## **Highlights**

The following statistics are from the 2001 Census of Canada which occurred on **May 15, 2001.** 



In 2001, the number of private households in the Yukon was 11,365, down 0.8% from 11,460 in 1996. The average number of persons per private household in the Yukon in 2001was 2.5, down from 2.6 in 1996 and

down from 3.4 in 1971.

There were 7,810 families counted in the Yukon in 2001, and of these, 5,055 were families with children at home and 2,755 were families without children at home.


Notes: Occupied private dwelllings are a separate set of living quarters which has a private entrance either directly from outside or from a common hall, lobby, vestibule or stairway leading to the outside, and in which a person or a group of persons live permanently; Private households are a person or group of persons occupying the same dwelling; Collective dwellings are dwellings used for commercial, institutional or communal purposes, such as a hotel, a hospital or a work camp.



Note: Family household refers to a household that contains at least one census family, that is, a married couple with or without children, or a couple living common-law with or without children, or a lone parent living with one or more children (lone-parent family). One-family household refers to a single census family (with or without other non-family persons) that occupies a private dwelling. Multiple-family household refers to a household in which two or more census families (with or without additional non-family persons) occupy the same private dwelling. Non-family household refers to either one person living alone in a private dwelling or to a group of two or more people who share a private dwelling, but who do not constitute a census family.
