

Avian (Bird) Influenza: Fact Sheet # 1 Health Information

Currently there is a very low risk of getting avian influenza in the Northwest Territories.

What is avian influenza?

Avian influenza is a contagious viral infection that can affect all species of birds, and less commonly, infect mammals such as pigs and humans.

Can people get avian influenza?

Avian influenza does not typically infect people. However, some subtypes of the type A virus, such as H5N1, H7N7, H7N3 and H9N2, have occasionally caused illness in people. Specific variants of H5N1 have been associated with the most serious illnesses in people.

What are the symptoms of avian influenza?

The symptoms of avian influenza can range from typical flu-like illness (fever, sore throat, cough and body aches), to pneumonia, difficulty breathing and other serious complications that can result in death.

Is there a vaccine?

Currently, there is no vaccine to prevent H5N1 infection. Researchers are in the process of developing a vaccine, but it is difficult to say when it will be available.
