FINANCIAL SUPPORTS

• Child Care Subsidies

Parents are eligible for a Child Care Subsidy if they:

- Have a job
- Are looking for a job (limited to 8 weeks every 6 months)
- Are going to school or taking a training program
- Have medical needs (they need a note from the doctor to verify their condition)
- Have special needs (a Special Needs plan must be completed by an appropriate professional).

The amount of the subsidy is calculated by total family income, allowable deductions, number of children in care and the number of days of care required per week. Parents are notified in writing of the amount of the subsidy. The subsidy will be paid by the government directly to the child care.

• Child-Related Income Support Program (CRISP)

CRISP helps lower income families with the cost of raising their children. Applications may be submitted anytime during the year. If eligible, you would receive a monthly supplement of up to \$30 per month per child. You may be eligible if you:

- live in Manitoba;
- have a child or children under 18 living with you and in your care;
- have a valid Manitoba Health Registration Number that includes these dependent children;
- receive the Canada Child Tax Benefit payment for these children;
- have a family income within the specified levels.

Persons who receive <u>income assistance</u> are not eligible for CRISP benefits; however, those who receive only the <u>health care benefits</u> portion of income assistance may apply.

Healthy Baby Prenatal Benefits

This is a monthly cheque for low income, pregnant women to help them buy the nutritious food they need during their pregnancy. The benefit can start after your 14th week of pregnancy and ends in the month of your baby's due date The amount of the cheque depends on how much money you (and your spouse) earned last year. (It must be less than \$32,000). Many people receive about \$80 per month.

• Healthy Start for Mom & Me

This program offers pre and postnatal classes for newcomers who do not speak English. (Those who speak English can be referred to another Healthy Start program in Winnipeg.)

New or expectant families will learn about having a baby in Canada. A nurse and dietitian will be available to answer your questions.

The classes are offered two Mondays per month from 1:30 - 3:30 p.m.

(Please call 949-5350 if you plan to attend a class, so that an interpreter can be available to assist you.)

Participants will receive:

• On-site babysitting for children under 5 years of age.

- A snack
- Bus tickets, if you need them to attend the classes
- Milk coupons for mothers during their pregnancy and for six months after the baby is born.

• Manitoba Shelter Benefit (MSB) for Families

Financial assistance, of up to \$200 per month, is available to eligible families who rent their living accommodation in the private market and who are required to spend a large portion of their income on rent. The benefit is based on household income and rent paid.

Eligibility:

More than 25% of household income must be spent on rent and the applicant must:

- have one or more dependents under 18 and get the Canada Child Tax Benefit; and
- be a renter in Manitoba; and
- be a Canadian citizen, landed immigrant or refugee claimant; and
- be in a two person family (one parent/guardian with one child) with an annual household income of \$19,380 or less; or be in a three person family (one parent/guardian with two children or two parents/guardians with one child) with an annual household income of \$20,940 or less; or be in a four or more person family (one parent/guardian with three or more children or two parents/guardians with two or more children) with an annual household income of \$21,780 or less.

You cannot get the MSB for Families if:

- you rent from The Manitoba Housing Authority, or
- get another type of housing benefit, or
- get Employment and Income Assistance

• Employment Insurance

Employment Insurance (EI) provides temporary financial assistance for unemployed Canadians while they look for work or upgrade their skills. Canadians who are sick, pregnant or caring for a newborn or adopted child, as well as those who must care for a family member who is seriously ill may also apply for Employment Insurance.

• Employment and Income Assistance (EIA)

EIA is a program that helps people who have no other way to pay for basic personal and family financial needs. Wherever possible, the program helps them find a job or get back to work.

Employment and Income Assistance does the following:

- provides income assistance to persons in need;
- provides employability assessments, personal job planning, work incentives and other supports to help participants enter or re-enter the labour force; and
- offers additional financial assistance to persons with disabilities who are receiving income assistance, to help them pay for some of the costs associated with their disability.

• Canada Child Tax Benefit (CCTB)

The Canada Child Tax Benefit is a tax-free monthly payment made to low and middle income families to help them with the cost of raising children who are under the age of 18. Community Volunteer Income Tax Program

Income tax assistance for low income people. Specially trained volunteers help people to complete their income tax return if their tax situation is simple.

Volunteers do not complete income tax returns for deceased persons, bankrupt individuals, or individuals who have capital gains or losses, employment expenses, or business or rental income and expenses.

Goods and Services Tax Credit

The GST credit is a tax-free quarterly payment that helps individuals and families with low and modest incomes to offset all or part of the GST or HST that they pay.

To receive the GST/HST credit, you have to apply for it, even if you received it last year. To apply, **you have to file an income tax an benefit return for 2005**, even if you have no income to report. You may be eligible for a refund anyway.

• Tax Credit for Public Transit Pass

This is a tax credit for the cost of buying monthly bus passes. You will be able to claim the tax credit on your 2006 income tax return for the amounts you have paid for bus passes after June 30, 2006.

You must keep your expired monthly transit passes every month after June 2006 to support your claim.

• Lifelong Learning Plan

The Lifelong Learning Plan (LLP) allows you to withdraw amounts from your RRSP to finance training or education for you or your spouse or common-law partner. You cannot use the RRSP funds to finance a child's education, such as your child or the child of your spouse or common-law partner.
