## **Definitions**

### **Labour Force**

Persons who were either employed or unemployed during the week prior to the survey.

### **Labour Force Participation Rate**

The percentage of persons 15 years of age and over who are in the labour force.

# **Employed**

Persons who during the week prior to the survey: (1) did any paid work at all (excluding housework, maintenance around the home and volunteer work), or (2) were absent from their job or business because of vacation, illness, labour dispute, etc.

### **Unemployed ('National Criteria')**

Persons available for work during the week prior to the survey who: (1) were without work and had actively looked for work in the previous four weeks, (2) had been on temporary lay-off, or (3) had definite arrangements to start a new job within the next four weeks.

## **Unemployment Rate**

The percentage of the labour force who are unemployed according to the 'National Criteria' definition of unemployment.

### **Unemployed ('No Jobs Available Criteria')**

Refers to persons available for work during the week prior to the survey who: (1) were without work and had actively looked for work in the previous four weeks or had not looked for work because they perceived no jobs to be available, or (2) had been on temporary lay-off, or (3) had definite arrangements to start a new job within the next four weeks.

# **Unemployment Rate ('No Jobs Available Criteria')**

The percentage of the labour force who are unemployed according to the 'No Jobs Available' definition of unemployment.

## **Unemployed ('Want A Job Criteria')**

Refers to persons who were *not currently employed, but say that they want a job*. For persons who were on temporary lay-off or had a job to start within four weeks, 'want a job' refers to a different job.

### **Unemployment Rate ('Want A Job Criteria')**

The percentage of the labour force who are unemployed according to the 'Want A Job' definition of unemployment.

### 3 Regional Centres

Cambridge Bay, Rankin Inlet and Igaluit.

### 8 Medium Communities

Arviat, Baker Lake, Cape Dorset, Gjoa Haven, Igloolik, Kugluktuk, Pangnirtung and Pond Inlet.

### 14 Small Communities

Arctic Bay, Chesterfield Inlet, Clyde River, Coral Harbour, Grise Fiord, Hall Beach, Kimmirut, Pelly Bay, Qikiqtarjuaq, Repulse Bay, Resolute Bay, Sanikiluaq, Taloyoak and Whale Cove.

# Overview

The Northwest Territories Bureau of Statistics conducted a community labour force survey (CLFS) in all communities in the pre-division Northwest Territories during January-March 1999. The data from the survey for Nunavut communities were analyzed by the Nunavut Bureau of Statistics.

Key labour force statistics based on the 1999 CLFS are presented in this report. These statistics are based on responses to questions asked of 6,299 persons living in 2,806 households. Information on the methodology for the survey and sampling errors can be found in the appendices to the report.


Additional information from the survey will be available on the Nunavut Bureau of Statistics' web site (www.stats.gov.nu.ca). Other information collected in the survey includes: (i) characteristics of the employed (such as hours worked, industry and occupation); (ii) information on those not employed (such as whether a job is wanted, willingness to do rotational work and perceived need for training); and (iii) information on activity during the previous year including number of months of wage employment and participation in traditional activities (such as hunting, fishing and trapping). Information will also be available on education, language use, and participation in volunteer and community organizations.

In addition, data will soon be available from the 'Nunavut Add-On' to the CLFS. This 'add-on' survey module collected information on housing, residence and mobility, perceptions with regard to implementation of the Nunavut Land Claim, perceptions with regard to the Nunavut Government, wildlife harvesting, community concerns, and miscellaneous other matters.

# **Highlights**

During winter 1999, an estimated 8,646 residents were working at the time they were surveyed. Another 2,258 persons were unemployed resulting in a total labour force estimate of 10,904 persons. The labour force participation rate was 66.6% based on a population of 16,366 persons 15 years of age and over, while the unemployment rate was 20.7%. An estimated 52.8% of persons 15 years of age and over were employed at the time of the 1999 labour force survey.


# Change in Labour Force Counts, 1989/94/99

The following chart shows that while there was significant growth in the size of the adult population, the size of the labour force, and the number of employed and unemployed persons, the rate of growth in each of these categories was lower during the period 1994 to 1999 than it was during the period 1989 to 1994.


# Percentage Change in Labour Force Counts, 1989/94/99

Nunavut's labour force participation rate and employment rate continue to increase, while the unemployment rate continues to decrease (albeit while remaining above the national average).


# Change in Labour Force Measures, 1989/94/99

As with previous surveys, Nunavut's labour force characteristics in 1999 varied significantly by ethnicity, age, sex, highest level of schooling, community, and type of community.


# **Labour Force Counts, by Ethnicity, 1999**

Inuit were less likely to be in the labour force, having a participation rate of 60.1% – compared to 91.3% for non-Inuit. The employment rate for Inuit was 43.3%, compared to 88.8% for non-Inuit, while the unemployment rate was 28.0% for Inuit compared to 2.7% for non-Inuit.


Examining the labour force characteristics of youth indicates that 15 to 24 year-olds had a participation rate of 48.1% and an unemployment rate of 32.3%. The employment rate for this group was 32.6%, which is in part explained by this age group's participation in schooling.

Males were more likely than females to be in the labour force, with a participation rate of 70.2% – compared to 62.7% for females. Males also had a slightly lower unemployment rate, at 20.6% – compared to 20.8% for females. Examining the employment rate indicates that 55.7% of males 15 years of age or older were employed, compared with 49.6% of females 15 years of age or older.

One of the most significant trends in Nunavut's labour force in recent years has been the increase in participation by Inuit females.

Between 1994 and 1999, employment of Inuit females increased to a greater degree than did employment of Inuit males – while the reverse pattern occurred among non-Inuit.


# Growth in Employment, by Ethnicity and Sex, 1994/99

During the same period, unemployment among Inuit females also increased to a greater degree than did unemployment among Inuit males. Unemployment among non-Inuit males decreased, while unemployment among non-Inuit females was almost unchanged.


# Growth in Unemployment, by Ethnicity and Sex, 1994/99

**Employment Rate, by Highest Level of Schooling, 1999** 





The results of the 1999 CLFS indicate a wide variation in labour market conditions among the communities. For example, the unemployment rate is 41.0% in Igloolik but only 10.4% in Iqaluit.

Employment rates show similar variability. Less than 35% of the adult population in Clyde River and Gjoa Haven was employed at the time of the survey, while in the three Regional Centres (Cambridge Bay, Rankin Inlet and Iqaluit) more than 65% of the adult population had a job.

Between 1994 and 1999, employment increased in the three Regional Centres and the fourteen Small Communities to a greater degree than in the eight Medium Communities.


# Growth in Employment, by Community Type, 1994/99

During the same period, unemployment increased in the Medium Communities to a greater degree than in the Small Communities – while it decreased in the Regional Centres.

# Comparisons to the Rest of Canada

Overall participation in the labour market in Nunavut was 66.6% at the time of the survey, compared to 64.5% in Canada for winter 1999. However, the overall unemployment rate is higher in Nunavut – 20.7% compared to 8.5% for Canada for the comparable period. The employment rate for Nunavut was 52.8% at the time of the survey, while 59.0% of Canadians 15 years of age and older had a job then. Data for all provinces and territories are as follows:

Provincial data are from Statistics Canada's national labour force survey, and are three-month moving averages as reported for March 1999. Data for Nunavut and the Northwest Territories are from the 1999 CLFS. Caution should be used in comparing employment rates among provincial and territorial jurisdictions because of differences in the age structure of the populations.


# **Alternative Definitions of Unemployment**

Nationally, labour force participation and unemployment statistics are calculated based on a labour force defined as (1) persons who are employed, and (2) persons available for work who have actively looked for work during the previous four weeks, who are on temporary lay-off, or who have definite arrangements to start a new job. Calculating labour force statistics for Nunavut based on the 'National Criteria' permits comparisons with labour force statistics produced by Statistics Canada (including the Census).

However, this characterization of the labour force and unemployment is not appropriate for describing the labour market in the many Nunavut communities where few jobs are available, and where the competitions for those jobs are advertised within the community. An alternative definition for the labour force would include as unemployed those who had not looked for work because they perceived no jobs to be available. In this report, this alternative definition is termed the 'No Jobs Available Criteria'.

A second alternative definition for the labour force would define the unemployed as those who answered "Yes" to Question 23 of the 1999 CLFS: "Does ... want a job?" In this report, this second alternative definition is termed the 'Want A Job Criteria'.

# Methodology

## **Survey Organization**

- The labour force questionnaire and the survey methodology were developed by the Northwest Territories (NWT) Bureau of Statistics in consultation with a Government of the Northwest Territories (GNWT) interdepartmental working group, GNWT staff based in Igaluit, and senior officials of the Office of the Interim Commissioner of Nunavut.
- Survey operations, training, and organization of community interviewers were undertaken by NWT Bureau of Statistics staff. Senior Interviewers were recruited and trained by NWT Bureau of Statistics staff in Yellowknife. Senior Interviewers then recruited and trained interviewers in each community. An interviewer manual was prepared and provided to all senior and community interviewers.
- All questionnaires were interviewer administered, with most interviews being completed during the period of mid-January through to the end of March 1999. Interviews were conducted 'face to face' in Nunavut communities.
- A copy of the questionnaire is available from the Nunavut Bureau of Statistics.

## **Sampling Procedures**

- The requirement for statistically reliable estimates of labour force activity indicators at the community level dictated sampling procedures used for the 1999 CLFS.
- Random sampling procedures were used in several communities. The sampling frame
  used for the 1999 CLFS in most communities was the NWT Bureau of Statistics' dwelling
  listing. Random sampling was used in the following communities: Arviat, Baker Lake,
  Cambridge Bay, Clyde River, Gjoa Haven, Igloolik, Iqaluit, Kugluktuk, Pangnirtung, Pond
  Inlet and Rankin Inlet.
- In the remaining Nunavut communities, an attempt was made to survey all dwellings to ensure sample sizes sufficiently large for the release of community-level statistics.
- A survey questionnaire was completed for each sampled dwelling and included information
  for all persons fifteen years of age and over who normally resided in the dwelling. Where an
  individual was not present, responses were accepted from other household members.
- Persons residing in unorganized areas were excluded from the survey.

# **Data Entry and Processing**

- As Senior Interviewers returned completed questionnaires, each questionnaire was
  reviewed and obvious corrections and edits were made. In some cases, respondents were
  re-contacted for clarification of survey responses.
- Data entry was completed directly from questionnaires into a database, and statistical tables were then prepared using SPSS (Statistical Package for the Social Sciences).

## **Edit and Imputation of Data**

- Following data entry, computer-assisted edits were performed to check for data entry errors and logical inconsistencies among responses.
- Where information on labour force variables was missing, an attempt was made to impute
  values based on other answers for the same person. Where this was not possible, the
  imputation procedure used information from another person. Such donor persons were
  selected by randomized computer matches and an attempt was made to select persons in
  the same community and who were the same sex, ethnic group and of similar age.

## **Questionnaires Received and Sample Weighting**

- A total of 2,806 household questionnaires were received with information provided for 6,299 persons 15 years of age and older. The count of persons for which information was provided from each community (sample size) is presented in Appendix 1 and Appendix 2.
- Weighting of the statistical file was undertaken so that labour force activity statistics were based on estimated numbers of males and females for specific age categories and ethnic groups. Weighting of the sample was done at the community level.
- Due to the use of weighting procedures, totals for tables in this report do not necessarily sum
- As noted in the introduction, population estimates used for weighting are based on published estimates of Nunavut's population produced by Statistics Canada and community population estimates produced by the NWT Bureau of Statistics.

## **Sampling and Non-Sampling Errors**

- Information on the sample sizes and sampling errors is summarized in Appendix 1 and Appendix 2. Community and territorial level standard errors and coefficients of variation are provided for the estimates of labour force, employed, and unemployed; and for labour force participation, unemployment rates and employment rates. This information should be considered when statistics from this report are being used.
- The standard error statistic is used to determine confidence intervals for estimates of population values based on a sample. Most often, the 95 percent confidence interval, which should contain the true population value 19 times out of 20, is used. To determine the 95 percent confidence interval for an estimate, the standard error is doubled.
- For example the estimate of unemployment in Pond Inlet is 110 persons. From Appendix 1, the standard error for the estimate of unemployed persons is 12 persons. Twice the standard error is 24, meaning that 19 times out of 20 the number of unemployed persons in Pond Inlet is in the interval 110 ± 24 persons, that is between 86 and 134 persons. Such interval estimates are highly conservative and most often population values are quite close to their corresponding sample estimates.
- The other measure of sampling error, provided in Appendix 2, is the coefficient of variation (CV). This statistic is the ratio of the standard error to the sample estimate, indicating the percentage error implicit in the estimate. In the case of the unemployed in Pond Inlet, the coefficient of variation is 10.9%.
- Another source of error in surveys is referred to as non-sampling errors. These errors result from incorrect answers being given to questions, data entry errors, etc. Surveys are designed to help minimize such errors. Generally, the effect of such errors is not known.
