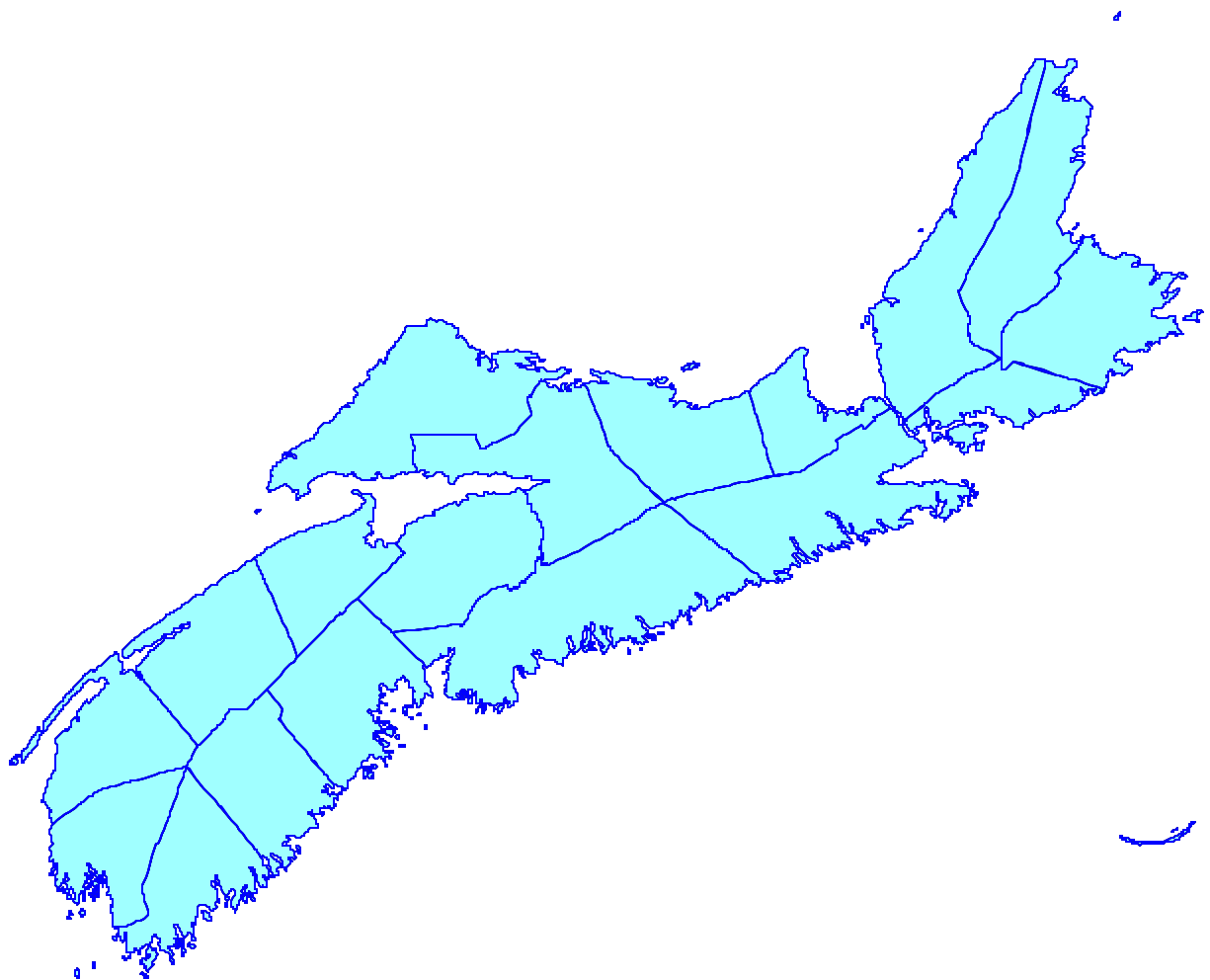

**Ethnic Origin, Citizenship and

NOVA SCOTIA HIGHLIGHTS FROM THE 2001 CENSUS OF CANADA

Immigration

- ! In Canada, the foreign-born population as a proportion of the total population is at its highest point in seventy years. During the same period the proportion of immigrants in Nova Scotia has fallen to nearly half of what it was in 1931.
- ! Since 1951 the proportion of immigrants in the Nova Scotia population has been very stable. It has remained between 4.5% and 5.0% of the total population for 50 years. In 2001 the immigrant population numbered 41,320 or 4.6% of the population. The highest proportion of 8.3% was reached in 1921 while the lowest proportion of 4.4% occurred in 1991.
- ! There were 5.4 million immigrants in Canada in 2001 representing 18.4% of the population. The Canadian rate was highest in 1921 at 22.3% and lowest in 1951 at 14.7%. During the latest ten year period (1991-2001) the proportion of immigrants has risen 2.3 percentage points at the nation level and 0.2 percentage points in Nova Scotia.
- ! Immigrants that settled in Nova Scotia have traditionally come from the United Kingdom, United States and Europe. During the ten year period (1961 to 1970) 61.5% of immigrants were from Europe, 36.5% were from the United Kingdom, 18% were from the United States, 13.0% were from Asia and 3.0% were from the Middle East. The origin of immigrants to Nova Scotia has changed significantly over thirty years. The latest ten year period shows that 45.0% of immigrants were from Asia, 29.3% were from Europe, 21.9% were from the Middle East, 11.8% were from the United States and 6.8% were from the United Kingdom.
- ! Slightly more females than males have immigrated to Nova Scotia. Females represented 52% of immigrants while males made up 48%.
- ! Most immigrants who settled in Nova Scotia were aged twenty years or more when they immigrated (59.8%) but 12.2% were under five years of age and 28.0% were between five and nineteen years of age.
- ! The large metropolitan areas of Canada attract the vast majority of immigrants. Nearly 73% of immigrants who came to Canada in the last decade settled in Toronto, Vancouver and Montreal. Only 0.4% settled in Halifax during that period.
- ! Most immigrants to Nova Scotia have settled in Halifax County and the central mainland. Halifax County was home to 59.0% of immigrants, followed by 6.3% in Kings County and 4.9% in Lunenburg County.

Ethnic Origin and Visible Minority

- ! The top ethnic origins reported in Nova Scotia are reflective of the historical settlement by peoples from the British Isles, France and other European countries. The vast majority of people reported these countries as either their single ethnic origin or as part of a multiple ethnic origin.
- ! In 2001, over Half (50.7%) of Nova Scotians indicated Canadian as their single ethnic origin, followed by British Isles (30.8%), European (7.2%) and French (5.5%).
- ! There were 34,525 people, or 3.8% of the provincial population, classified as visible minorities. Blacks represented more than half (57.0%) of the visible minority population, followed by Arabs (10.5%), Chinese (9.5%) and South Asians (8.4%).
- ! Most visible minorities lived in the Halifax Metropolitan Area. In 2001 there were 25,100 visible minorities representing 72.7% of the provincial visible minority population living in Halifax CMA. Visible minorities made up 7% of the population of Halifax, up from 6% in 1991.

Aboriginal Peoples

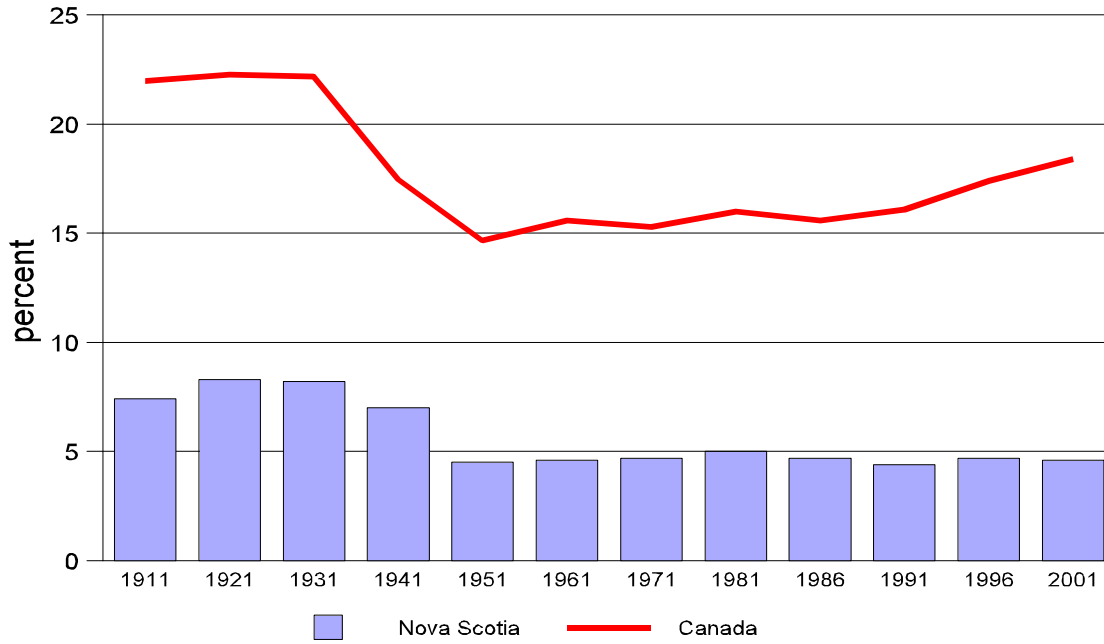
- ! In 2001 there were 17,015 people in Nova Scotia with an Aboriginal identity representing 1.9% of the total provincial population. In 1996 there were 11,985 people with an Aboriginal identity representing 1.3% of the total population. This growth is much higher than that found in the population as a whole at both the provincial and national level.
- ! Registered Indians made up 63.9% of the Aboriginal identity population.
- ! Less than half (43.3%) of the Aboriginal identity population in the province live on reserve. Of the 56.7% who live off reserve half live in rural areas and half live in urban areas.
- ! The largest reserve in Nova Scotia is Eskasoni with an aboriginal population of 2,720 people followed by Indian Brook with 905 people, Whycocomagh with 630 people and Millbrook with 615 people. There are twenty-four reserves in the province.
- ! The Aboriginal population is much younger than the population as a whole. The median age for Nova Scotia's Aboriginal population in 2001 was 25.3 years while the median age for the Non-Aboriginal population was 38.7 years.

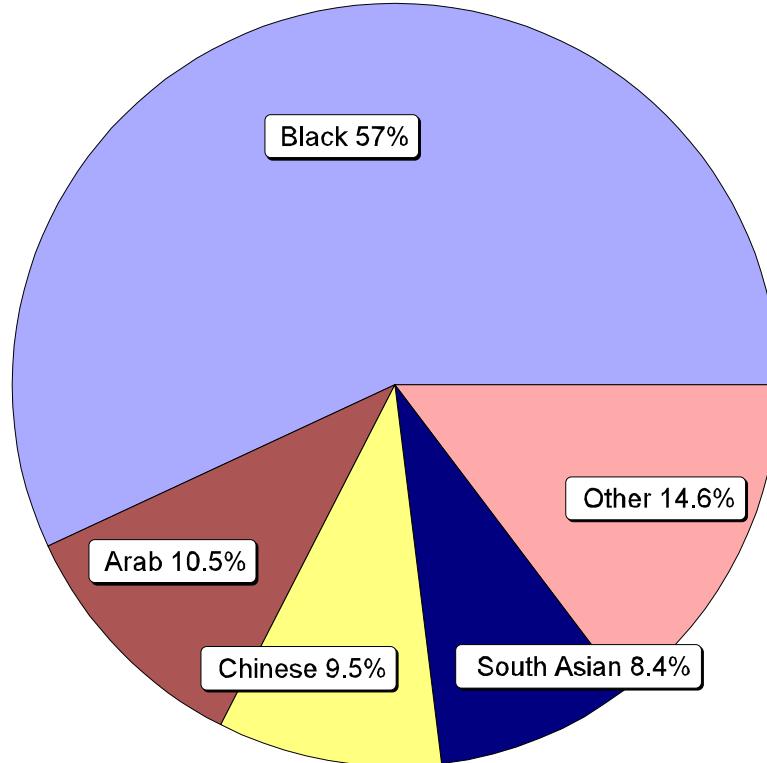
Immigrant Population as a Percent of Total Population
