Introduction

Violence affects a staggering number of families in the Yukon. The victims, most often women and children, suffer physical, sexual, verbal, financial, emotional and/or social abuse.

Do you know what resources or services are available for someone living with family violence?

Do you ever wish you had a listing of services to pass on to a person seeking help?

This guide is designed to help you help victims or offenders by telling them about local services. The directory is primarily a resource for community workers in social services, health and/or justice but it may also be used by people who have experienced family violence themselves. Most of the agencies listed do not require a formal referral to receive their services. You can call on behalf of a friend or client, or they can call themselves. The guide is a resource for anyone who may find it useful!

The agencies and programs listed here cover a wide range of helping services. Many of the agencies have family violence prevention or intervention as their main work. Other agencies listed do not focus exclusively, or even primarily, on family violence situations but they do offer programs and services which may meet the needs of people who have lived or are living with family violence.

This directory is produced by the Yukon Women's Directorate, based on information supplied by the organizations themselves. For more information on how to help women living under the shadow of family violence, an excellent resource is "Option, Choices,

Changes." Services provided

Probation officers assist the courts by providing assessments of people facing sentencing and consideration for release on bail.

Probation officers throughout the territory provide counselling and supervision for offenders in the community. They also provide referrals to various rehabilitative and treatment programs, such as anger management, family counselling and substance abuse treatment.

Probation officers will provide general information to the public about the criminal justice system and its programs, as well as working with communities to develop local delivery of justice programs.

The Whitehorse office serves the greater Whitehorse area, as well as Carcross, Carmacks, Faro, Ross River, Pelly Crossing, Old Crow, Haines Junction, the Alaska Highway north to Beaver Creek, and Teslin.

The Watson Lake office (536-7565), located at 820C Adela Trail, serves the area surrounding Watson Lake.

The Dawson City office (993-5669), located in the First Nation Administration Building on Front Street, serves Dawson City, Mayo, Elsa, Keno and the surrounding area.

Services provided

Alcohol and Drug Services offers preventative and treatment services to individuals, families and groups on issues of substance abuse. Community development and aftercare consultation services are provided for Yukon communities.

Prevention Services

Education and prevention services include information for the public, workshops and training, presentations in the school, and public awareness campaigns. As well, there is an addiction-related library for service providers.

Detoxification Services

This is a non-medical unit where people can safely withdraw from alcohol and/or drugs. It is open 24 hours per day for drop-in support and referral.

Outpatient/Counselling Services

Alcohol and Drug Services offers brief screening and assessment of alcohol and drug problems, as well as individual counselling and support to families; aftercare support following live-in treatment services; referral to

ongoing treatment; self-help groups; and other support services. Outpatient/Counselling Services also offers recovery support groups, and services to clients with concurrent disorders. Outreach counselling is also available for Whitehorse agencies.

Live-in Treatment Services

Each year, Alcohol and Drug Services offers six, 28-day live-in (residential) gender-specific adult programs, as well as men and women's follow-up programs.

Community Outreach

Provide outreach services, such as assistance with program development, aftercare programs and community development, to Yukon communities.

Big Brothers Big Sisters of Yukon provides services to families, children and adult volunteers in the Yukon. Volunteers provide positive adult role models, in the spirit of fun and friendship, for boys and girls ages six to 16 years, from one-parent homes. These friendships contribute to a child's healthy development and encourage their growth and maturity as members of society.

There are a variety of programs available for children, including traditional one to one matching, couples matching, big group activities and an in-school mentoring program.

Everyone involved in the program must be screened and interviewed by the organization. Adult volunteers should plan on being in Whitehorse for at least one year.

Services provided

The Child Development Centre (CDC) provides early assessment and support for young children between birth and school-age so they can develop to their full potential. CDC believes that the best services include the involvement of the child, family and professional working together.

Programs currently offered include infant development; an integrated, therapeutic pre-school program; speech and language groups; and community-based services including support to child care workers and parent-tot groups.

The outreach program serves all rural Yukon communities.

Services are available in the child's home, at the child care facility the child is attending, and at the Child Development Centre. They are provided by developmental consultants, teachers, speech language pathologists, occupational therapists, physiotherapists and other support personnel.

Referrals: The Child Development Centre has an open referral system. Referrals may come from families, physicians, public health nurses or other professionals.

Services provided

Residential Youth Treatment Services

The Residential Youth Treatment Services (RYTS) provides both short-term care for children at the Children's Receiving Home, and long-term, group home care.

Children's Receiving Home: The Children's Receiving Home provides short-term placements for children, 10 to 18 years old, in need of a place of safety. It also provides supervised visits for families, stabilization and short-term care. Referrals are from Family and Children's Services.

Group homes: Children in care of the director may be referred to the Residential Youth Treatment Services program by Family and Children's Services through the Placement Review Committee. RYTS operates four homes which provide programming for behaviourally difficult youth (between 10 and 18 years of age) and their families.

Child Abuse Treatment Services (CATS): CATS provides professional training workshops, as well as consultation and education, for people working with children around the Yukon, including members of the community and service organizations.

Individual, family and group counselling are available for children who have been physically, sexually, or emotionally abused, and children who have witnessed family violence.



The unit is staffed by one supervisor, a full-time intake worker, a full-time caseworker and two regional outreach workers.

"Bubbles" books, addressing personal space for young children, can be purchased through CATS.

Services provided

This information is broad in nature as Community Nursing provides a wide variety of programs and services to the community. Details of community-specific programs can be obtained by contacting the nurse practitioner in charge of each health centre during regular business hours.

Whitehorse Health Centre

The Whitehorse Health Centre promotes health and well-being to clients by providing a variety of community-based health services such as immunization, prenatal instruction, school health and wellness clinics for clients of all ages. (See page 20 for more information.)

Acute primary care and emergency treatment services are not provided.

Rural health centres

Staff at rural health centres include one or more community nurse practitioners as well as clerical and housekeeping support. Community nurse practitioners conduct daily clinics for the treatment of acute and chronic medical conditions, provide 24-hour emergency services, and deliver community health programs.

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Physician services are available in all communities, either by resident or itinerant physicians. Contact the local health centre for appointments or information about community health programs. Clients requiring care that is not accessible in their community may be referred to Whitehorse.

Emergency medical services are available on a 24-hour basis in all rural communities. After regular business hours, the nurse is on-call for emergencies only and can be contacted by phoning the health centre number.

Contact the health centre if an ambulance is needed. Rural ambulance attendants are trained community volunteers.

Service to victims of family violence

Community nurse practitioners provide medical care for family violence victims. These services include initial medical assessment and treatment, sexual assault examinations, and follow-up care and treatment. In cases of severe injury, the victim is sent to Whitehorse General Hospital for examination and treatment by a doctor. Nurses also provide crisis counselling and emotional support. Information is available at the health centres about family violence, and health centre staff can assist the client to access these services.

Clients are encouraged to come during regular clinic hours or phone for an appointment, if possible. The nurse will assess the client’s immediate medical condition and personal safety needs. A medical examination may be conducted with the client’s permission.

Services provided

Aboriginal courtworkers provide legal information (not advice) to First Nations people who have been accused of, or charged with, offences. This includes information about how to apply for legal aid and how to get a lawyer.

Courtworkers explain court procedures and the roles of the people involved, and make sure their clients know what is required of them in court. They can explain the meaning of the court outcome once court is over. For minor offences, courtworkers can also speak in court on behalf of their clients.

Service is available to adult and young offenders. Clients can contact a courtworker by phone, by visit to the office, or at court. In collaboration with other community workers, courtworkers will identify counselling and other services for their clients.

Services provided

Crown counsel are lawyers employed by the federal government to prosecute offences under the *Criminal Code* and other federal statutes. While they are not lawyers representing the victim, they do represent the community in criminal proceedings and are aware of, and sensitive to, the situations and needs of victims and witnesses in the criminal justice process. As such, Crown counsel work in close cooperation with other helping agencies in order to minimize any difficulties the criminal justice process may cause victims and witnesses.

The Domestic Violence Treatment Options Court is a joint project of the Government of Canada and the Government of the Yukon. It is available in Whitehorse for offenders accused of spousal assault who take responsibility for the charge or charges, and are recommended for the program through an assessment by the Spousal Abuse Program counsellors of the Family Violence Prevention Unit.

The sentencing hearing is postponed for several months to allow the accused to complete the spousal assault program and address any other treatment needs. The accused appears regularly in court, and sentencing reflects the summary of the counselling the accused has received, while addressing any future counselling and safety issues.

Support is provided to victims, if they choose, with safety planning, referrals for counselling for themselves and their children, updates on the offender’s progress, assistance with varying release conditions on the offender, and preparation of victim impact statements for the court.

Justices of the peace are appointed by the Yukon government on the recommendation of the Yukon Judicial Council. They perform a variety of functions within the justice system. Each justice of the peace is authorized by the Chief Judge of the Territorial Court to perform specific functions only, so not all justices of the peace have the same powers.

The authority of the justices of the peace may include issuing arrest warrants and determining whether, and under what conditions, an accused person should be released while awaiting a court appearance. Justices of the peace may also be able to hear applications for, and issue, peace bonds and orders under the *Family Violence Prevention Act*. Senior justices of the peace also sentence people accused of less serious offences under the Criminal Code, and conduct trials under territorial legislation.

The Maintenance Enforcement program enforces agreements or court orders requiring support payments for a spouse or child. Original agreements must be filed with the court before they are enforceable. Court orders are automatically filed with the court, but clients must register with the Maintenance Enforcement Program in order to have their agreement or order enforced.

The program collects money from the paying parent, and then pays the money to the receiving parent. This eliminates the necessity for separated spouses to contact each other, which is useful in cases where abuse is, or has

been, a factor. The program will vigorously attempt to collect payment arrears, and can trace partners who owe money but who have "disappeared," however, the program cannot guarantee that funds will be collected.

Applicants should ensure that they have copies of their separation agreements and/or court orders. They will also be asked for such information as their partner's last address, property owned, and place of employment for tracing or garnishee purposes. Maintenance Enforcement staff will assist in filling out the necessary registration forms. Applicants are also required to provide continual and up-to-date information about the paying parent as well as about themselves.

Rural and Whitehorse detachments respond to family violence complaints and crises in basically the same manner.

Information

Officers can provide some basic information to the public on family violence.

Referrals

Officers can either refer victims to other agencies for help, or take them there. These agencies include Kaushee's Place or other safe houses, hospitals, health centres, Health and Social Services, and Victim Services.

Specialized services

A primary service offered by all detachments is emergency response to family violence complaints. Depending on

the circumstance, investigation, follow-up and the arrest of, or search for, the accused may occur. The officers' immediate concerns include victim safety, child protection, and the collection and preservation of evidence. Therefore, depending upon the age of the victim and the type of offence, the officer may involve a social worker and community medical personnel.

The Whitehorse RCMP has a specialized, two-person unit to investigate cases of historical sexual and domestic abuse. The Crimes Against Persons Unit investigates matters involving the abuse of children, older people, and people with disabilities, along with adult and child sexual assaults where there have been multiple victims or offenders. The services of the Crimes Against Persons Unit are available to all RCMP detachments in the Yukon.

Process

When a family violence incident is reported to the RCMP, an officer takes the victim's statement. If required, the victim is given immediate medical attention, counselling or shelter services. Any witnesses to the incident are interviewed.

If immediate medical attention for the victim is needed, and particularly if medical evidence must be collected (as in the case of child sexual assault), the officer may accompany the victim to the health centre or hospital. A nurse will receive the victim and assess the immediate medical needs.

If the victim is a child and the officer is concerned about the child's safety, a social worker will be contacted to arrange protection.

If the victim has been sexually assaulted, a medical examination will be provided to collect medical evidence which may be needed if the case proceeds to court. If possible, the officer will remain at the medical centre (but not in the examination room) while the victim is receiving treatment and an examination. If there is a doctor in the community, the examination is conducted by the doctor, otherwise by a nurse. Medical evidence collected is given to the officer in a sealed envelope and sent to a lab for analysis.

If the victim does not stay overnight in the medical centre, the RCMP may assist the victim in making arrangements to stay at a safe place.

The Skookum Jim Friendship Centre is a “community house” with its resources directed at helping community residents.

The *Prenatal Nutrition Program* and the baby club promote and support the health of all women during their pregnancies, and support nursing mothers and their babies up to the age of one year. There are weekly drop-in sessions for participants.

The *Traditional Parenting Program* provides the necessary steps to contribute to improving the health and quality of life for First Nations people by teaching parenting practices and values through the knowledge of the elders.

By using a traditional and contemporary approach, the *Tan Sakwathan Youth Diversion Program* provides early intervention and healthier alternatives for First Nation youth and their families who come in conflict with the law. A family support worker interacts closely with the youth and their family to provide family support in the home.

The *Recreation Program* provides programs that reflect the well being of both rural and urban people, and supports initiatives of sport, recreation and culture that are important to maintaining community-based programs. Annually, this program hosts the Skookum Jim Rediscovery Wilderness Camp, the Folklore Show and other important healing initiatives.

The Urban Multipurpose Aboriginal Youth Centre: The vision of aboriginal youth is to identify, define and create opportunities. These should be conducive to individual and collective self-empowerment, identity, skills development and cultural enhancement. They should foster spiritual, emotional, mental and physical development. Programming includes youth cultural enrichment, introduction to computers, drum making, youth harvest camp, self-discovery camp, job occupational skills training and development, youth role model/mentorship, and youth leadership planning for the future.

The *Student Training and Financial Services Program* includes Work Life Job Skills, NWT Post-secondary Education, DIAND National Child Benefit Fund and the Aboriginal Human Resource Development Program.

In Step is a full-day program provided to individuals residing in the community. It is based on individual programming in the areas of training (job and life skills), literacy, supported employment and recreation.

Services provided

The Teen Parent Centre is funded by the departments of Education and Health and Social Services, as well as a non-profit society. The program allows young people of school age to continue or renew public school studies with as little interruption as possible during pregnancy and/or parenting.

The teacher-director and support staff provide personal and academic counselling on site. Support from other agencies such as Public Health and Child Development Centre is offered.

The *Healthy Moms Healthy Babies* (HMHB) program at the centre is for all pregnant and parenting teens. You do not have to be in school to take part. The program provides nutritional support and guidance (including food vouchers), information about pregnancy and parenting, help with breastfeeding, group activities, cooking sessions and more. The HMHB program is also available during the summer months on an outreach basis. The coordinator for this program is a registered nurse.

Child care and transportation are available.

Referrals are made to other counselling agencies upon request.

Confidentiality

Confidentiality is ensured. Reporting of cases of suspected child abuse is required under the *Child Care Act* and the *Education Act*, both of which govern the operations of the centre.

Services provided

The unit is comprised of four specific programs: Community Victim Services, Spousal Abuse Program, Women's Program, and Sexual Offenders Risk Management Program.

Community Victim Services: Assistance to victims, their families and friends helps reduce the impact of trauma. Community Victim Services provides individual and group counselling for people who have been abused by their partners. Counselling addresses personal safety, reducing isolation, increasing the woman's awareness of her rights, impact of abuse on the woman and her children, education about the dynamics of abuse, and moving from the position of victim to a place of personal power.

Community Victim Services coordinators work in partnership with the RCMP and the judicial system. They provide crisis intervention, support, information, advocacy and referrals for people who are the victims of family violence or other crimes, or who are involved with the courts. One important court function of this program is to help in preparing a victim impact statement, which outlines the emotional, physical and/or financial loss a victim may have suffered. This formal document assists the victim when they are presenting information in court and at hearings.

continued...

Spousal Abuse Program: Individual and group counselling promotes changes in behaviour and helps support healthy choices. The Spousal Abuse Program assists abusers who have been ordered by the court to attend as part of their sentence, or who have come on their own initiative.

Abusers are offered individual and group counselling to learn how to break the cycle of violence in their lives.

The program's intervention goals are to address victims' safety and to assist abusers to take responsibility for their abusive behaviours. Counselling for abusers addresses issues of power and control within relationships, and holds abusers accountable for their behaviour. Abusers are supported in learning to be non-abusive and to participate in healthy relationships.

The program lasts a minimum of 10 weeks. People can refer themselves or be referred by someone else by calling 667-3581 and asking to speak to a counsellor.

Women's Program: Counselling helps increase options for women who are experiencing abuse in their intimate relationships. The Women's Program offers both individual and group counselling services to women who are victims of domestic abuse. Domestic abuse includes physical, sexual, verbal and emotional abuse within an intimate relationship. The major program objective is to promote the safety of women and their children. Through counselling, women are able to examine the role and effect of violence in their lives. They have the opportunity to develop new skills in order to regain some power in their lives, develop a sense of personal identity, increase and restore self-esteem and heal from unresolved issues.

Women can access these services by calling 667-8500 and asking for assistance. They can also be referred by other professionals.

Sexual Offenders Risk Management Program: This program assists sexual offenders to identify and effectively reduce the risk factors that cause them to sexually offend. Cognitive behavioural psychotherapy is combined with extensive monitoring and supervision in order to reduce the likelihood of re-offence. Risk management teams, consisting of formal and informal resources, review the offender's risk factors, with the offender, on a regular basis and assist the offender to make healthy choices. Community and victim safety are priorities.

This program has an outreach worker who serves as a liaison with the community through the risk management teams, and provides services for developmentally delayed sexual offenders.

Education

Awareness is the first step toward ensuring change and preventing violence.

Outreach program: Staff at the Victim Services and Family Violence Prevention Unit are available in Whitehorse and in the communities to respond to requests for information, workshops and training. Responses can be in the form of school presentations, counselling, offender assessments, or consultation and training for professionals in the field.

Individual counselling is offered to victims, survivors and offenders, as well as to family members and friends. The unit also offers a support and advocacy service for victims, and referral to other services as appropriate.

Community outreach: Education and training facilitators are available for workshops and presentations to professional organizations and community groups, as well as for training. The unit also offers community support for establishing local programs to prevent family violence.

Family Violence Prevention Act

The *Family Violence Prevention Act* is territorial legislation that focuses on the victim by offering three protective court orders that provide several ways in which victims can receive help.

An Emergency Intervention Order can have an abusive person removed from the home. A Victim's Assistance Order can provide longer-term help. A Warrant of Entry can authorize a police officer to enter a residence, assist or remove the victim, and search the house for signs of violence to use as evidence.

The RCMP and Victim Services workers can provide further information on the various orders. Call your local RCMP detachment (see page 15 for phone numbers) or Victim Services at 667-8500 or toll free at 1-800-661-0408, extension 8500. (All calls are confidential.)

Confidentiality

All programs provided by Victim Services and Family Violence Prevention Unit are confidential. Unit staff will report incidents of child abuse and/or risk situations to Health and Social Services.

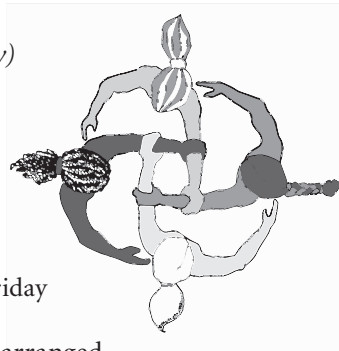

The hospital provides confidential emergency treatment and acute care to victims of family violence.

Process

Victims of family violence who come to the emergency department are provided with emergency treatment and care, as well as information on resources for help and support in the community. Gender-appropriate physicians can be arranged.

Upon request, a victim services worker can be with the victim during the examination and questioning to provide ongoing emotional support.

In all cases of suspected child abuse and/or neglect a social worker from the Department of Health and Social Services will be called immediately. The social worker may bring an RCMP officer. The social worker and/or the nurse will stay with the child throughout the examination and questioning. Gender-appropriate physicians can be arranged. It may sometimes be necessary to admit the child to the hospital. A parent or guardian is encouraged to stay with the child.

Confidentiality

Information provided to hospital personnel is strictly confidential, however, clients are advised that the RCMP and Health and Social Services will be notified in all cases of suspected child abuse and/or neglect.

The Whole Child Program (WCP) is based on the beliefs that parents are their children's first, most important, and most influential teachers; that children are most successful when schools and families are mutually supportive; and that the earlier schools and families connect, the better for children. The program, available to any family in Whitehorse, works to lessen the stresses on families.

Whitehorse Elementary is home to the program, which is governed by an independent steering committee with representatives from Health and Social Services, Education, the RCMP, the City of Whitehorse, Learning Disabilities Association and other non-profit organizations. There is a community room for workshops (free of charge to groups that support families in the community) and a family resource centre for parent information.

Wednesday evening programming includes open gym and computer lab, child care, a monthly family swim night, and transportation for downtown families.

In partnership with Healthy Families, WCP provides a parents and tots program at the Child Development Centre and an early intervention, kindergarten to grade 4 program.

In partnership with the Whitehorse Youth Centre Boys & Girls Club, WCP has cooking and craft nights for kids. In addition, there are parent and child workshops, such as stencilling, stained glass mosaics, gingerbread house building, scrapbooking, knitting, and warm weather cooking. Other school facilities are used as needed.

WCP publishes a monthly newsletter which is available in local schools, daycare centres and at many non-profit and government organizations, as well as on-line.

Services provided

The Youth Achievement Centre (YAC) offers a variety of programs for 12- to 18-year-old young persons and youth-at-risk who may not be participating in school or working full-time and are involved with the youth criminal justice and child welfare systems. Programs are offered during the day and early evening. All activities start and finish at the Youth Achievement Centre.

The following programs are offered on a quarterly basis but not all programs are offered each quarter. Contact YAC for the programs currently being offered.

Community support project: Helps youth complete community service hours and restitution.

Recreation and fitness: Highlights the importance of fitness and nutrition on one's daily life. May include activities such as skiing, swimming, Better Bodies, hiking and biking.

Lunch and noon-time drop-in: Provides lunch as well as access to various activities.

Parent and child fun night: Provides parents and children, up to five years of age, with exposure to accessible, creative and inexpensive activities that they can participate in as a family.

Crime Cycle Awareness: Uses an educational approach to explain to participants the factors that contribute to anti-social and inappropriate behaviour. The information is then used by each youth to develop a personal relapse prevention plan. Youth must finish this plan in order to complete the program.

Woodworking: Offered as a co-ed day or after-school program. It offers a positive, structured environment for hands-on skill development. Work schedules are designed to fit the needs and abilities of individual participants, with

time commitments from one half day per week up to four days per week. The workshop works best for youth who are available to participate for at least six consecutive weeks.

Carving program: Introduces carving with a focus on First Nation themes.

Education outreach: This program is a collaborative effort between YAC and the Department of Education. Youth at YAC who are unable to attend school for various reasons may be interested in connecting with a teacher a few times a week or working towards a plan to reintegrate into school.

Arts night: Explores a variety of mediums in a relaxed atmosphere.

Let's Talk Drugs: Is a secondary prevention and education program offering general information on alcohol and other drugs.

Anger management: Uses an educational treatment approach to train young people in skills needed to manage anger and other emotions associated with the occurrence of aggression and anti-social behaviour. The program involves ten 1.5-hour sessions. There is a pre-intake assessment for each participant.

Set in Motion: A self-esteem program.

Pottery: Includes hands-on-opportunity for youth to make pottery on a table or wheel.

Various summer camps: Offers female, male and co-ed camps.

Young Men's Sports: Focuses on attendance, participation, comprehension and fair play. Recreational activities include floor hockey, basketball, bowling, indoor soccer, movies, weight training and archery. Outdoor activities take place weather permitting.

Young Women's Group: Focuses on fun and participation, and providing a safe and supportive environment. Activities include movies, bowling, silk screening, candle-making, stained glass, games, and outdoor activities, weather permitting. Issues explored include abuse prevention, stress and frustration, self-awareness and feeling good about oneself, communication, exercise and diet.

Youth Probation coordinates a community *Youth Justice Panel* (YJP). YJP consists of representatives from the RCMP, federal crown, defence counsel, Victim Services, Council of Yukon First Nations, Department of Education, and other agencies involved in delivering diversion programs to youth.

YJP meets weekly to discuss cases before they go to court. YJP members explore appropriate services for youth and make recommendations to suitable extra-judicial measures programs in Whitehorse.

Youth Probation offers risk assessment and management, and can be referral agents to other community resources. It also provides intensive support and supervision, as an alternative to custody, for youth who are at high risk to re-offend.

Parent Support Group: Meets the first Wednesday of each month. Child care, transportation and supper are provided.

Nobody's Perfect: Provides support groups for parents of newborns to five-year-olds. Child care and transportation are provided.

Parent-Child Mother Goose: Parents learn the traditional art of sharing rhymes, songs and stories with their babies and young children.

Parent groups for support, discussion and information are held from time to time at YFSA and in other facilities in the Yukon.

Services are confidential. Information about clients is not shared with, or requested from, other agencies unless the client gives permission in writing. The agency's policy is to report instances of child abuse, or situations where a child or others are at risk of abuse.

Counselling is available for children. Parental consent is required for children under 12 years of age. The ability of youth (over 12 years of age) to give their own consent is considered.

Process

Clients who contact Yukon Housing Corporation with requests for housing are generally referred to the manager of the housing authority or housing association in their community.

Applications are reviewed by the housing manager and, in turn, by the housing advisory board or authority. If the request is approved, the housing manager will assist the family to find housing.

Clients do not need to bring income information with them to the meeting with the manager. However, at some point they will be asked to provide documents indicating how much the family is earning. This information is used to determine the amount of rent the client will pay.

Confidentiality

Information provided on an application for housing is confidential and is not released to other agencies.

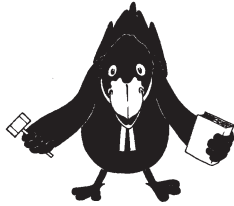

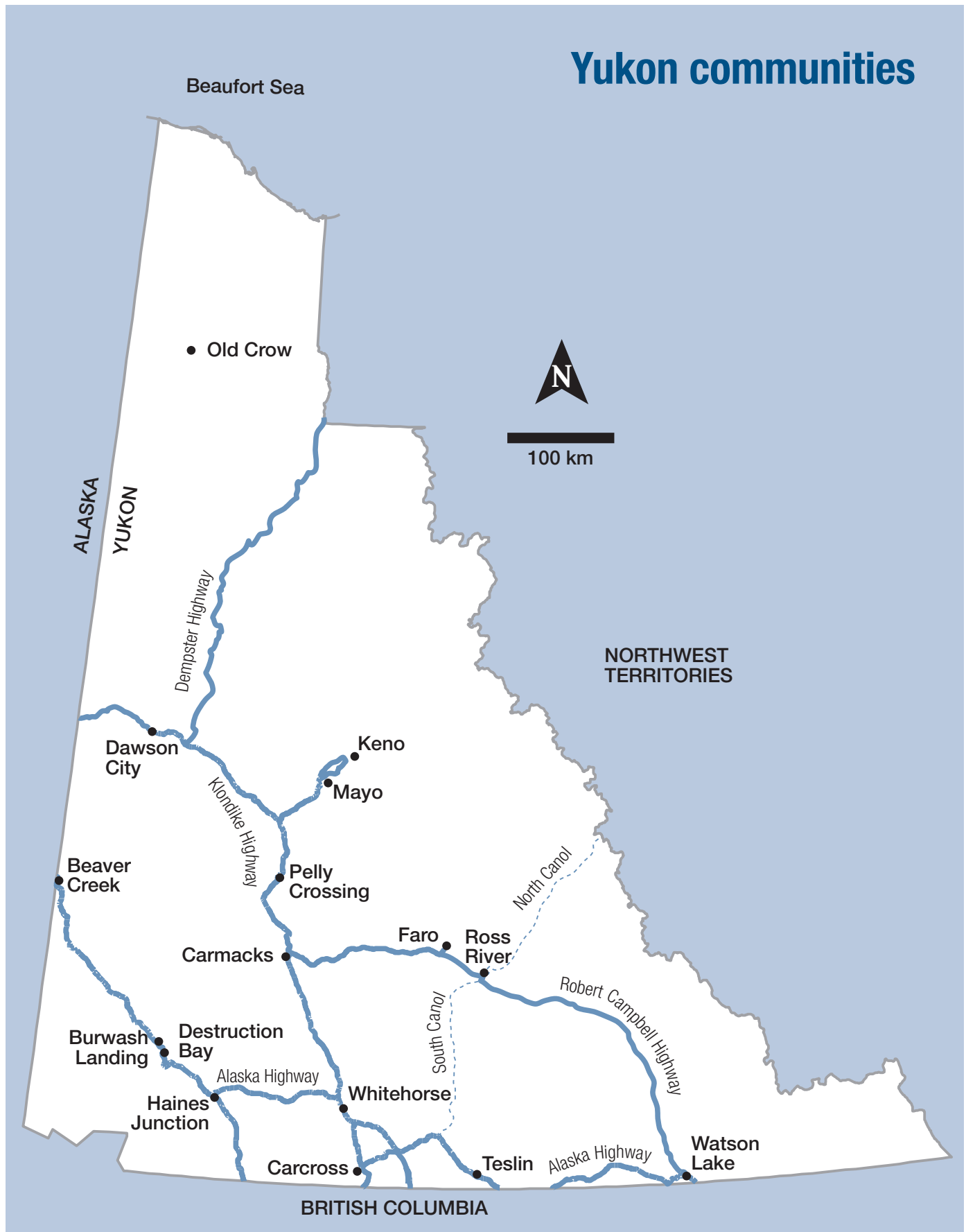

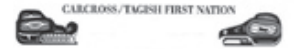
