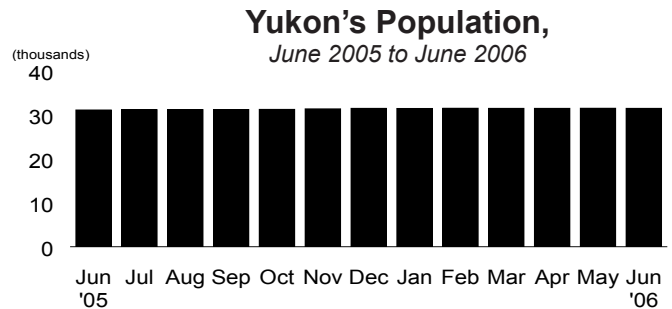


The most current statistics available on the state of the Yukon's economy

1. Population

The Yukon's population as of June 2006 was **31,608**. One year ago, in June 2005, the population was **31,222**. The difference is an **increase of 386** individuals, or **1.2%**, in the Yukon's population. (See page 3 for more detail.)



2. Employment

The number of people employed in the Yukon as of September 2006 was **15,400** (seasonally adjusted). This is an increase of 300 from the September 2005 figure and a decrease of 100 from the August 2006 figure.

The seasonally adjusted unemployment rate in the Yukon as of September 2006 was **4.9%**. One year ago in September 2005, the rate was **5.0%**. (See page 4 for more detail.)



3. Inflation

The annual rate of inflation in Whitehorse (figures are not available for the Yukon) was **1.8%** as of August 2006. The annual *average* inflation rate in Whitehorse for 2005 was **2.2%**. (See page 6 for more detail.)

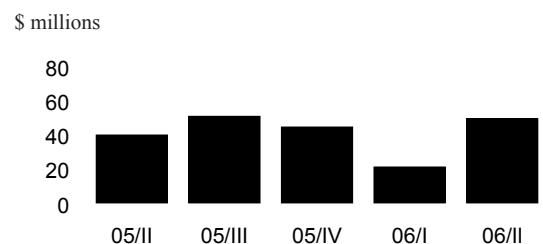
4. Rental Units

The median rent (half the rents are higher and half the rents are lower) in Whitehorse as of September 2006 was **\$675**. This is the same as June 2006. The vacancy rate for Whitehorse as of September 2006 was **3.3%**. This is 1.3 percentage points higher than for June 2006. (See page 7 for more detail.)

5. Real Estate

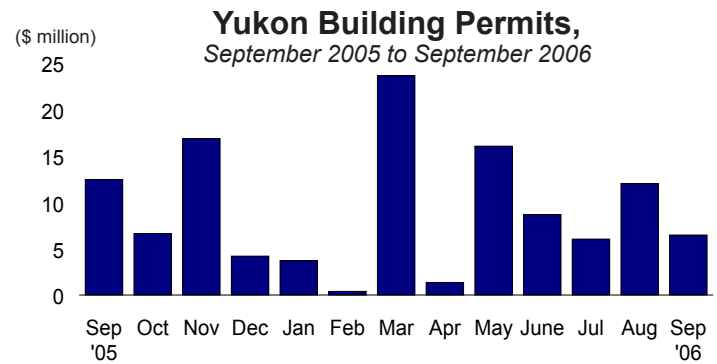
The total value of real estate transactions in the Yukon for the second quarter of 2006 (April, May and June) was \$49,191,000. This is an **increase of \$9,455,100, or 23.8%**, from the second quarter of 2005 (\$39,735,900). (See page 7 for more detail.)

Yukon's Real Estate Transactions, Second Quarter 2005 to Second Quarter 2006



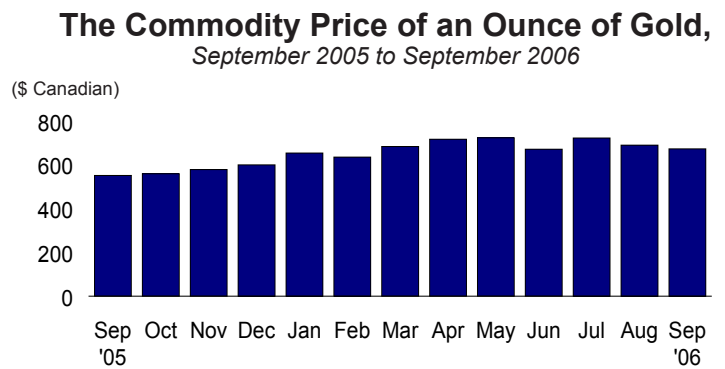
6. Construction

The value of building permits issued in the Yukon for September 2006 was **\$6,458,000**. One year ago, in September 2005, the value was **\$12,430,000**. The large increase in building permits in March 2006 was due in large part to permits issued for the Athletes' Village in Whitehorse. (See page 8 for more detail.)



7. Resources

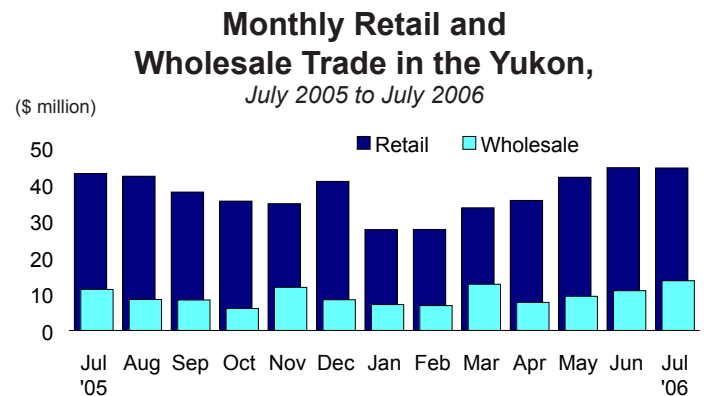
The commodity price in Canadian dollars for a troy ounce of gold was **\$671.13** as of September 29th, 2006 on the London Exchange. One year ago the commodity price was **\$549.66**. The difference is an **increase of \$121.47, or 22.1%**, in the commodity price of a troy ounce of gold. (See page 9 for more detail.)



8. Retail & Wholesale Trade

The preliminary value of retail trade in the Yukon for July 2006 was **\$44,499,000**. This figure is an **increase of \$1,514,000, or 3.5%**, from the value of retail trade one year earlier, in July 2005.

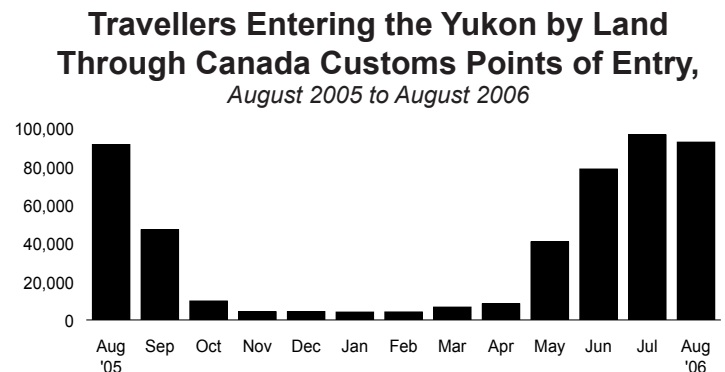
Comparing preliminary value for July 2006 with the July 2005, wholesale sales have **increased by \$2,374,000, or 21.1%**, from **\$11,246,000 to \$13,620,000**. (See page 10 for more detail.)



9. Travellers

The number of travellers entering the Yukon by land at Canada Customs points of entry in August 2006 was **92,509**. This is an **increase of 1,309 travellers, or 1.4%**, from the August 2005 figure of **91,200**.

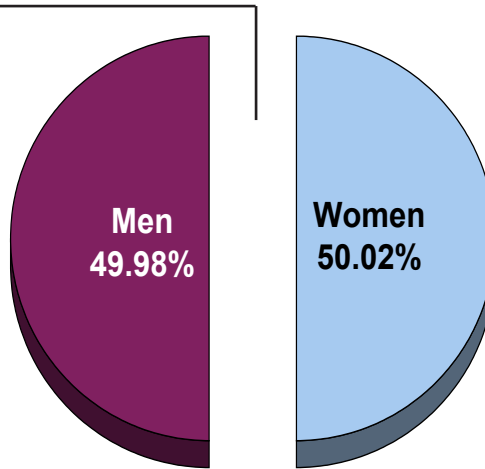
The number of travellers from January to August 2006 was **329,351** compared with 320,741 for the same time period in 2005. This represents an **increase of 8,610 people, or 2.7%**. (See page 11 for more detail.)

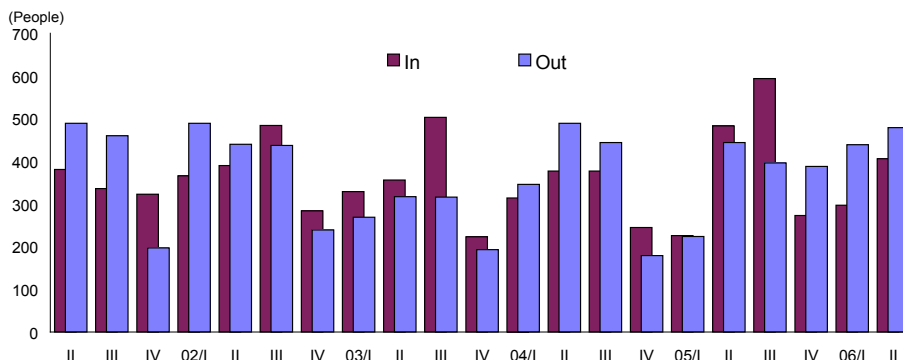

1.1 The June 2006 population of the Yukon was 31,608. Of the 31,608 people residing in the Yukon, 50.02% were females and 49.98% were males. Persons under the age of 15 accounted for 18.2% of the population, while 7.4% of the population was aged 65 or over.

1.2 In June of 2006, 74.8% of the Yukon's population lived in the City of Whitehorse. Between June 2005 and June 2006, the largest percentage decrease was in the community of Beaver Creek, which decreased by 12 people or 10.0%. Nine Yukon communities showed increases in population from June 2005 to June 2006.

1.3 In June 2006, preliminary estimates show 8 more births (38) and eight fewer deaths (13) compared to June 2005.

1.4 Migration statistics for the Yukon show that for the second quarter of 2006 the number of in-migrants was 406, compared to out-migrants of 479. For the second quarter of 2006, the Yukon experienced a net loss of 73 people.

2. Employment*

- 2.1 Comparing September 2006 with September 2005, the following changes can be seen:

- The labour force increased by 300, or 1.9%, to 16,200.
- The number of employed Yukoners increased by 300, or 2.0%, at 15,400.
- The number of unemployed Yukoners remained the same at 800.
- The unemployment rate decreased by 0.1 percentage points, to 4.9%.

- 2.2 In the month of September 2006, the Yukon's rate of unemployment (4.9%) was 1.5 percentage points lower than the rate for Canada (6.4%). In September 2005, Yukon's unemployment rate was 1.7 percentage points lower than the rate for Canada.

- 2.3 Comparing preliminary figures for June 2006 with the figures for June 2005, the following changes in government employment in the Yukon have occurred:

- Total government employment increased by 164, or 3.0%.
- Federal government employment decreased by 21, or 3.2%.
- Territorial general government employment increased by 113, or 2.8%.
- Territorial Health & Social Services increased by 9, or 2.7%.

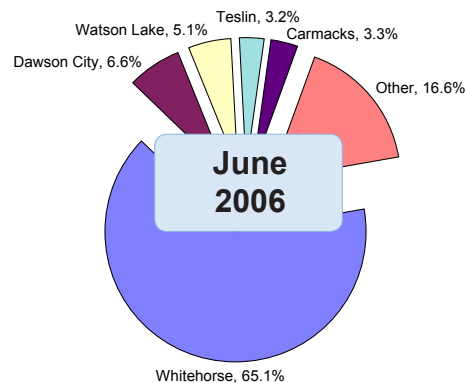

2.4 Comparing preliminary figures for July 2006 with July 2005, the following changes in average weekly earnings can be seen:

- Average weekly wages for the Yukon increased \$10.89, or 1.3%.
- Goods-producing industry wages increased \$93.78, or 9.1%.
- Construction industry wages increased \$61.90, or 6.6%.
- Service-producing industry wages decreased \$5.13, or 0.6%.
- Trade industry wages decreased \$9.36, or 1.6%.
- Public administration wages decreased \$9.09, or 0.9%.
- Transportation and warehousing wages decreased \$9.98 or 1.1%.
- Accommodation and food services wages decreased \$19.43, or 3.8%.

2.5 Employment Insurance claims in the Yukon decreased 1.5% from May to June 2006. In Whitehorse, EI claims decreased by 1.3%.

2.6 Looking at the different types of employment insurance benefits and comparing July 2006 with July 2005, the following changes are apparent:

- Total beneficiaries decreased 90, or 10.6%.
- Regular beneficiaries decreased 100, or 16.4%.
- Sickness beneficiaries decreased 10, or 20.0%.
- Maternity beneficiaries increased 20, or 40.0%.
- Parental beneficiaries remained the same at 130.
- Training beneficiaries remained the same at 0.

3. Consumer Prices

- 3.1 The Consumer Price Index measures changes in prices, or what is usually referred to as inflation. Table 3.1 shows that as of August 2006 the annual rate of inflation in Whitehorse was 1.8% (This is 0.3 percentage points lower than the national rate). A year ago, in August 2005, the rate of inflation in Whitehorse was 2.6%.

(The annual average inflation rate in Whitehorse for 2005 was 2.2%.)

- 3.2 According to the Consumer Price Index, overall food prices in Whitehorse in August 2006 decreased by 0.1% when compared with the previous month. Comparing August 2006 to August 2005, overall food prices increased 1.3%. During this same time period, for selected food items purchased from stores, fresh fruit had the largest increase, at 14.4%.

- 3.3 The Community Spatial Price Index compares prices in Whitehorse to prices in other Yukon communities. In April 2006, prices in Teslin were the closest to Whitehorse prices, Teslin being 4.2% higher. The highest prices of the communities surveyed were found in Watson Lake (17.5% higher than Whitehorse).

4. Rental Units

- 4.1 Comparing September 2006 to September 2005, median rents in Whitehorse have changed in the following ways:
 - The overall median rent in Whitehorse remained the same at \$675.
 - In Granger the median rent decreased \$37, or 5.5%.
 - In Hillcrest the median rent increased \$20, or 2.9%.
 - In Porter Creek the median rent decreased \$15, or 2.3%.
 - In Riverdale the median rent increased \$25, or 3.7%.
 - In Takhini the median rent rose \$30, or 5.7%.
 - In Watson Lake the median rent remained the same at \$595.

5. Real Estate*

- 5.1 Comparing second quarter 2006 figures with second quarter 2005, real estate transactions have:
 - increased \$9.5 million, or 23.8%, in the Yukon;
 - increased \$8.3 million, or 25.0%, in Whitehorse;
 - increased \$1.2 million, or 17.7%, in the areas outside of Whitehorse.
- 5.2 The average selling price for a single house in Whitehorse increased by \$36,400, or 18.2%, from the second quarter of 2005 (\$199,800) to the second quarter of 2006 (\$236,200)

6. Construction

- **6.1** For the Yukon, the total value of building permits issued in September 2006 (\$6,458,000) was \$5,972,000, or 48.0%, below the September 2005 figure of \$12,430,000.

Note: In addition to new dwelling units, residential permits issued include renovations, garages and additions. "Total permits" does not include plumbing or stove permits issued.

- **6.2** Comparing total residential permits issued in September 2006 with September 2005, the following changes have occurred in the Yukon:

- The number of permits issued for new dwelling units has decreased from 48 to 20.
- Other residential permits issued *(renovations, garages and additions) decreased from 188 to 111.

- **6.3** For Whitehorse, the total value of building permits issued in September 2006 (\$4,395,000) was \$4,586,000 or 51.1% above the September 2005 figure of \$8,982,000.

Note: Permits for September 2006 include 5 single family stick built residences, ten semi-detached residences, one detached garden suite and one mobile home re-placement. Commercial permits include a new 3-storey senior apartment with 17 dwelling units.

"Total permits" does not include plumbing or wood stove permits issued.

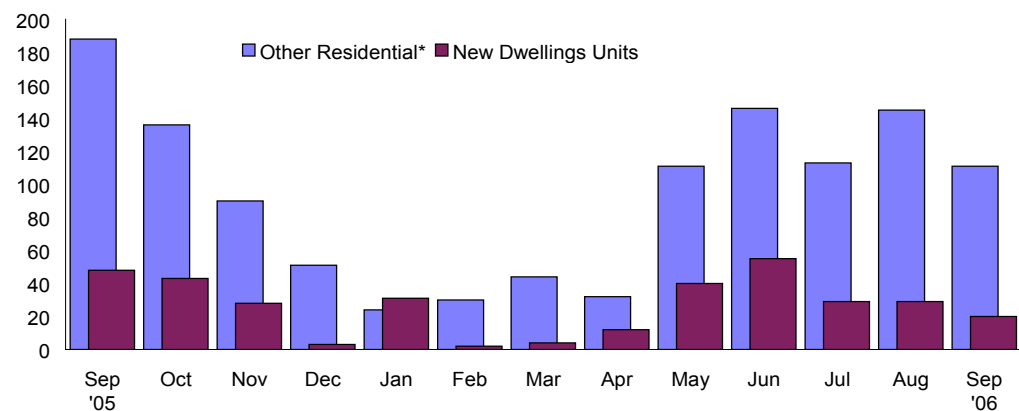

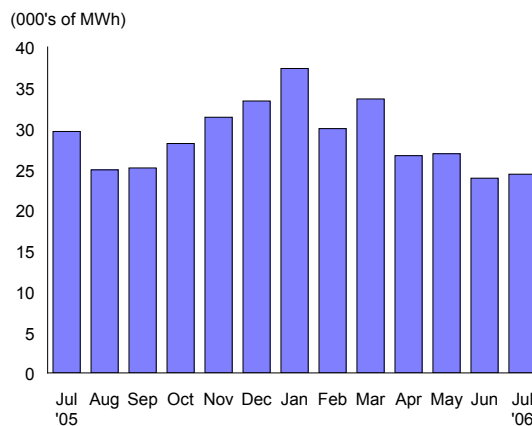

7.1 From September 2005 to September 2006, the metal commodity prices (in Canadian funds) have changed as follows:

- Gold increased \$121.47 per troy ounce, or 22.1%.
- Silver increased \$4.14 per troy ounce, or 47.3%.
- Lead increased 46 cents per kilogram, or 40.4%.
- Zinc increased \$2.11 per kilogram, or 128.7%.
- Copper increased \$3.89 per kilogram, or 84.9%.

7.2 & 7.3 Comparing July 2006 with July 2005, electricity generated in the Yukon has decreased from 29,631 MWh to 24,386 MWh. This represents a decrease of 5,245 MWh, or 17.7%.

7.4 Comparing figures for petroleum sales (m³) in June 2006 with sales figures for June 2005, the following changes have occurred:

- Total petroleum product sales decreased 10.4%.
- Aviation gasoline sales increased 0.8%. (Aviation turbo fuel sales increased 13.5%).
- Motor gasoline sales were down 27.1%.
- Diesel fuel oil sales decreased 6.0%.
- Light fuel oil sales increased 26.6%.

- 8.1** The preliminary value of retail trade for July 2006 was \$44,499,000. In July 2005, the value was \$42,985,000. Comparing July 2006 with July 2005, retail sales have increased by 1,514,000, or 3.5%.

- 8.2** Comparing preliminary figures for July 2006 with July 2005, wholesale sales increased by \$2,374,000, or 21.1%.

- 8.4** Comparing figures for September 2006 with September 2005, interest rates have changed as follows:

- The bank rate has increased 1.50 percentage points to 4.50%.
- The prime business rate has increased 1.50 percentage points to 6.00%.
- The conventional mortgage rate (5-year) has increased 0.90 percentage points to 6.70%.

- 8.5&8.6** Total preliminary restaurant, caterer and tavern receipts for July 2006 were \$3,435,400. This was down 254,600, or 6.9%, compared to the July 2005 figure of \$3,690,000.

On an annual basis, in 2005 total receipts totalled \$31,773,200. This was down \$4,984,500, or 13.6%, compared with the 2004 annual figure of \$36,757,700.

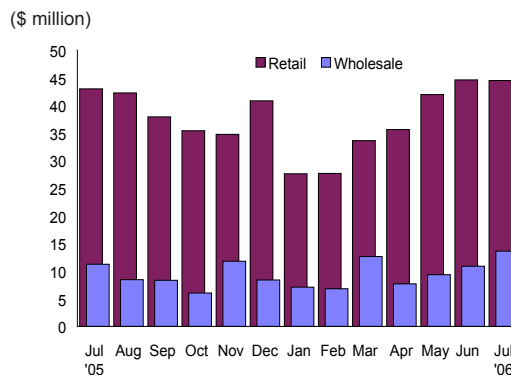

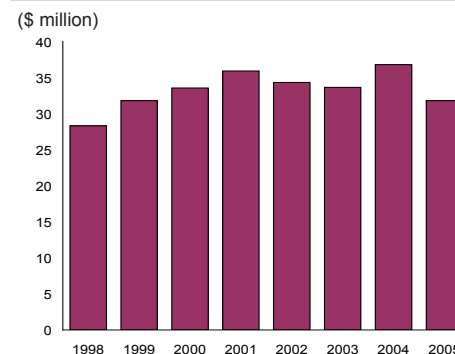

- 9.1 The number of visitors entering the Yukon by land from January to August 2006 was 329,351 compared with 320,741 for the same time period in 2005. This represents an increase of 8,610 people, or 2.7%.

Comparing August 2006 with August 2005, the following changes occurred:

- Total number of travellers increased by 1,309, or 1.4%.
- Yukon resident travellers decreased by 918, or 15.3%.

- 9.2 Comparing May 2006 with May 2005, the number of aircraft movements in Yukon communities has changed as follows:

- The number of aircraft into and out of Whitehorse increased by 358, or 10.0%.
- In Watson Lake, travel by aircraft increased by 62 flights, or 14.5%.
- In Dawson City, travel by aircraft decreased by 3 flights, or 0.8%.
- In Old Crow, travel by aircraft decreased by 13 flights, or 15.1%.

1. Population

- 1.2 'Other' includes communities such as Champagne, Elsa, Johnson's Crossing, Keno City, Stewart Crossing & Swift River. Increases in Marsh Lake population figures are attributable in part to the changing of postal addresses from Whitehorse to Marsh Lake.
- 1.4 Migration estimates are based on both international migrants into and out of the Yukon as well as interprovincial movement according to the Child Tax Benefit files (Canada Revenue Agency).

2. Employment

- 2.1 All Yukon figures from the Labour Force Survey are three-month moving averages based on 83% coverage.
- 2.1 Yukon figures are rounded to the nearest hundred; because of this, figures may not sum to totals.
- 2.3 Territorial general government employment includes employees of all Yukon Government departments, as well as employees of the Yukon Workers' Compensation Health & Safety Board, etc.
- 2.3 Territorial Health & Social Services includes employees at Whitehorse General Hospital, Alexander MacDonald Lodge, Children's Receiving Home and Assessment, Detoxification Centre, group homes, Norman D. Macaulay Lodge, Northern Network of Services, Copper Ridge Place and the Thomson Centre. Yukon Liquor Corp. and Yukon Development Corp./Yukon Energy Corp. are considered to be business enterprises and therefore employment figures are not included.
- 2.4 Yukon figures are for all employees, including overtime. Unclassified employees are excluded. As of June 2001, NAICS (North American Industrial Classification System) is used in lieu of the previous SIC (Standard Industrial Classification). Other NAICS categories are available by contacting YBS.
- 2.5 Yukon total includes some communities not listed. Claimants whose applications are pending are included.
- 2.6 The number of beneficiaries receiving total income benefits includes other types of benefits than those displayed, but excludes employment insurance claimants receiving employment and support measures benefits.

3. Consumer Prices

- 3.1 The Consumer Price Index (CPI) measures price changes over time but should not be used to compare costs between provinces and cities.

4. Rental Units

- 4.1 & 4.2 The Yukon Rental Survey covers all buildings with four or more units. Rentals with less than four units (such as houses, suites and duplexes) are excluded from the survey. Please note that June 2006 marks the first month that Dawson City has been included in the survey.

5. Real Estate

- 5.1 & 5.2 Rounded data may not sum to totals.

6. Construction

- 6.1 Rounded data may not sum to totals. Permits issued in the communities are totalled on a calendar month.
- 6.3 Special permits or permits for demolitions may have dollar values of zero. Whitehorse permits are reported for a thirty-day period from the sixteenth of one month to the fifteenth of the following month for which the totals are reported.

7. Resources

- 7.1 Canadian prices are based on the conversion of US prices using the 'noon' exchange rate at month-end by Bank of Canada. Prices of gold and silver are a.m. fix prices at month-end. Prices of lead, zinc and copper are London Metal Exchange "cash settlement and reference" prices at month-end.
- 7.4 'Total' includes other types of refined petroleum product sales. Domestic sales are by reporting companies, are exclusive of exports and sales to other reporting companies, and are adjusted for exports and imports by non-reporting companies.
- 7.4 'Aviation gasoline' includes all gasoline-type fuels for piston-type aircraft engines.

8. Trade

- 8.1 October 2005 marked the implementation of measures to reduce response burden in the Monthly Retail Trade Survey. Data previously collected via questionnaire for a number of simple retail establishments in the survey sample are now replaced with modelled estimates based on Goods and Services Tax (GST) returns. The model takes into account the sales to revenue relationship, as well as the time lag between the reference month for the survey and the reference period of the GST estimates. This change has had minimal impact on retail estimates.
- 8.4 Bank rate figures are from the last Wednesday of the month.
- 8.5 & 8.6 The Monthly Restaurants, Caterers and Taverns Survey (MRCTS) has undergone several important methodological changes commencing with the April 2004 reference month. As a result of these changes, total food services sales for Canada and the provinces and territories have been revised back to January 1998. Users must be aware that historical comparisons of estimates produced by the MRCTS prior to May 2004 reference month should be made only with revised historical data. Please note that kind of business (KOB) details and the number of locations have been suppressed for both the historical and the new series until revisions to the historical data can be processed.

9. Transportation

- 9.1 Not included in this table are travellers entering the Yukon from another province or territory, persons entering the Yukon by air and persons entering the Yukon by water.
