- your training and work experience are in demand in Manitoba
- you have a guaranteed job offer
- you have family or community support to assist you upon your arrival

Other considerations include age, education, recent work experience, language skills and spouse's occupation.

Our program works in partnership with employers, communities and ethnocultural organizations to identify needs, connect with and assist potential immigrants. You do not need to pay an immigration representative to apply to the Manitoba Provincial Nominee Program and you will not receive special consideration if you do.
