

Canadian Centre on Substance Abuse (CCSA) and Youth Solvent Addiction Committee Formalize Partnership

OTTAWA, Dec. 6, 2004/CNW/ - The Canadian Centre on Substance Abuse (CCSA), Canada's national addictions agency, has formalized their partnership with the Youth Solvent Addiction Committee (YSAC) by signing a Memorandum of Agreement. This agreement underscores the commitment to continued collaboration to address the issue of solvent abuse among youth.

CCSA and YSAC have worked together informally since 2002, cooperating on a number of projects aimed at sharing information, networks and resources related to substance abuse, addictions and First Nations youth. The first official activity under this new agreement will be Youth Solvent Prevention Poster Contest.

In an effort to raise awareness about solvent abuse, CCSA and YSAC are co-sponsoring a poster contest directed at Canadian children or youth. Participants are invited to submit a prevention poster design focusing on key themes such as the harms of solvent use and how to say no to solvent use.
