



In Alberta, minors are prohibited from participating in provincial gaming activities, and that includes purchasing, playing or cashing in lottery tickets.

#### DON'T GAMBLE WITH THEIR FUTURE

The AADAC Alberta Youth Experience Survey (TAYES) 2002 shows that over 40 per cent of youth gamble with the most common form being playing scratch tickets.

According to AADAC, minors are three times more likely to have a problem with gambling than adults so it is important to prevent their involvement.

# YOU BET WE'LL CHECK

## IT'S NOT WORTH THE GAMBLE

If you're unsure of a lottery ticket purchaser's age ... ask for ID.

Acceptable forms of ID include

- Driver's Licence
- Alberta Registries Identification Card
- Passport
- Photo Possession Only Licence
- Photo Possession and Acquisition Licence
- Armed Forces ID
- Out-of-Province Photo Driver's Licence
- Indian Status Card
- Immigration Authorization Card

## IF NO PROOF OF AGE IS PRODUCED

- Decline the sale or service.
- Be professional and courteous.
- Indicate to the consumer that AGLC prohibits sale or service to minors.
- Refer to signage.
- Ask the consumer to leave.
- Request assistance from a supervisor if necessary.

## IF CHALLENGED ON THE REQUEST FOR ID

- Stay calm.
- Be professional and courteous.
- Refer the customer to the supervisor or manager.
- Notify management and the authorities if necessary.
