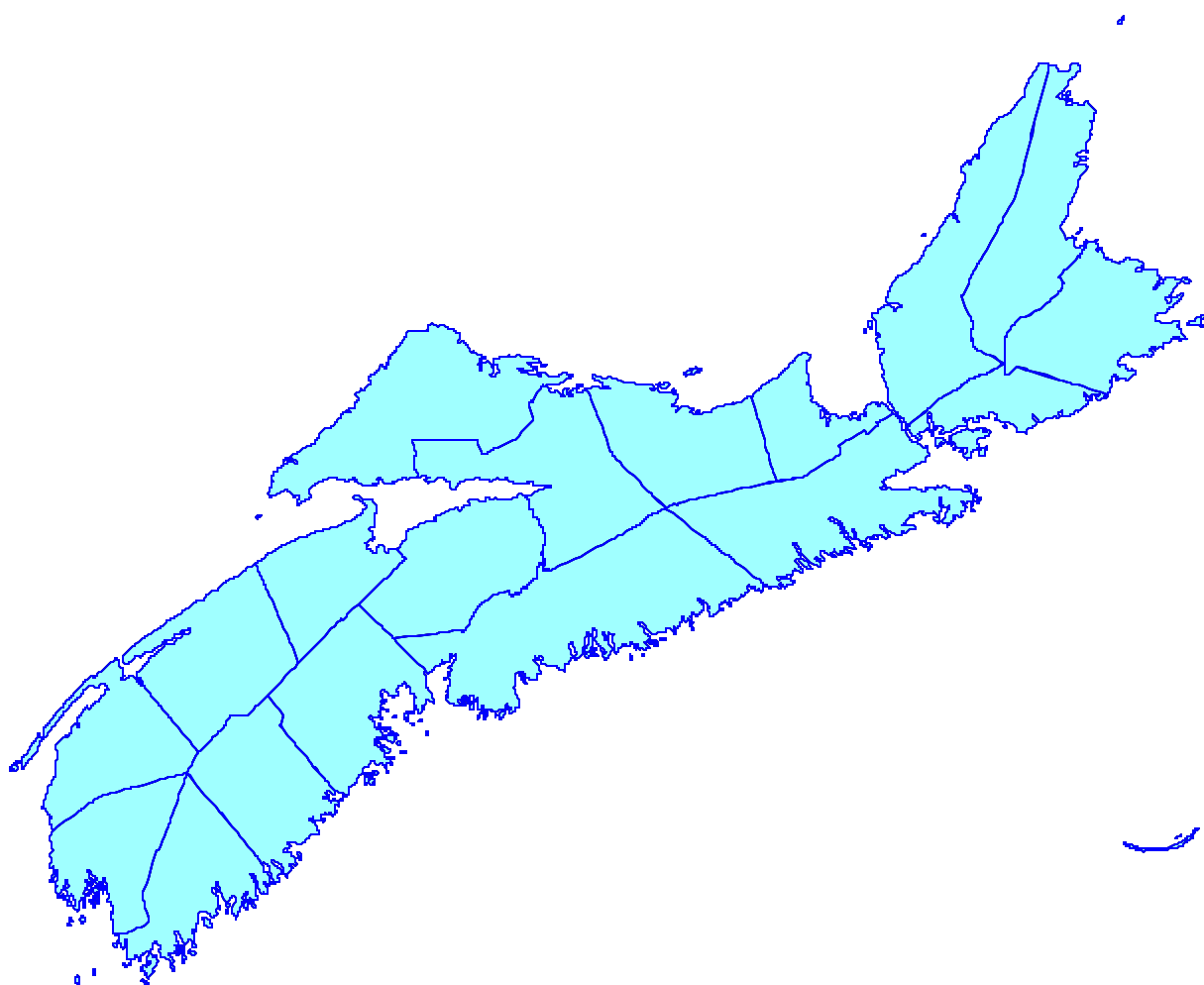

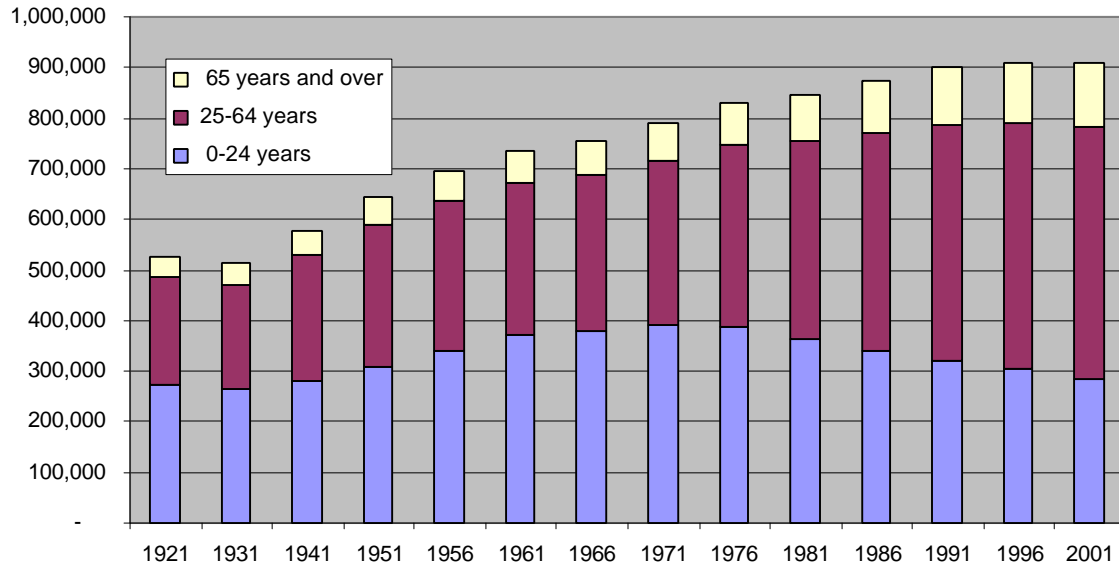
NOVA SCOTIA HIGHLIGHTS FROM THE 2001 CENSUS OF CANADA
Age and Sex

- ! Young people under twenty years of age made up 25% of the population, those aged 20 to 64 had a 61.1% representation and seniors aged 65 and above had a 13.9% representation.
- ! Nova Scotia and Quebec tied for highest median age for all provinces and territories. At 38.8 years the median age was well above the 37.6 years seen at the national level. This is the greatest ten year growth in median age this century.
- ! Nova Scotia has the third highest proportions of people aged 65 and over in the country. It has increased from 12.6% in 1991 to 13.9% in the latest census. The proportion of elderly people aged eighty years and over rose 38% during the same period to number 34,235.
- ! The working age population is also getting older. Those aged 25 to 34 declined 26% over the last decade while those aged 45 to 64 increased 35% over the same period. Projections show this group rising a further 25% over the next decade.
- ! There were 165 people aged 100 or more. Women represented 87.8% of this group
- ! Nova Scotia had the lowest ratio of men to women in Canada at 93.6. The Canada average was 96.1 with the highest ratio found in Nunavit at 107.2.

Nova Scotia Historical Population Growth by Age Group



- Based on the 2001 unadjusted Census of Population, Nova Scotia's total population has shown a small decline from 909,300 to 908,000 between 1996 and 2001.
- As shown in the above graph, the composition of the population by age group has changed dramatically since 1971.
- In 1971, the number of people under the age of 25 peaked at 389,400 and has since declined to 283,000 in 2001.
- The 25 to 64 age group continues to grow although at a slightly slower pace than experienced in the 1971 to 1996 period. In 2001, there were 498,500 people aged 25 to 64 compared to 327,100 in 1971.
- The number of seniors, aged 65 and over, increased from 72,500 in 1971 to 126,600 in 2001, an increase of 75%. In Canada the number of seniors increased 123%.
- In Canada the number of working age population and seniors increased at a faster rate than in Nova Scotia. The sharp decline of the under 25 age population in Nova Scotia contrasts with only a slight decrease of this age group for Canada. As a result, Nova Scotia's seniors as a share of total population is increasing at a faster rate than the Canadian average.
