# Alberta Learning's Mission to Asia

October 20 to November 7, 2002

## Overview

Minister Oberg led an Alberta Learning - Team Alberta Mission to Asia from October 20 – November 7, 2002. Delegates included representatives from both Alberta's K-12 and post-secondary sectors. The mission was focused on two primary objectives: to reinforce long-standing education-based relationships between Alberta and our Asian partners, and to facilitate opportunities for Alberta's education providers in the Asian market.

The mission included visits to Sapporo, Tokyo, Harbin, Beijing, Hanoi and Bangkok.

# **Mission Highlights**

- Nine Educational Cooperation Agreements were signed between Alberta educational institutions and international partners. These agreements encouraged collaboration in areas of medical education, telemedicine/distance education, student exchanges, and faculty and teacher exchanges.
- An invitation by China's Vice Minister of Education to collaborate on the delivery of an Alberta high school program through two Chinese partner schools.
- The opportunity to promote the expertise of Alberta's postsecondary system in the field of customized corporate training to key corporate contacts in Tokyo.
- The signing of a letter of intent with the Education and Training Centre of the Ministry of Labour and Social Security, People's Republic of China, for future collaboration in the field of apprenticeship and industry training.

# **Mission Objectives**

The key objectives of the mission were:

- To promote Alberta's world-class education system.
- To reinforce and promote international partnerships.
- To promote study in Alberta opportunities.
- To market Alberta's expertise in educational goods and services.

## **Mission Results**

#### Japan

During Minister Oberg's meeting with Vice Governor Yamaguchi of Hokkaido, the Minister thanked the Hokkaido Government for their ongoing support of educational partnerships with Alberta. The success of the Hokkaido Teachers of English pilot program was discussed as well as the potential to expand the program to other prefectures in Japan.

While meeting with officials from the Hokkaido Department of Education, the Minister encouraged representatives from both Hokkaido and Alberta to seek out opportunities for further partnerships and collaboration. Minister Oberg formally recognized the Hokkaido Department of Education for its support of the Regional Exchange for Mutual Understanding (REX) Teacher Program and the Hokkaido Socio-Cultural Program. These programs provided Japanese language teachers to Alberta, and a scholarship for an Albertan to study in Hokkaido.

The Hokkaido Department of Education hosted the Hokkaido-Alberta Education Forum. Alberta delegates and representatives from Hokkaido's K-12 and post-secondary sectors discussed alternatives for professional development opportunities for educators. Forum participants explored mutual areas of interest including the globalization of education, providing students with second language learning opportunities, internationalization, and future educational exchanges between Hokkaido and Alberta.

In Tokyo, Alberta delegates participated in a presentation delivered by a representative from Japan's Ministry of Education, Culture, Sports, Science and Technology (MEXT). Delegates cited opportunities for Alberta education providers, in conjunction with MEXT, to cultivate "Japanese with English Abilities". MEXT shared plans to; provide additional scholarships for Japanese

teachers to pursue university study abroad; to expand the number of Japanese high school exchanges with English speaking nations; and to increase the funding provided to Japanese teachers seeking training overseas.

Representatives of Alberta's post-secondary sector accompanied Minister Oberg to business meetings with key Alberta corporate contacts in Tokyo, including Fujitsu and Nippon Oil. Minister Oberg conveyed the message that many Alberta post-secondary institutions have strengths in customized corporate training and are interested in doing business in Japan.

During a visit to Meiji University Minister Oberg addressed a group of University of Alberta students enrolled in Japanese 401. Portions of the University of Alberta's Japanese 401 course are delivered by Meiji University staff in Tokyo.

The delegation met with more than 100 representatives of Japan's education sector at a reception at the Canadian Embassy in Tokyo. Delegates promoted opportunities to study in Alberta, and explored educational partnerships. While in Japan, Minister Oberg presided over the signing of five Educational Cooperation Agreements between Alberta and Japanese educational institutions. These agreements encouraged collaboration in the areas of community/rural medicine, medical education, telemedicine/distance education, student exchanges, and faculty and teacher exchanges.

#### China

During a meeting with Minister Oberg, Vice Governor Wang Xianmin of Heilongjiang expressed support for the strong educational ties with Alberta and the many exchanges between the two provinces. The continuation of the Alberta International Education Ministerial Awards was reaffirmed by Minister Oberg, and possible new educational partnerships were discussed with the Heilongjiang Education Commission. These possibilities include English as a Second Language training opportunities for the Commission's teachers, short-term education programs for Heilongjiang students, and institutional linkages between Heilongjiang and Alberta institutions that offer degree programs.

The Heilongjiang-Alberta Education Forum provided mission participants with an opportunity to network with educational representatives from Heilongjiang's secondary and post-secondary sectors. Important groundwork was laid for future collaboration.

Over 70 guests attended a reception in Harbin. The guests represented Alberta's current and key contacts from throughout Heilongjiang's education sector.

At a reception in the Canadian Embassy in Beijing, Minister Oberg delivered a speech to corporate and educational associates of the University of Calgary. Canada's Ambassador to China, Joseph Caron, welcomed the Alberta delegation to Beijing and commended Minister Oberg for leading the delegation to China.

Minister Oberg and the Alberta delegation attended a meeting and briefing session with Canadian Embassy Officials in Beijing. Topics of discussion included, the timely issuance of student visas, and student recruitment in China.

The Minister met with Vice Minister Zhang Xin Sheng of the Ministry of Education in China. Vice Minister Zhang invited Minister Oberg to explore the possibility of delivering the Alberta high school program in two partner schools in China.

Minister Oberg signed of a letter of intent with the Education and Training Centre of the Ministry of Labour and Social Security, People's Republic of China, for future collaboration in apprenticeship and industry training. The Minister then presided over the signing of four other Educational Cooperation Agreements between Alberta and Chinese educational institutions. These agreements encouraged collaboration in the areas of joint externally funded projects, faculty and staff exchange and student exchanges.

#### Vietnam

During a meeting with Canadian Embassy officials in Hanoi, the delegation received an overview of the economic situation in Vietnam. Minister Oberg met with Mr. Le Vu Hung, Vice Minister of Education and Training for Vietnam. Vice Minister Hung expressed a strong interest in discussing a possible Memorandum of Understanding to promote future collaboration in the area of basic education.

Minister Oberg met with the Vietnam Investment Review, Vietnam's leading international business newspaper. The interview added profile to the mission and showcased Alberta's world class learning system. The size of the Alberta delegation was viewed as impressive as it was the largest Canadian education delegation that has ever travelled to Vietnam.

The Alberta delegation met with the Canada Vietnam Business Association. Delegates had the opportunity to gather market specific information relating to the provision of educational services in Hanoi.

During a meeting with the Ministry of Labour, Invalids and Social Affairs (MOLISA), Deputy Minister Nguyen Luong Trao expressed interest in establishing a "train-the-trainer" program where Alberta faculty would train Vietnamese educators teaching in the field of technical and vocational education. The possibility of exploring a joint scholarship program was also discussed.

The delegation visited a school, a technical institute and a university in Hanoi. Discussions with educational leaders centered on school twinnings, the exchange and sale of curriculum (entrepreneurship and information technology), and teacher development.

The mission to Vietnam resulted in greater visibility for Alberta institutions in Vietnam's educational marketplace. In addition, considerable progress was made in establishing Alberta's

educational sector as a contracting source for International Financial Institution (IFI) projects.

#### **Thailand**

Minister Oberg and the delegation met with Dr. Rung, Director General of the Office of the National Education Commission (ONEC). The Commission is instrumental in leading education reform initiatives in Thailand. The meeting provided the delegation with an opportunity to identify areas of mutual interest and explore future possibilities for the exchange of educational expertise.

Minister Oberg met with Dr. Adireksarn Pongpol, the Minister of Education for Thailand. Minister Oberg shared with Dr. Pongpol, Alberta's strengths in apprenticeship, technical and vocational education, rural education and agricultural training. Minister Oberg invited Dr. Pongpol to visit Alberta to discuss future areas of educational collaboration between Alberta and Thailand.

The meetings with Dr. Sadimani of SEAMES (Southeast Asia Ministers of Education Secretariat) and Dr. Shaeffer of UNESCO (United Nations Educational, Scientific and Cultural Organization) provided the delegation with an opportunity to review areas for future collaboration. These may include quality assurance in education, accessibility (distance learning, open learning, technology in education), good governance, health programming (epidemiology, telehealth, and telemedicine) and occupational standards.

The delegation visited several elementary and secondary schools in Bangkok. Opportunities for student and staff exchanges, collaborative curriculum projects in second languages, and twinning agreements were discussed.

A "Study in Alberta" seminar provided delegates with the opportunity to recruit Thai students. Thai students met with each Alberta institution or school directly to obtain specific course and program information.

Minister Oberg and the delegation toured the Royal Chitralada Projects. The Royal Chitralada Projects include applied research activities in agriculture, food processing research, occupational promotion, water resources, public health and the environment.

Minister Oberg and Ambassador McAlister met with Her Royal Highness, Princess Maha Chakri Sirindhorn. This meeting served to maintain Alberta's close relationship with her Royal Highness.

### Conclusion

Alberta is already recognized, in international academic circles and in industry, for the high quality of its education system and graduates. The mission to Asia was an effective means of raising the profile of Alberta's world class learning system in Japan, China, Vietnam and Thailand. The visits to both Hokkaido and Heilongjiang served to strengthen Alberta's strong and productive ties with these sister provinces. Existing international partnerships were reinforced and new relationships were forged with educational providers, and governments from all four countries visited.

Delegates actively promoted study in Alberta opportunities to students, teachers, educational administrators, international recruitment agents, and government officials. The meetings and relationships that were established have created numerous opportunities for continued cooperation in the areas of student and faculty exchange, and in the provision of Alberta's educational expertise to markets in Asia. Delegates from both the K-12 and post-secondary sectors, as well as representatives of Alberta Learning, are following-up on the opportunities explored with contacts made during the Mission to Asia. Many potential initiatives are being considered, with those agreements made during the mission being finalized over the coming months.

The accomplishments of Alberta Learning's Mission to Asia were numerous and will have a lasting and positive impact on Alberta's learning system.
