FACTORS FOR ASSESSING PROPOSALS TO PROVIDE UNINSURED IN-PATIENT SURGICAL SERVICES

An owner/operator of a surgical facility that wishes to provide uninsured in-patient surgical services and related facility services must provide a proposal for the Minister's consideration. A copy of the proposal will be provided to any regional health authority potentially affected by the proposal. The regional health authority will be asked for comments on its assessment of the overall impact the proposal is expected to have on the delivery of hospital and other health services, and how the proposal may impact on Albertans and the public health care system. The department's assessment of the proposal will consider regional health authority comments.

No uninsured in-patient surgical services may be provided without approval of the Minister and designation of the surgical facility under the *Health Care Protection Act*.

This document outlines the legislated factors the Minister will use to assess the proposal.

LEGISLATED FACTORS

Whether the provision of the uninsured in-patient surgical services as contemplated in the proposal would have an adverse impact on the publicly funded and publicly administered health system in Alberta or impair the government's ability to comply with the *Canada Health Act* [Section 15(1)(a) *Health Care Protection Act*].

FACTOR DESCRIPTION

Impact of the proposed type and volume of surgical services on the availability of health workforce for the public system, including:

- Assessment of the number, type, mix and ratios of health care personnel, including physicians, to be engaged by the facility
- Identification of the anticipated source of the health care personnel, including physicians, required by the facility

Anticipated catchment area/patients' places of residence (that is, area of Alberta, other Canadian provinces and territories, outside Canada) and anticipated numbers from these areas.

Responsibility for payment for uninsured surgical services (for example, Workers' Compensation Board, Government of Canada, individuals) and anticipated volume of services by source.

Compliance with applicable inter-provincial billing agreements when serving Canadian residents who are entitled to coverage of the surgical services under the health plan of another province or territory.

The identification of pre- and post-surgical services expected and assessment of the potential impact, including costs, on the public health care system.

Whether the public interest would be served by the designation of the surgical facility [Section 15(1)(b) <i>Health Care Protection Act</i>]. Summary reports are to use the data set as specified in the Canadian Institute for Health Information Abstracting Manual, and include information such as: Number of inpatient separations, surgical services, and inpatient days of care by type of surgical service (using CIHI reporting codes) Patient place of residence Payment responsibility (e.g. WCB, patient, province or territory of residence using the CIHI codes).
