Key Themes:

- Roles and responsibilities need to be clearly defined in standards.
- Clearly defining who does what, including the ministries, regional health authorities, long-term care operators, residents, and their families will help make the systems more similar across the health regions.
- It is good the standards focus on the individual resident.
- Long-term care in rural areas often has different challenges than in urban areas.
- Residents are having increased care needs at a time when there is less professional staff.
- Communication between care givers, care planners, families, and residents is crucial.
- Standards should be understandable, measurable and consistent across the province.
- Funding differs in each health region.
- Increased funding is important to making the new standards work.
- Give residents the option of keeping their current doctor or using their facility's doctor.
- Support doctors and other care givers when they have difficult decisions to make.
- The needs of younger people in long-term care should be addressed by the standards.
- Concern for safety should extend to staff and protect them from abuse by residents' families.
