WHAT YOU SHOULD KNOW

On this hilltop overlooking the Ottawa River, parliamentarians gather to make the laws of the land. The Parliament Buildings — which include the Centre Block, East Block and West Block — house the Senate and the House of Commons chambers, the Library of Parliament, and offices for parliamentarians and staff. Construction began on these buildings in 1859, and today they are among the finest examples of Gothic Revival architecture in North America.


May 17 to September 4, 2006: the Info-Tent, a large white tent between Centre Block and West Block

September 5, 2006 to May 15, 2007: the Visitor Welcome Centre (entrance located under the Peace Tower in Centre Block) NOTE: The schedule, duration and content of all tours and activities are subject to change without notice.

All visitors to the Parliament Buildings will be required to go through security scanning stations. Lineups are to be expected and we recommend that you allow extra time.

Vehicles on the Hill

Only authorized vehicles are permitted on Parliament Hill. Municipal and public parking lots are located nearby.





Guided Tour Reservations

Groups of 10 or more visitors must book tours in advance (details listed by activity). Otherwise, tickets are issued on the day of the tour on a first-come, first-served basis, starting at 9 am. The number of tickets for each day is limited; unfortunately, tours cannot be guaranteed on any given day.

You may obtain same-day tickets at the Info-Tent in summer and at the Visitor Welcome Centre (in Centre Block) during the rest of the year.

INDOOR TOURS AND ACTIVITIES

Schedules and tours of Centre Block vary — sometimes without notice — according to the time and the day on which you choose to visit, especially when Parliament is in session. Tours are shorter and do not go to the Senate and House of Commons chambers when they are in use. Tours are not offered in the times surrounding Question Period. Instead, visitors may watch the debates or listen to audio guides in the Public Galleries of both the Senate and the House of Commons, subject to space availability. 
