Fortified Buildings Act (FBA)

Introduced May 2002

Proclaimed May 23, 2002

 Targets fortified homes and businesses such as biker clubhouses & fortified Marijuana Grow Operations (MGOs)

Safer Communities and Neighbourhoods Act (SCNA)

- Introduced May 2001
- Proclaimed February 19, 2002
- Targets properties used for drugs, prostitution, sniff/non-potable substances and booze cans


PSI Unit

SCNA - Rationale

 Criminal Code, CDSA and other laws have not brought relief to neighbourhoods with entrenched drug, prostitution & sniff operations

- Objective: Use provincial powers to create one law to address these specific activities
- Property owners & businesses are accountable for activities occurring on their properties

SCNA – New approach to old problems

 Apply civil law to counter the impact on neighbourhoods of entrenched drug, prostitution, sniff & non-potable alcohol, and booze can operations based out of homes and businesses

• Target the activities – not individuals

SCNA – Legal Foundation

Supreme Court of Canada Bedard vs Dawson

- Provincial power: "suppressing conditions calculated to favour the development of crime rather than the punishment of crime"
- "Control & enjoyment of property & safeguarding of the community from the consequences of an illegal and injurious use being made" of a property

SCNA – Key Points

 Currently limited to drugs, prostitution, sniff, nonpotable products and booze cans

- Activity must be habitual
- Adverse affect on neighbourhood
- Balance of probabilities

Investigative Process

- 1. Complaint received
- 2. Target Assessment
- 3. City Hall/Land Titles
- 4. Police Agency information sharing
- Joint ForceOperation
- 6. Surveillance

- 7. Reports to Manager and Director
- 8. Landlord consultation
- Warning letter,
 Informal Resolution,
 or Court of Queen's
 Bench

SCNA Offences

- Removing a posted Order/Notice: \$2,500 fine and/or 3 months in jail
- Entry into closed property: \$5,000 and/or 6 months in jail
- Ignoring an Order Continuing Offence:
 \$500 for each day
- Failure to Inform a 3rd Party upon sale: \$20,000 maximum and/or 1 year in jail

1st PSI Closure

- Prostitution & Drugs
- Tenants served notice on 02 06 03 and complied
- Winnipeg Police
 Service arrested
 boyfriend/pimp and
 sex trade worker

1st Sniff Closure

- Residents selling "sniff" in bottles
- Parents have two sons who are abusers
- Complete renovation post closure

Home Street: \$3.00-\$5.00 per ½ bottle or rag



Downtown Core

- Drugs & Prostitution
- Parents pimping 15 & 17-year old daughters
- Frequented by Street Gang Members
- Prostitution

Brothel

- Prostitution related activity
- 10 year brothel
- Advertised in local papers
- 4-6 Sex Trade Workers
- PSI Surveillance & Winnipeg Police Service (WPS) under-cover project

1st Community Safety Order (CSO)

- Notorious drug house that evolved into clubhouse for violent Ruthless Posse Street Gang
- 10 year history of drug trafficking, arson, drive-by shootings, other violent crimes
- Targeted by PSI and WPS

1st CSO

PSI Case File

- Surveillance over several months
- Volumes of past police incident reports
- Under-Cover purchases of cocaine
- Affidavit from gang experts
- Affidavit from community police officer
- Affidavit from PSI investigator

1st CSO

- Granted maximum closure (90 days)
- Banned 8 gang members from returning for 12 months
- CSO application not contested
- No appeal of the Order

Impact of 1st CSO

3-years Prior to CSO:

- Police Emergency
 Response Team called 5 x
- Multiple shootings
- Multiple assaults
- Multiple Controlled Drug Substances Act Warrants
- Multiple drug and prostitution offences

18 Months Post CSO To Date

No reported crime or police calls for service

Public Housing Unit

- 2nd Floor Suite
- Drugs
- Surveillance camera installed in hallway
- 350+ customers over 3-day period
- Children living in the target suite

Other PSI Closures

- The Pas, Manitoba
- Rural setting
- Hells Angels connected drug operation
- 5 days of live surveillance

 140 drug, prostitution, and solvent abuse operations involving 193 complaints closed by PSI

40-60 hours of surveillance per closure

\$2 million+ in drugs seized due to PSI investigations

- 139 out of 140 operations were shut down without going to court – saving time, costs, & bringing faster relief to neighbourhoods
- Compliance within 5-7 days after confronting operators


- Advanced electronic surveillance gives PSI 24-7 evidence collection capability
- 82 Police arrests of adults and youth for Criminal Code offences, drug offences and outstanding Warrants based on PSI cases
- Several Marijuana Grow Operations (MGOs) shut down
- No false or malicious complaints

 Shut down multiple drug, prostitution and sniff operations set up in the immediate vicinity of elementary schools, day cares, and seniors' homes

 Shut down multiple drug & prostitution operations run by street gangs and Outlaw Motorcycle Gangs (OMGs)

- Total complaints received 919
- Drug related 822
- Prostitution related 272
- Sniff or non-potable related 60
- Alcohol sale related 38

Fortified Buildings Act



Fortified Buildings Act (FBA)

Proclaimed May 23, 2002

 Impetus: long-standing biker clubhouse for 3 Outlaw Motorcycle Gangs (OMG's), including Hells Angels

Consultations with police and 1st responders

FBA

Recognizes that fortifications:

 Can prevent police and 1st responders from gaining fast access

 Can prevent residents from exiting in an emergency

Used by criminals, including organized crime

FBA

 PSI investigators appointed by Minister as FBA Inspectors under the Act

 Director empowered to issue Removal Orders requiring removal of listed fortifications

FBA-Fortifications Defined

- Bulletproof material or material designed to be resistant to explosives, on doors or windows
- Protective metal plating on interior or exterior that is not required for structural integrity
- Armoured or specially reinforced doors
- Metal bars on exterior doors or windows
- Any fortification established in Regulations

FBA - Exception

Reasonable Test

 Sec 1.3: Building not a fortified building if fortified in a manner that does not exceed reasonable security measures commonly taken for residential dwelling

FBA - Factors

Director may take into account:

- # and type of fortifications
- Impair emergency access?
- Impair emergency escape?
- Nature of neighbourhood & area
- Proximity to schools, playgrounds, other children's areas
- Purpose of the building

FBA-Factors

- Persons who own, occupy or visit building
- Past criminal and/or disruptive behaviour at site?
- Any other factors considered relevant by Director

FBA Process

- Inspectors access with consent or Warrant to Enter and Inspect
- Photos/measurements/other recordings
- Review of surrounding area for comparison
- Full report submitted to Director
- Director issues/declines Removal Order
- Removal Orders: identifies fortifications to be removed & compliance date

FBA - Process

 Removal Order registered on Land Titles until compliance achieved

Failure to comply

 Director issues Closure Order, closes building, removes fortifications and bills property owner

Costs are debt to the Crown

FBA Case 1: Biker Clubhouse

- Clubhouse rear door
- Floor to ceiling metal plates
- Metal plate covering inside of main floor window
- Plate extended well past window opening
- Window also had wire mesh and bars on exterior

FBA Case 2 – Fortified MGO

- Suspected MGO
- Vice Unit Warrant declined by Courts
- PSI applied under FBA for Warrant to Enter & Inspect
- Fortifications visible from exterior + police information
- External and internal fortifications

FBA – Case Summary

14 cases

- 7 Consent Inspections & Voluntary Removal
- 3 Removal Orders Issued by Director using Warrant to Enter & Inspect
- 1 Consent Inspection but no Removal
- 1 Unfounded case
- 2 Pending Inspections
