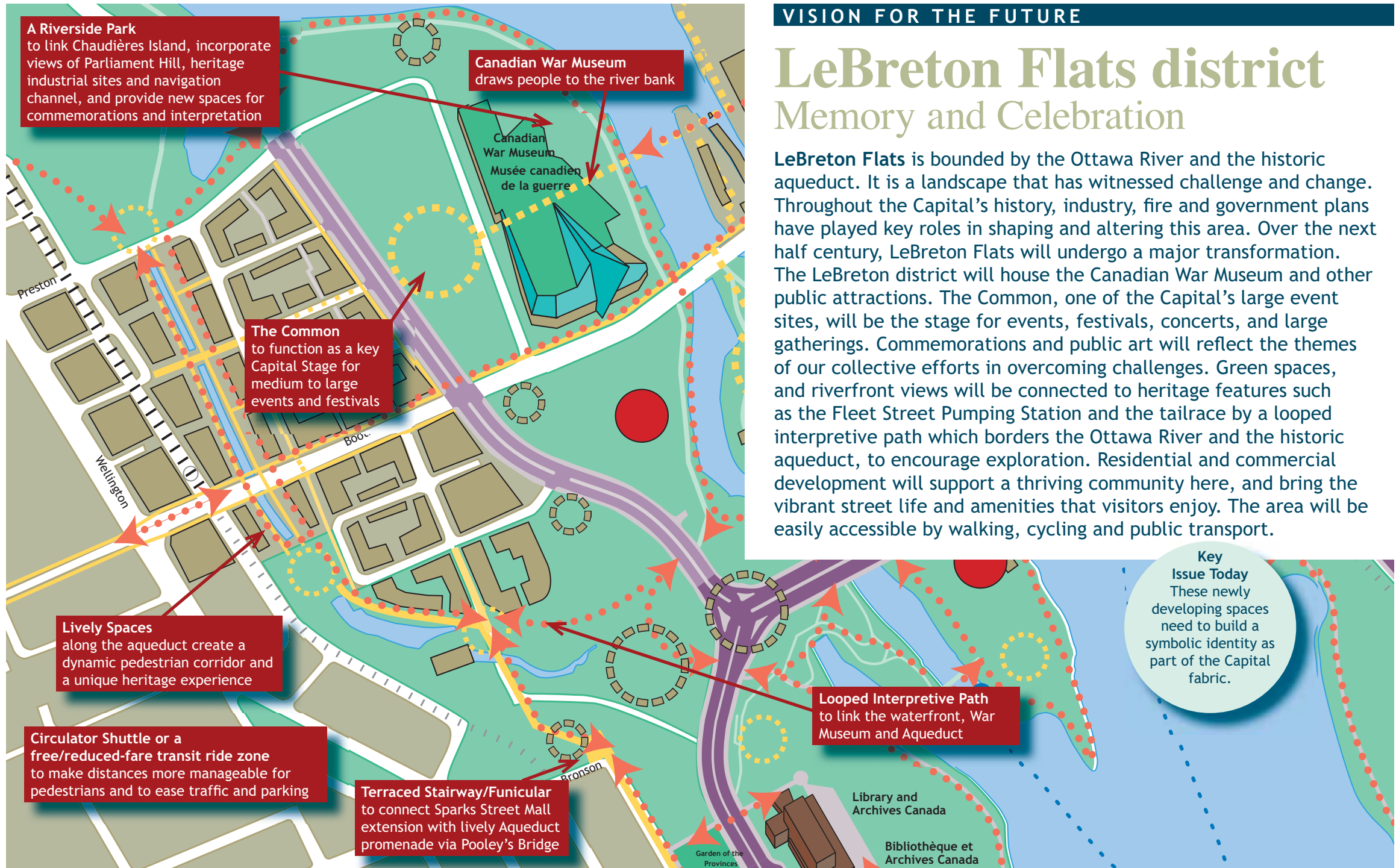


LeBreton Flats district

Memory and Celebration

LeBreton Flats is bounded by the Ottawa River and the historic aqueduct. It is a landscape that has witnessed challenge and change. Throughout the Capital's history, industry, fire and government plans have played key roles in shaping and altering this area. Over the next half century, LeBreton Flats will undergo a major transformation. The LeBreton district will house the Canadian War Museum and other public attractions. The Common, one of the Capital's large event sites, will be the stage for events, festivals, concerts, and large gatherings. Commemorations and public art will reflect the themes of our collective efforts in overcoming challenges. Green spaces, and riverfront views will be connected to heritage features such as the Fleet Street Pumping Station and the tailrace by a looped interpretive path which borders the Ottawa River and the historic aqueduct, to encourage exploration. Residential and commercial development will support a thriving community here, and bring the vibrant street life and amenities that visitors enjoy. The area will be easily accessible by walking, cycling and public transport.

Future programming at LeBreton Flats district

- The Canadian War Museum features outside displays, and grounds that support military demonstrations and ceremonies.
- The Common – a new Capital stage – offers festivals and program attractions and might offer a site for major events such as Winterlude.
- The aqueduct welcomes picnickers and sports enthusiasts with its trails and visitor amenities.
- Green spaces are highlighted through paths, maps and viewing points.
- Interpretive panels or kiosks highlight the importance of the Ottawa River to the development of this landscape.
