# Census '96

### Mobility and Migration

The 1996 Census of Canada which occurred on May 14, 1996 asked respondents two questions on mobility: where they lived in 1991 and where they lived in 1995.

#### **Definitions**

#### Mobility 1 and 5: Mobility Status - Place of Residence 1 Year Ago and 5 Years Ago

Refers to the relationship between a person's usual place of residence on Census Day and his or her usual place of residence one (five) year(s) earlier. A person is classified as a non-mover if no difference exists. Otherwise, a person is classed as a mover and this categorization is called Mobility Status 1 or 5 (1 or 5 year(s) ago). Within the category movers, a further distinction is made between non-migrants and migrants; this difference is called migration status.

**Non-movers** are persons who, on Census Day, were living at the same address which they occupied one year or five years earlier.

**Movers** are persons who, on Census Day, were living at a different address than the one at which they resided one year or five years earlier.

**Non-migrants** are movers who, on Census Day, were living at a different address but in the same census subdivision (CSD) that they occupied one year or five years earlier.

**Migrants** are movers who, on Census Day, were residing in a different CSD one year earlier (internal migrants) or who were living outside Canada one year or five years earlier (external migrants).

#### 1 — Highlights


- 43% of Canadians moved to a different location between 1991 and 1995 compared to 47% between 1986 and 1991.
- Of the Canadians who moved between 1991 and 1996, 23% moved inside their municipality limits while 17% moved to another municipality within the same province or territory.
- Following the trend of previous years, men and women aged 25 to 29 at the time of the Census continue to be the most mobile.
- Of all interprovincial migrants aged 25 and over, 26% had a university degree in 1996.
- Labour market opportunities impact interprovincial migration as more than threequarters of interprovincial migrants aged 15 and over were part of the labour force in 1996, compared with 65% in the overall population.

- According to the 1996 Census there were 4 regions to gain population between 1991 and 1996 through interprovincial migration - British Columbia, Alberta, Prince Edward Island and the Yukon.
- Across Canada, Ontario experienced the largest loss through provincial migration with a net migration loss of 47,010 between 1991 and 1996.
  British Columbia showed the largest gain through provincial migration over the same period with a net migration gain of 149,945.
- Between 1991 and 1996 the Yukon's net interprovincial migration of population aged 5 and over was 670 compared to 780 between 1986 and 1991 and a loss of 2,660 from 1981 to 1986.

The Percentage of each age group who are "movers"




