


## 2006 Budget - Revenue

# **2006 Budget Overview**

- Budget 2006 projected a summary net income of \$148 million for the consolidated (summary) budget
- Budget 2006 is balanced for the 7<sup>th</sup> straight year as required by Balanced Budget Legislation



# **2006 Budget Overview**

- Four main building blocks:
  - **♦** Growing Green, Growing Smart
  - ♦ Healthy Families, Healthy Communities (including Post-Secondary Education)
  - ♦ Tax Savings for Manitoba Families and Business
  - ◆ Balanced Budgets



# **Budget 2006 - Budget Overview**

- 3.4% increase in spending over 2005/06 forecast
- \$110 million for debt and pension liability payments
- \$30 million drawn for wait times from pre-paid federal funds in Fiscal Stabilization Fund



# **Budget 2006 - Budget Overview**

 \$55 million drawn from Fiscal Stabilization Fund to accelerate infrastructure, college and university funding and projects




# Our Responsible Fiscal Plan

- Budget 2006 continues the long term fiscal plan, including continuing to pay down the pension liability – earned Manitoba 2 credit upgrades
- Manitoba's credit ratings are now among the best in Canada:
  - ♦ Moody's Investors Services Aa1
  - ♦ Standard and Poor's AA –
  - ◆ Dominion Bond Rating Service Limited A(high)

Summary Net Debt as a Percent of GDP (Percent)



# Total Expenditure by Province 2005/06 (Dollars Per Capita)



#### **Economic Growth**

- Manitoba's economy is expected to grow by 3.2% in 2006 – above Canada's growth rate of 2.9%
- Manitoba's economy is expected to grow by 2.6% in 2007
- Housing starts continue to increase in 2006 – after 85% increase between 2000 -2005



# **Economic Growth**

- Building permits also up 22.3% in 2006
  - double Canada's increase of 7.8%
- Strong mining activity 142% increase in oil wells coming on line, Bissett Gold Mine reopening and potential Bucko Lake nickel mine in 2007




# **Employment**

- In 2006, Manitoba's average unemployment rate is 4.3% – second lowest in Canada
- Over the last six years, Manitoba created an average of 6,483 jobs per year – 126% improvement over the 1990s





- \$60 million, three-year increase for universities and colleges – up to 17% increase
- New Co-op Graduate Hiring Incentive to support the employment of co-op education students
- Extension of the Co-op Education Tax Credit to more employers



- More resources for the College Expansion Initiative and adult-learning centres
- Expansion of the Graduate Scholarship and Hope Bursary programs







- Increased funding for public schools by the rate of economic growth – total provincial operating funding to \$926 million
- Investments in special needs education and more funding for professional development
- More funding for English as an additional language for students with refugee and war-affected backgrounds
- New resources to improve public library services



# **Building through Research** and Innovation

- New investment in the Industrial Technology Centre
- Richardson Centre for Functional Foods and Nutraceuticals
- Composites Innovation Centre
- Doubled the capacity of the Manitoba Interactive Media Fund



# **Building through Research** and Innovation

- Since its inception, the Research and Development Tax Credit has returned \$105.2 million to local firms
- Over \$27 million spent on research and development initiatives in 2005/06, up almost 65% since 1999/00
- Manitoba has the fastest growing biotech sector in Canada. Sector expanded by 40% in just a few years



# Raising and Retaining Investment

- Since 1999, private investment has increased by \$1.7 billion – up 43%
  - ♦ expected to grow by another \$540 million in 2006, or 10.4% – increase twice the national growth rate
- Renewed the Manufacturing Investment Tax Credit – increased refundable portion from 20% to 35%
- Investment in BizCoach Manitoba mentor support service provided by successful businesses to new entrepreneurs



# Raising and Retaining Investment

- Manitoba's total capital investment in 2006 to increase 14.6%, highest among provinces – Canada at 6.1%
- 2006 investment strong in manufacturing, construction, utilities, mining, trade, education



# Affordable Government Our Business Advantage

- Business taxes reduced by \$146 million since 1999
- Small Business Income Tax rate reduced to 3% in 2007 – 63% drop since 1999
- Doubled the small business tax threshold from \$200,000 to \$400,000



# Affordable Government Our Business Advantage

- First reductions to general Corporation Income Tax rate since the Second World War
- Corporation Income Tax, from 17% in 1999 to 14% in 2007, and subject to Balanced Budget Legislation 13% in 2008 – a 24% reduction overall




# Affordable Government Our Business Advantage

- Budget 2006 doubled the Corporation Capital Tax deduction from \$5 million to \$10 million
  - ♦ reducing the number of firms paying this tax by 19%
  - ♦ Phasing out the general corporation capital tax subject to balanced budget requirements

#### **Internal Rates of Return – Smaller Manufacturing Firm**




#### **Lower Taxes for Manitoba Families**

- \$80 million in new personal income and property taxes savings in Budget 2006
- One education property tax completely eliminated – education support levy for homeowners
- Farmland School Tax reduction commitment was 20% – election promise tripled to 60%
- Middle income tax rate reduction from 16.6% in 1999 to 13% in 2007 – a 22% reduction

Education Property Tax Credit and Education Support Levy Savings for a Home Assessed at \$150,000 in 2006 (Dollars)






# **Growing through Immigration**

- Strengthened programs for immigrants and English as an additional language
   8,884 new immigrants came to Manitoba in 2005/06
- Strengthened immigration integration services and more support for ethnocultural community organizations
- Manitoba Provincial Nominee Program most successful in Canada

# Annual Immigration Increase (Number)





# **Building on our Clean Energy Advantage**

- Increase in Hydro exports from \$363 million in 1999, to all-time high of \$818 million in 2005 125% growth
- Power Smart loans (started in 2001) now supporting \$100 million of home renovations, saving \$3.6 million in energy bills and creating over 800 person/years of employment



# **Building on our Clean Energy Advantage**

- Manitoba has gone from 9th place to 1st place in energy efficiency as rated by the Canadian Energy Efficiency Alliance
- Support for more wind development projects – generating \$2 billion in investment and \$100 million in wind-rights payments for farmers over the next 10 years



# Building our Urban Communities Winnipeg

- Additional \$4.5 million from the Building Manitoba Fund – including more for transit and roads
- \$3 million grant for the City of Winnipeg for property assessment costs
- Increased Winnipeg's share of casino revenues to 10%
- Support for hosting the 94th annual Canadian Football League's Grey Cup



# **Building our Urban Communities Brandon**

- Support for the \$15 million redevelopment of the Keystone Centre
- Relocation of the Assiniboine Community College campus to the former Brandon Mental Health Centre site
- Support for the new Wellness Centre



# **Building our Urban Communities Brandon**

- Neighbourhoods Alive! \$1.8 million to-date for revitalization activities in Brandon
- Cost sharing of ambulance services
- Medical Transportation Co-ordination Centre



# **Building our Municipalities**

- Manitoba continues to be a leader in support for municipalities in Canada

   Statistics Canada reports Manitoba provides the second highest level of per capita funding to municipalities in
  - Canada



# **Building our Municipalities**

- Building Manitoba Fund expanded Manitoba's income and corporation tax revenue sharing to include fuel tax revenue sharing, providing municipalities with three major sources of growth revenue – \$119 million in municipal support in 2005
- Building Manitoba Fund working the way intended – growing by \$7.9 million in 2006



## **Building our Northern Communities**

- Partnering with the federal government and private sector to extend broadband access to 60 remote and Aboriginal communities over the next two years
- Supporting the conversion of the community of South Indian Lake into a reserve for Manitoba's newest First Nation
- Funding for water treatment plans in Sherridon, Duck Bay, Dawson Bay and Mallard



## **Building our Northern Communities**

- Expanding Aboriginal policing and community justice initiatives
- Adding a fifth provincial court judge to serve Aboriginal communities
- Spending \$4 million this year for rehabilitation projects at Lynn Lake, Ruttan, Sherridon and Snow Lake



## **Building our Agricultural Communities**

- More than doubling of support for farm families for 2005/06 – \$129 million provincial contribution to the Canadian Agricultural Income Stabilization program
- Manitoba farmers received over \$500 million in production insurance payments for lost crops over past two years – largest two-year payout on record



# **Building our Agricultural Communities**

- Further enhancement to the Excess Moisture Support Program
- Economic development officers are now in place in each of our 10 GO teams throughout rural Manitoba



## **Building our Rural Communities**

- Growing number of products are being farmed and produced in Manitoba
  - ◆ Associated Proteins in St. Agathe, now in full commercial production, using Manitoba canola and creating rural employment opportunities
  - Mandated use of ethanol, along with federal funding, supporting Husky Oil's \$145 million investment to expand Minnedosa's ethanol plant



## **Building our Rural Communities**

- Partnering with the federal government to deliver a \$1.5 million Biodiesel Production Program
- Budget 2006 eliminated tax on Biodiesel

   provides 11.5-cent-per-litre advantage
   over regular diesel
- New resources to pursue a federal partnership to double the number of Manitoba soil survey teams



### **Commitment to Health Care**

- More doctors, nurses and technologists working and in training
- \$30 million for wait list strategy
- Centre of Excellence in cardiac surgery announced for St. Boniface General Hospital
- Reconstruction of operating and emergency rooms at Health Science Centre



### **Commitment to Health Care**

- Selkirk Mental Health Centre redevelopment
- New MRI for Boundary Trails Hospital in the Winkler/Morden area
- Eliminating the retail sales tax on lancets and blood glucose monitors purchased by diabetics




### **Rural Health Care**

- Since 1999, focused on bringing better care sooner and closer to home for rural Manitobans
  - New or renovated hospitals in Swan River, Brandon, Ste. Anne, Portage la Prairie, Neepawa, Beausejour, Gimli, Steinbach, Thompson and The Pas
  - New Primary Health Centres in Camperville, Waterhen, Flin Flon, Riverton, Niverville, Sprague, Wabowden, The Pas and the RM of Montcalm

#### **Number of Medical Students and Residents**



#### **Number of Nurses**



# **Commitment to Roads & Highways**

## **Commitment to Water Stewardship**

- 30% increase in funding for water infrastructure projects and doubling funding for drainage
- Additional resources for improved drinking water safety initiatives and protection of lakes and waterways
- Creating more conservation districts to advance watershed planning



### **Commitment to Conservation**

- Additional resources for campground upgrades and more cottage lots
- Five new ecological reserves established over last two years
- Resources for the Wabanong Nakaygum Okimawin (WNO) to support community planning along the east side of Lake Winnipeg



- \$7.8 million to help low-income Manitobans with rising shelter costs – providing three times as many individuals and families with support
- Expansion of Healthy Baby program to more community sites and of les centres de la petite enfance et de la famille in francophone schools
- 1,000 bike helmets to support a new bicycle safety program




- \$103 million in child care funding for 2006/07
- No clawback of the federal Universal Child Care Benefit for EIA recipients
  - ♦ helping more than 10,000 young children
  - ♦ total amount available for these low-income families expected to exceed \$10 million per year

- New healthy food and nutrition guidelines for schools and strengthening curriculum for health and physical education
- Pursuing the Kelowna accord and working to close the quality-of-life gap between Aboriginal and non-Aboriginal people
- \$13.6 million more for supported living for persons with mental disabilities
- Funding for the four-year, \$98-million Aging in Place long-term care strategy



- Additional police positions 23 for Winnipeg, two for Brandon and six for Aboriginal communities
- Doubling the Gang Prosecution Unit and expanding the gang strategy to focus on community mobilization and intensive supervision and supports for youth at risk
- Increasing community-based family violence prevention efforts and crisis accommodations for vulnerable adults



- \$2 million in new annual funding for our strategy on crystal meth and addictions
- Expanding the number of Lighthouses for youth around the province to 47
- Support for an innovative community financial service centre pilot project to provide affordable and accessible financial services in Winnipeg's north end
