Message from the Minister of Justice

In the spring of 2004, our government responded to recommendations from a committee that reviewed the *Freedom of Information and Protection of Privacy Act*. That committee was chaired by Mr. Peter O'Brien. One recommendation called on the Minister of Justice to issue an annual report on the *Freedom of Information and Protection of Privacy Act*. I accepted that recommendation, among others, and released the first such annual report in May 2004. This second annual report is evidence of my commitment to continue this important practice.

The following pages provide a thorough summary of activity under the *Freedom of Information* and *Protection of Privacy Act* over the most recent five years where data was available. In addition, for the first time we have been able to gather and provide statistics on all "public bodies" and municipalities that are known to receive Freedom of Information applications under the legislation. Because we rely on other organizations to provide statistics, we caution that we cannot guarantee 100 per cent accuracy. However, it is our view that the information contained in this report is a reasonably accurate representation of activities under the legislation. It does not, with the exception of fees, reflect the statistics of the Freedom of Information and Protection of Privacy Review Office, which publishes its own report.

In the fall of 2003, we also required all government departments, agencies, boards, and commissions to develop routine access policies so people would not have to file a formal Freedom of Information application. I am pleased to report that it is my understanding that all government departments, agencies, boards, and commissions known to currently receive formal applications under the *Act* now have such policies. In addition, all but a few can be easily accessed through government web sites. The statistics on the number of requests received through this process are not included here, but it is our intention to provide such a report at the end of the next fiscal year, to include routine access activity over a three-year period.
