What's New?

Provincial Coordination Plan for an Influenza Pandemic

Earlier this month, Emergency Management Ontario released the *Provincial Coordination Plan for Influenza Pandemic* (PCPIP). This plan supports the Ontario Health Plan for an Influenza Pandemic (OHPIP) and addresses pandemic planning issues that focus on maintaining critical infrastructure in communities across the province.

The PCPIP is written in accordance with the Provincial Emergency Response Plan (PERP) and reinforces that emergency preparedness and response begins with the individual community.

Operational Plan During an Avian Influenza Outbreak in the Domestic Poultry Population(s)

As we shared in the last two issues of the *Pandemic Planner*, the ministry has been working on an operational plan to support and guide a health response to avian influenza in the domestic poultry population.

This plan complements both the Foreign Animal Disease Emergency Response Plan (FADERP) and the Ministry of Health and Long-Term Care Emergency Response Plan (MERP).

Local Planning Profiles Perth District Health Unit

On October 2, 2006, Perth County's first-ever interagency pandemic plan was released by the Perth District Health Unit (PDHU). The plan was developed through the hard work and dedication of key representatives from the local health care sector, the municipality, social service agencies and first responders.

Recognizing the importance of pandemic planning and readiness, the *Perth County Influenza Pandemic Plan* focuses on public health measures, surveillance, vaccination and communications. It also outlines key roles and responsibilities for the many different sectors that are critical to maintaining resources and infrastructure.

As part of a broader preparedness strategy, the PDHU is focusing efforts on public awareness campaigns that include personal hygiene (hand washing, cough/sneeze etiquette, etc.) and the difference between seasonal influenza ("flu") and influenza pandemic – a very common misconception in the general public.

The health unit has also developed an awareness campaign specifically tailored to rural and farming communities – a unique approach to planning and awareness. We encourage you to visit the health unit's web site at: <u>http://www.pdhu.on.ca/</u>

Elgin St. Thomas Health Unit

In June 2006, the Elgin St. Thomas Health Unit released its first pandemic plan – the *Elgin St. Thomas Pandemic Influenza Plan Preliminary Report Version 1.0.* This plan is serving as the framework for building pandemic planning, readiness and response in the community.

Through the Health Emergency Advisory Group, the health unit brings together key representatives from a wide-range of organizations and



facilities, including social services, hospitals, first responders, family physicians, funeral services providers and pharmacists. In addition to providing input into the pandemic planning process, the group acts as a forum for discussion and advice on sector specific plans.

The health unit's approach focuses on community responsibility. It encourages sector planning to address infrastructure need. It is also committed to engaging the public in the planning and preparedness process through hosting public information forums. Spruce Hill Lodge Pandemic Planning

Spruce Hill Lodge is a retirement residence in South Porcupine. It has taken a proactive approach to pandemic planning and preparedness by stocking up on food supplies as well as personal protective equipment, including gloves, gowns and masks. It also has a generator to keep the facility operational in times of emergency.

The Lodge is also planning ahead for resources and support by working with family members to determine in advance who can care for their loved one, and who can volunteer to assist in the facility during an emergency.

The Lodge encourages other health care facilities to recognize the importance of pandemic planning in the community and is a member of the Timmins Regional Pandemic Planning Committee.

Influenza Pandemic Exercises

An important part of pandemic preparedness is testing plans through collaborative exercises. A number of communities across Ontario are working together to do just that!

- On October 12, 2006, Toronto Public Health tested its pandemic plan through organizing and facilitating a pandemic exercise;
- On October 23, 2006, the Regional Municipality of York held its influenza pandemic exercise: "Operation Flu Ready"; and
- On December 8, 2006, the County of Simcoe and the District of Muskoka are jointly planning a large scale influenza pandemic exercise.

Seasonal Influenza:

The first limited quantity of the seasonal influenza vaccine was distributed in early October to long-term care homes and hospitals for the immunization of high-risk persons. As more vaccine becomes available, additional shipments will be delivered to health care providers across the province. Vaccination clinics will be held by health units and open to the general public mid-late November.
