Vaginal Spermicides

What are vaginal spermicides?

- Vaginal spermicides are products containing an ingredient (Nonoxynol 9) that kills sperm on contact.
- Spermicide is inserted into the vagina before sex to help prevent pregnancy.
- Spermicides are available as film, foam, suppositories, cream, and gel.

How do vaginal spermicides work?

 When sperm comes in contact with the vaginal spermicide, the sperm dies and pregnancy cannot occur.

How effective are vaginal spermicides?

- Spermicidal effectiveness rates vary widely.
 The failure rate can be around 26 per cent.
- Spermicide should be used with a condom every time you have sex to decrease the risk of pregnancy.
- Vaginal spermicides may cause vaginal irritation leading to tiny open areas in the vaginal lining. This can increase the risk of HIV and other sexually transmitted infection (STI) transmission.

Vaginal spermicides do not offer protection from STI/HIV.

What are the advantages of vaginal spermicides?

- Vaginal spermicides can be purchased at a pharmacy or grocery store without a prescription.
- Vaginal spermicides provide extra lubrication.
- Women who cannot use a hormonal birth control method have vaginal spermicide options.

What are the disadvantages of vaginal spermicides?

- Vaginal spermicides are messy.
- You have to wait after inserting spermicide before having sex.
- Vaginal spermicides can cause irritation
 (e.g. itchiness, redness or pain). If this happens
 you should stop using the spermicide and
 talk to your health-care provider or birth
 control clinic.
- Some women may not feel comfortable inserting vaginal spermicide into their vagina.
- Some women experience more frequent urinary tract infections when a spermicide and condom or spermicide and diaphragm are used together.

How do I use vaginal spermicide?

- Vaginal spermicides should not be used alone. Vaginal spermicides should be used with another form of birth control (e.g. condoms).
- Use the correct amount of spermicide. Read and follow package instructions.
- Insert the spermicide high into the vagina to cover the cervix, before sex.
- Insert another spermicide application into the vagina each time you have sex.
- Wait the recommended time between insertion and sex.
- Do not rinse or douche your vagina for at least 6 hours after sex.





Film

- Insert at least 15 minutes, but not more than 3 hours, before sex.
- Place the folded film over your dry index finger.
- Push the film into the vagina at or near the cervix.
- Inserting the film takes practice.



Foam

- Insert foam immediately but not more than 1 hour before sex.
- Shake the foam container vigorously.
- Fill the applicator with foam.
- Insert the applicator into the vagina at or near the cervix.
- Hold applicator in place and depress plunger.
- Remove applicator.



Gel/Cream

- Used with a diaphragm.
 Gel or cream should not be used alone.
- Insert 10 to 15 minutes before sex.
- Fill applicator with gel.
- Insert the applicator into the vagina at or near the cervix.
- Hold applicator in place and depress plunger.
- Remove applicator.

Suppository

- Insert 10 to 15 minutes but less than 1 hour before sex.
- Place the suppository into the vagina at or near the cervix.

Important to remember

 Check the expiry date – do not use spermicide, film, foam, suppository, cream, or gel that is outdated.

Sexual decision making

Choose to have sex or not - you have the right to make that decision.

Choose to protect yourself from pregnancy and sexually transmitted infection (STI).

Use a condom every time you have sex to lower your risk of STI.

Talk with your partner about these choices before you have sex.
