## **Key Themes:**

- Standards provide more direction on the care to be given to residents and are flexible to meet resident care needs.
- Standards will help improve health and housing services.
- Standards should apply consistently to everyone.
- Make sure standards can be revised as new ideas, medical tools, and types of care are developed.
- Balance quality of care with quality of life.
- Younger people could benefit from living in a long-term care facility that is focused on caring for younger people.
- Use incentives to get facilities to provide the care and services they should be providing.
- Keep people in their communities when they need care.
- Important for people to plan how they want to be cared for before they get too sick.
- Affordability concerns for people who could live in supportive living instead of long-term care.
- Legislation needs to catch up to the standards, and definitions of terms should be consistent.
- There are not enough geriatric doctors.
- People should have the choice of keeping their current doctor when they move into long-term care.
- The system cannot be all things to all people.
- Along with the new standards, provide funding for staff, education and training, and care management tools.
- Give residents choices, while ensuring they are living in the right kind of facility and receiving the right kind of care.
