## INTRODUCTION

This handbook for parents and students outlines graduation requirements for Manitoba High School students (Senior Years).

As we all know, it is important that our education system meet the needs of our students in a changing world. With this in mind, a number of opportunities are available for students to choose courses that are of interest to them while at the same time keeping core courses common to all.

High School students can earn credits for compulsory and optional courses, locally developed courses, distance education courses, post-secondary courses (college and university) and others such as community service.

This Record for parents and students includes:

- the French Immersion Senior Years School Program
- graduation requirements for Manitoba students
- choices for students
- a checklist for parents and students to record the credits earned in the French Immersion Program. This checklist should be kept as a record as the student progresses through high school.

Parents play an important role along with guidance counsellors, teachers and administrators, in helping their children choose the direction of their high school program. By working together we can help students make good choices.

For further information on course outlines and course descriptions or to check course choices with your school's guidance counsellor, contact your school or school division.

## Notes

- In this document, the term "parents" refers to both parents and guardians and is used in recognition that, in some cases, only one parent may be involved in a child's education.
- The Senior Years covers Senior 1 to Senior 4 (formerly Grades 9 to 12).


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## SCHOOL PROGRAMS

From grades 1 to 8, students do not earn credits. At Senior 1 (formerly grade 9), students begin to earn credits, 28 of which are required for graduation at the conclusion of Senior 4 (formerly Grade 12). Four school programs are offered in Manitoba.

A school program is a set of courses leading to one of the following school diplomas:

- High School Diploma (French Immersion Program), diplôme d'études secondaires (programme d'immersion française)
- High School Diploma (English Program)
- Diplôme d'études secondaires (Français Program)
- High School Diploma (Senior Years Technology Education Program)

Attaining one of the four school program diplomas requires satisfactory completion of 28 credits including compulsory and optional subject areas.

This brochure describes one of the programs, the Senior Years French Immersion Program. The other programs are explained in documents written for the Français Program, the English Program, and the Technology Education Program.


## HIGH SCHOOL DIPLOMA French Immersion Program

To meet the requirements of this program, students must complete 28 credits from Senior 1 to Senior 4. Of the 28 credits, a minimum of $\mathbf{1 4}$ credits from courses taught in French is required to obtain the provincial diploma in French Immersion.

- In Senior 1, a minimum of 4 credits at the Senior 1 level is taught in French.
- In Senior 2, a minimum of 4 credits at the Senior 2 level is taught in French.
- In Senior 3, a minimum of 3 credits at the Senior 3 level is taught in French.
- In Senior 4, a minimum of 3 credits at the Senior 4 level is taught in French.

Students must complete 19 compulsory credits from Senior 1 to Senior 4.
These are:

- Français langue seconde - immersion - 4 credits
- English Language Arts - Immersion - 4 credits
- Mathématiques (Mathematics) - 4 credits
- Sciences humaines (Social Studies) - 3 credits
- Sciences de la nature (Science) - 2 credits
- Éducation physique et Éducation à la santé
(Physical Education/Health Education) - 2 credits

Students must complete 9 optional credits from Senior 1 to Senior 4. At least one optional credit must be at the Senior 3 level and at least one optional credit must be at the Senior 4 level. Optional credits can include:

- courses based on department curricula
- School-Initiated Courses (SICs)
- Student-Initiated Projects (SIPs)
- dual credits (university and college courses taken during the Senior Years)
- distance learning
- community service
- Special Language Credit Option
- Private Music Option


Please note that some schools and some school divisions bave chosen to add certain courses to the compulsory list.

## HIGH SCHOOL DIPLOMA

## French Immersion Senior Years Technology Education Program

- Technology Education includes the courses found in the subject areas of business and marketing education, industrial arts, vocational industrial arts and home economics.
- Many students take courses related to this Senior 1 to Senior 4 program to meet part of their optional credit requirements for graduation.
- Certain students may wish to pursue a full Senior Years Technology Education Program and complete 8 to 10 Technology Education credits from within an approved Senior Years Technology Education Program cluster, e.g., Power Mechanics. A cluster of technology education courses must be an approved group of department developed and/or approved courses, which facilitate the transition from school to work.

## CHOICES ${ }_{\text {for }}$ STUDENTS

## Optional Courses

- Province of Manitoba Optional Courses are approved courses in the areas of music, art, technology, home economics, industrial arts, languages, etc. in all grade levels from Senior 1 to Senior 4.


## Locally Developed Curricula (SICs and SIPs)

- School-Initiated Courses (SICs) are curricula that have been developed and approved by schools and school divisions to meet local needs and interests of students. Studentinitiated Projects (SIPs) are curriculum projects that have been developed by students based on their interests and approved by the school. Some examples of SICs and SIPs are Leadership (21G), Mathématiques - Calcul (41G), Musique - Wind Ensemble (31G), and Summer Language Course (41G).
- Many opportunities are provided for SICs and SIPs, including sharing of such courses across the province. Students can select a maximum of 11 SICs and up to 3 SIPs across their Senior Years. Schools are encouraged to consult with parents and other community members about their SIC and SIP offerings.

## Post-Secondary Credits and Senior Years (Dual Credits)

- Senior Years students may take college and university courses for Senior Years graduation credits, for example, Introduction to Psychology (university course) and Safety in the Workplace (college course).
- The student receives a high school credit as well as a university/college credit.
- Students can earn a maximum of five dual credits.
- The decision to participate is a school or school division decision, and funding is also a local matter.
- Parents need to consider that some courses at the post-secondary level may not be accepted equally by all of Manitoba's post-secondary institutions or those beyond Manitoba.

## Distance Learning Courses

- Students may take compulsory or optional courses in either print or online format including courses delivered from outside the province. Two documents on distance learning were recently sent to Manitoba schools.

## Community Service

- Students may earn one Community Service credit (in the form of a SIP) within the 28 credits for graduation.
- Credit for community service activities will be given not simply for participation in an activity, or for the amount of time spent in an activity, but for the achievement of an educational purpose.

## Special Language Credit Option

- The Special Language Credit Option provides for the recognition of Manitoba's linguistic diversity. Students proficient in languages other than English or French are eligible.

Only one special language credit may be earned at each of the Senior Years.

## The Private Music Option

- The Private Music Option is open to students who have successfully obtained standing in the Conservatory Canada Programs or Royal Conservatory of Toronto starting at the grade level for instrument or voice. One credit may be earned at each of the Senior Years.


## Substitution of Credits

- Principals may substitute a maximum of two compulsory credits within Senior 1 to Senior 4 where there is a strong case for doing so. For example, Senior 2 Art or a School-Initiated Course (SIC) could be substituted for Senior 2 Science.



## Challenge for Credit

- The Challenge for Credit Option offers students the opportunity to apply prior knowledge in a particular subject area by demonstrating achievement in the learning outcomes of that course/speciality and receive credit for it.

- Students should ensure that they meet the entrance requirements of the post-secondary education (college or university), training, or work situation they intend to pursue.
- Within the optional subject areas, students must complete one Senior 3 credit and one Senior 4 credit.
- School-Initiated Courses (SICs) and Student-Initiated Projects (SIPs) may be used to fulfil the graduation requirements within the optional credits to a maximum of 11 and 3 respectively. Depending on the different requirements of four school programs, the number of possible SICs used as optional credits may vary.

- Indicate with "FR" courses completed in the French language toward the French Immersion Program Diploma
- Indicate with "EN" courses taken in the English language
- Add up the number of "FR" and "EN" entries in each row (compulsory and optional) from left to right and indicate this total in the last column (where applicable).
- Calculate the sum of the last column to ensure a minimum of 28 credits for graduation.

## PART 2

Remember that to meet the requirements of the French Immersion Program, students must complete 28 credits from Senior 1 to Senior 4 . Of the 28 credits, a minimum of 14 credits from courses taught in French is required to obtain the provincial diploma in French Immersion.

How to determine if you have the required number of courses taught in French:

- Calculate a sum for "FR" courses in each of S1, S2, S3, and S4 columns on the previous page.
- Ensure that a minimum of 14 credits (compulsory and optional) come from courses taught in French and are distributed as such:
- in Senior 1, a minimum of 4 credits from courses taught in French;
- in Senior 2, a minimum of 4 credits from courses taught in French;
- in Senior 3, a minimum of 3 credits from courses taught in French; and
- in Senior 4, a minimum of 3 credits from courses taught in French.
- Indicate the sum for "FR" courses at each grade level in the spaces provided in the following table.
- Add up these 4 results and write the total in the last column.
