Key Themes:

Building standards need to be reviewed.

- Concern about how special diets are provided in different types of facilities.
- Need an effective complaint process that deals with concerns seriously and quickly.
- Encouraging facilities to meet the standards in a positive manner should be the first step.
- Protection for Persons in Care Act would be more effective if it could enforce its recommendations.
- Terminology needs to be the same throughout Alberta.
- Facilities need to be allowed to not admit someone if there are safety concerns to protect residents and staff.
- Difficult to create one set of standards for such a variety of health and housing services.
- Standards and new legislation should allow for using creativity to meet individual needs of residents.
- Staff are important to providing care and need to be recognized for this to lower the staff turnover rate.
- Make sure standards set out realistic expectations and are understandable to residents and their families.
- More funding and staff are required.
- Need to train non-professional care staff after they are hired for rural facilities, because most of these staff cannot afford to leave their communities to go to school.
- People need to make decisions about their future care before they are unable to make these decisions.
