Highlights

The following statistics are from the 2001 Census of Canada which occurred on **May 15, 2001**.



Aboriginal Origin

Of the total Yukon population in 2001, 6,990 (25.0%) reported at least one Aboriginal origin.

Aboriginal Identity

In 2001, the Aboriginal identity population of the Yukon represented 0.7% of the total Aboriginal identity population of Canada. There were 6,540 people in the Yukon who identified themselves with at least one Aboriginal group (22.9% of the total Yukon population).

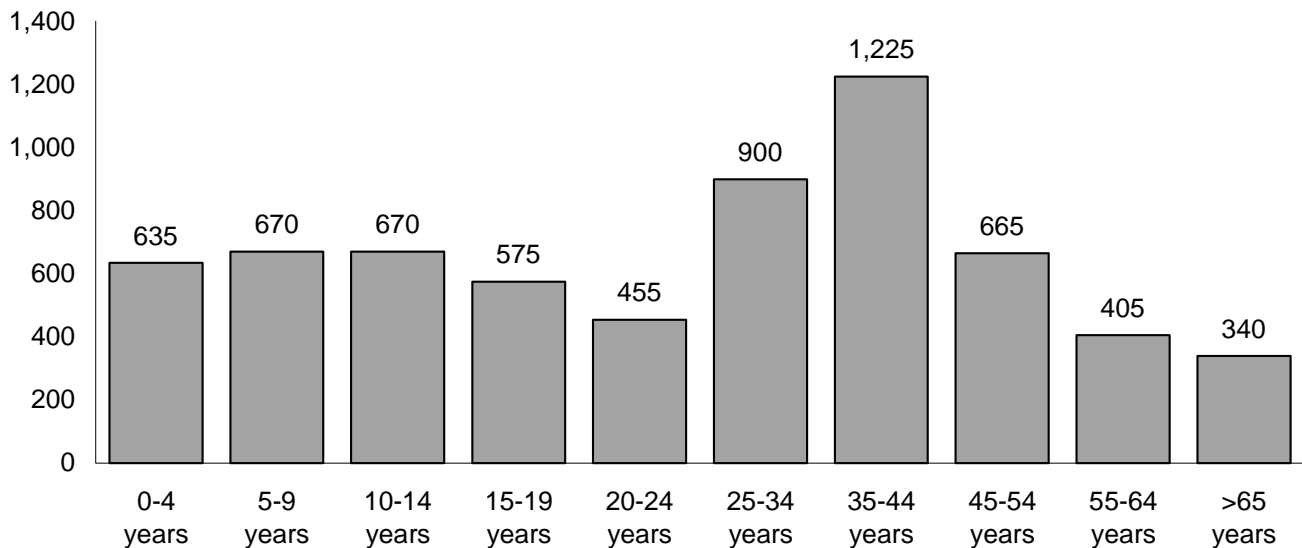

Notes: Total for Yukon Territory includes settlements and other areas not individually reported in this table. *Carcross includes Carcross (settlement) and Carcross 4 (reserve) as defined by Statistics Canada. **Teslin includes Teslin (village) and Teslin Post 13 (reserve) as defined by Statistics Canada. ***Whitehorse includes Whitehorse (city) and Whitehorse unorganized as defined by Statistics Canada.

Notes

There are many ways of defining the Aboriginal population, which can result in different estimates of its size. There is no single or “correct” definition of the Aboriginal population and the choice of a definition depends on the purpose for which it is to be used. Different definitions/counts are used depending on the focus and requirements of the user. The 2001 Census provides data that are based on the definitions of ethnic origin (ancestry), Aboriginal Identity, Registered Indian, and Band membership.

Aboriginal Ancestry/Origin refers to those persons who reported at least one Aboriginal origin (North American Indian, Metis or Inuit) on the ethnic origin question in the Census. The question asks about the ethnic or cultural group(s) to which the respondent’s ancestors belong.

Aboriginal Identity refers to those person who reported identifying with at least one Aboriginal group, i.e. North American Indian, Metis or Inuit. Also included are individuals who did not report an Aboriginal identity, but did report themselves as a Registered or Treaty Indian, and/or Band or First Nation membership.

Need More Information?

Additional statistics from the 2001 Census are currently available, including population, dwelling counts, language, mobility, migration, citizenship, immigration, ethnic origin, labour force activity, occupation, place of work, mode of transportation, unpaid work, school attendance, education, highest level of schooling and earnings. A release on May 13, 2003 will provide information on religion, shelter costs, income and social and economic characteristics of individuals, families and households.



Please Note: The majority of figures shown in this publication have been subjected to a confidentiality procedure known as “random rounding” in which counts are rounded to a multiple of “5”.
