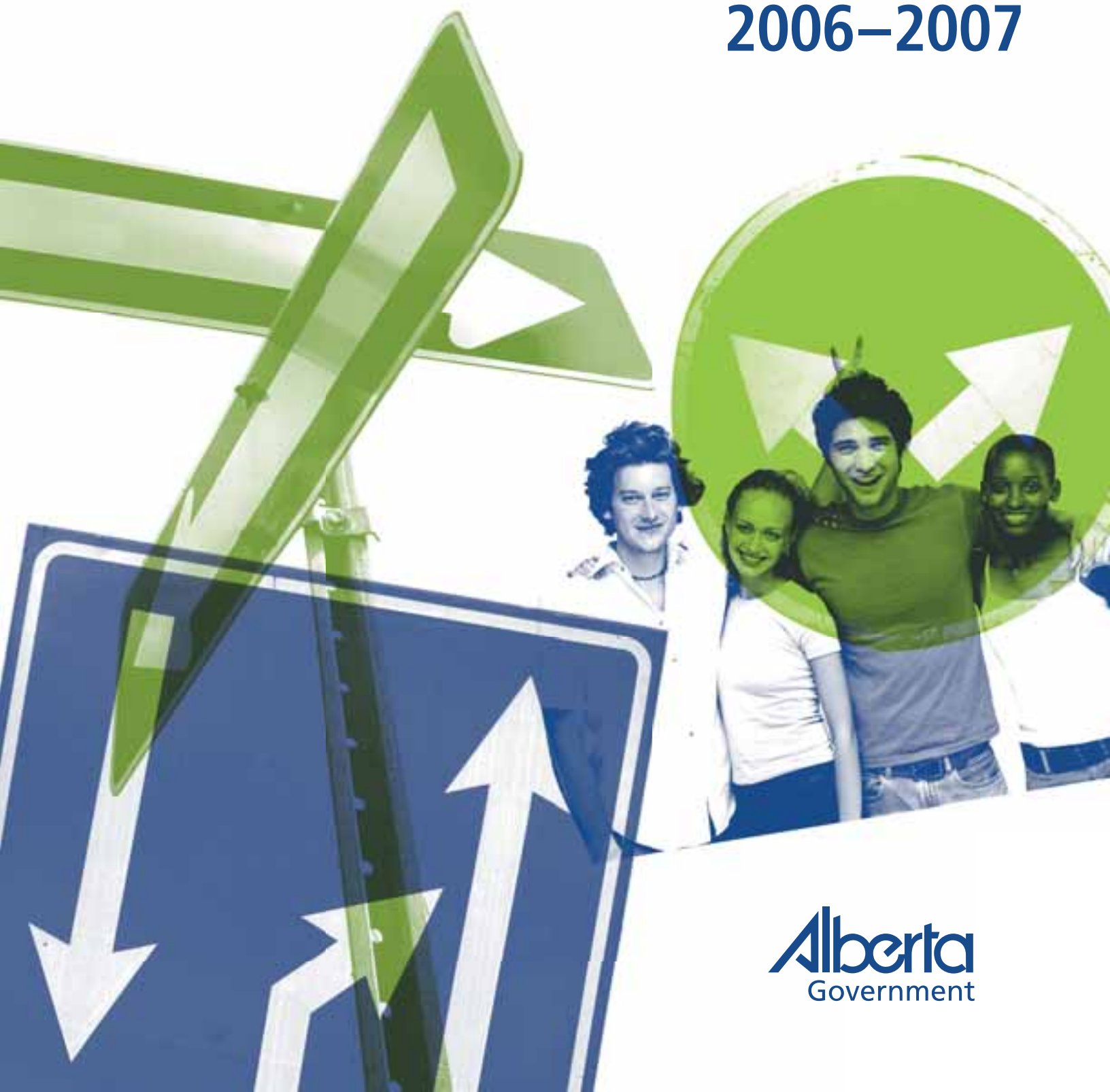

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How Do I Know Which Program Would be Best for Me?

A Short Answer

Which program would be best for you depends on your needs and wants and, in particular, what you would like to achieve by taking a post-secondary program.

A Longer Answer

It's true that many people have built satisfying careers after taking a "whatever is closest or easiest" approach to choosing a post-secondary education program. However, it's also true that many people have been disappointed after choosing a program based primarily on what was closest or easiest or what looked interesting in a short write-up. Education is never wasted but it isn't cheap.

A more thoughtful approach to choosing a post-secondary program can save you a lot of time and money.

You don't have to choose a specific occupation, but you do need to have a good idea of:

- what interests you (and what doesn't)
- what you enjoy doing
- what is really important to you
- what your preferences and limits are (e.g. how many years of post-secondary education you are willing or financially able to take).

You already know a lot about your interests, values and preferences. The challenge is to organize that information so you can use it as a measuring stick for deciding which post-secondary program(s) might be a good fit for you.

The Best Answer

Finding the best answer to the question "How do I know which program would be best for me?" takes time but can be a lot of fun. It involves taking a closer look at yourself. This is an important part of planning your future and choosing a learning program that will help build your career. You can build a career that's right for you by developing an overall sense of direction that guides your career decision-making but also changes as you and your circumstances change. In other words:

- know what you want and follow your heart
- be flexible, ready to take advantage of unplanned events
- keep learning new things
- develop and maintain a support system.

Know what you want

You are one of a kind. How much you will enjoy different study and work options depends upon your unique combination of interests, abilities and values. Therefore, to figure out what might be best for you, you need to know what you want. Your core values, beliefs and interests are your guide when it comes to knowing what you want and navigating your career path. Work requirements, occupations and even industries change, but your core values, beliefs and interests tend to be fairly consistent over time. What interests you when you are young will probably still interest you later, although you may refine your interests and add some new ones.

Follow your heart—go after what is really important to you.

Dream a little

Try this: on a sheet of paper, list all the things you would like to do, have or be in the future. Write down the things you really want, even if they seem impossible or far-fetched. Try using the following questions to help you begin defining your dreams. Don't limit yourself to these few—use them as a jumping off point to get going.

- What do you like to do? For example, do you like to:
 - have a few close friends or lots of acquaintances?
 - be physically active or work at a desk?
 - express yourself in artistic ways?
 - solve problems in creative ways?
 - work with your hands?
 - work with others in a team environment?

If you have strong feelings about what you don't like to do, write them down, too. Sometimes, it's easier to identify what you don't want. Once you've identified what you don't want, turn the statements around to say what you do want.

- What can you do well?
- Where do you want to work (e.g. outdoors, near your home, in the city, with a small group of people, in a large organization)?
- What type of lifestyle do you want?
- What motivates you?
 - Does having competition get you going, or do you prefer to compete against yourself?
 - Do you want variety in your work, or would you prefer to know what to expect each day?
 - Do you like to make decisions and act on them, or would you prefer to have someone else make the tough decisions?
 - Do you want to earn a lot of money? If so, how much is "a lot"?
 - Do you want high status work that earns you the respect of others?
 - How important is it to you that your work be personally satisfying?
 - Do you want to be assured of a steady income, or are you willing to take financial risks?
 - How important is it to you to have time for other activities outside of work?
 - Do you want lots of opportunities to learn new things?
 - What else do you think is important and therefore worth working toward (e.g. protecting the environment, standing up for your beliefs)?

You may also want to try some self-assessment exercises that are designed to identify your interests, skills and values (see **Help is nearby** paragraph that follows).

Think about your school, work and volunteer experiences. What do you like about these experiences and how would you like them to be different in the future?

Write a description of the things you want to be a part of your future and use it as a guide when you make career decisions. Keep refining your description as you learn more about yourself.

When you see people working or read about different types of work, ask yourself if you would be interested in doing that kind of work. Then ask yourself why, and add what you learn about yourself to your description of what you want.

Use the energy your dreams give you to acquire the skills and take the risks required to make your dreams come true.

After you have completed some self-assessment exercises and explored a variety of work possibilities, you'll probably find that certain characteristics and types of work keep coming up again and again (e.g. you enjoy artistic, scientific or technical subjects and activities). Those are the characteristics to look for in your future work. Knowing the type of work you're interested in will guide your choice of post-secondary education or training program.

Be flexible

The one thing you can count on is that things will change and keep changing.

Your priorities will change. Over the course of your life you will be making various decisions on whether to move, travel, get married, have children or return to learning.

The world of work will change, too. Rapid technological advances and shifts in the economy will continue to eliminate some types of work and create new ones.

Coping with change often requires taking your career in a different direction or simply exploring new interests. Your career path will probably meander, not move in a straight line toward a specific occupational goal.

Building your career involves both manoeuvring and meandering. To manoeuvre is to be focused and strategic, to decide what you want and how you are going to get there. You can, and sometimes should, meander and manoeuvre at the same time. For example, if you have ever applied for a job or an education program before you were really sure you wanted your application to be successful, you have manoeuvred (taken action on a plan) while you were still meandering (exploring other possibilities).

Keep exploring and learning

Keep your eyes open and ask questions when you see someone doing work that looks interesting. Check out what they are doing and the training or study required to do that type of work.

Get some experience. Volunteering and part-time work will allow you to:

- get a first-hand look at the work environment in your field of interest
- establish working relationships within that environment
- develop new skills related to work possibilities that interest you
- discover new things about yourself
- meet people who can tell you about their work.

For example, if you think you might like to work in the health-care field, try volunteering in a hospital. You'll find out very quickly if you like to work in that environment, and you will probably meet a variety of people who work in the health-care field (e.g., nurses, medical technologists, physiotherapists, etc.).

Use the **resource materials** that are available on the Internet, in government and school career counselling offices and at public libraries. For example, the ALIS website at www.alis.gov.ab.ca includes:

- Career Clips—view over 150 videos of different occupations
- CAREERinsite—on-line career planning information
- CERTinfo—Certification and Registration Requirements for Employment in Alberta lists information for over 60 specific occupations and trades that are cited in legislation and regulations in Alberta
- EDinfo—Post-secondary education program listings (including admission requirements)
- OCCinfo—Occupational profiles that describe over 530 different occupations
- WAGEinfo—Wages and salaries for over 450 Alberta occupations
- links to Internet job boards that will give you an idea of what qualifications employers are looking for.

When you identify a type of work that interests you, try to get a complete picture by asking the following questions:

- What do people in this line of work do day-to-day?
- What are their duties and responsibilities?
- What are the usual working conditions (e.g. outdoor/indoor work, hours of work, travel/overtime requirements, health hazards)?
- What skills are required?
- What type of education is required (e.g. high school, college, technical institute, university, apprenticeship)?
- Is a special licence, certificate, degree or diploma required to do this type of work?
- What training do most people in this type of work have? Were they trained on the job after they were hired? Have they graduated from a particular type of training program? Which training programs are most respected by employers in the field?
- If graduation from a training program is required, where is the training offered? How long does the training take to complete? How much does it cost?
- Are there any special physical, legal or social requirements (e.g. a requirement to travel, the ability to lift heavy sample cases)?
- What are the future employment prospects? What effects will technological developments and social trends have on this type of work? What are the opportunities for movement?
- What is the typical pay range for this type of work?

No matter what type of learning “program” you start out with (learning on the job, apprenticeship, post-secondary certificate, diploma or degree), make sure you add to your store of skills and knowledge throughout your career. The program you choose to start out with will be just that—a starting place.

Focus on the journey—life is not a destination. Have fun along the way!



Develop a support system

A support system of “allies” can provide information and help when you need it. Your family members, friends, neighbours, school and work associates, sports buddies, friends of friends and professionals such as counsellors, educators and librarians are all your potential allies. These allies can tell you a great deal about the local labour market and may be able to provide advice to help you make career and training choices.

Knowing what you want, being flexible, following your heart and building your supports will help you determine your career direction. Once you have a direction, you’ll have a clearer idea of which programs could be the best for you.

Say goodbye to the old idea that you must pick an occupation and stick to your decision. Many jobs of the 21st century haven’t been invented yet. Flexibility and adaptability are what you need to get you from here to there, so make sure you get an education “with legs.”

Your Learning Style

Do you enjoy learning in a classroom environment, on the job or a combination of both? Many post-secondary institutions give students the opportunity to learn both in the classroom and on the job by:

- offering programs that include work experience components (for example, clinicals, practica, residencies, internships)
- offering co-operative education programs that alternate periods of classroom learning with periods of paid on-the-job training or work experience
- participating in designated apprenticeship or occupational training programs administered by Alberta Apprenticeship and Industry Training.

If you prefer to learn primarily through experience, you might want to explore the possibility of acquiring the skills and knowledge you want by training on the job. Of course, on-the-job training is feasible only in some occupations.

For example, learning on the job is not an option for dentists or dental hygienists, but it is a possibility for dental assistants. Several post-secondary institutions offer training programs for dental assistants, but it is also possible to learn on the job and work towards provincial registration and national certification as a Registered Dental Assistant through specified continuing education courses.

Likewise, people who want to become hotel managers may:

- work their way up by starting in entry-level positions in the hospitality industry and, by taking related continuing education courses, advance to more responsible positions
- enrol in a related post-secondary program and acquire experience in the hospitality industry either during their studies or after they graduate from the program.

Trade Apprenticeship and Occupation Training

These programs allow people who are interested in a career in a designated trade or occupation to earn a salary while learning on-the-job skills necessary to achieve a recognized journeyman or occupational certificate. In Alberta, there are over 51 apprenticeship trades and six designated occupations.

Apprenticeship programs combine on-the-job training with technical training that is most often delivered in a classroom at an approved training provider. Occupation training programs consist either of formal training or work experience, or a combination of both. Job skills and competencies, as well as the performance standards and training programs for each designated trade and occupation, are defined by industry and approved under the Apprenticeship and Industry Training Act.

To learn the skills and competencies of an Alberta **designated trade**, individuals must first find a qualified employer who is willing to hire and train them throughout their apprenticeship program. They then register as an apprentice by submitting a completed Apprenticeship Application/Contract, signed by both the apprentice and employer, to the nearest Apprenticeship and Industry Training office. Apprenticeship training programs last from one to four years, depending on the trade.

To learn the skills and competencies of a **designated occupation** in Alberta, individuals may either register themselves as trainees or first master the skills and competencies required and then apply to have those skills and competencies assessed for certification. Occupational training programs last from one to two years, depending on the specific occupation.

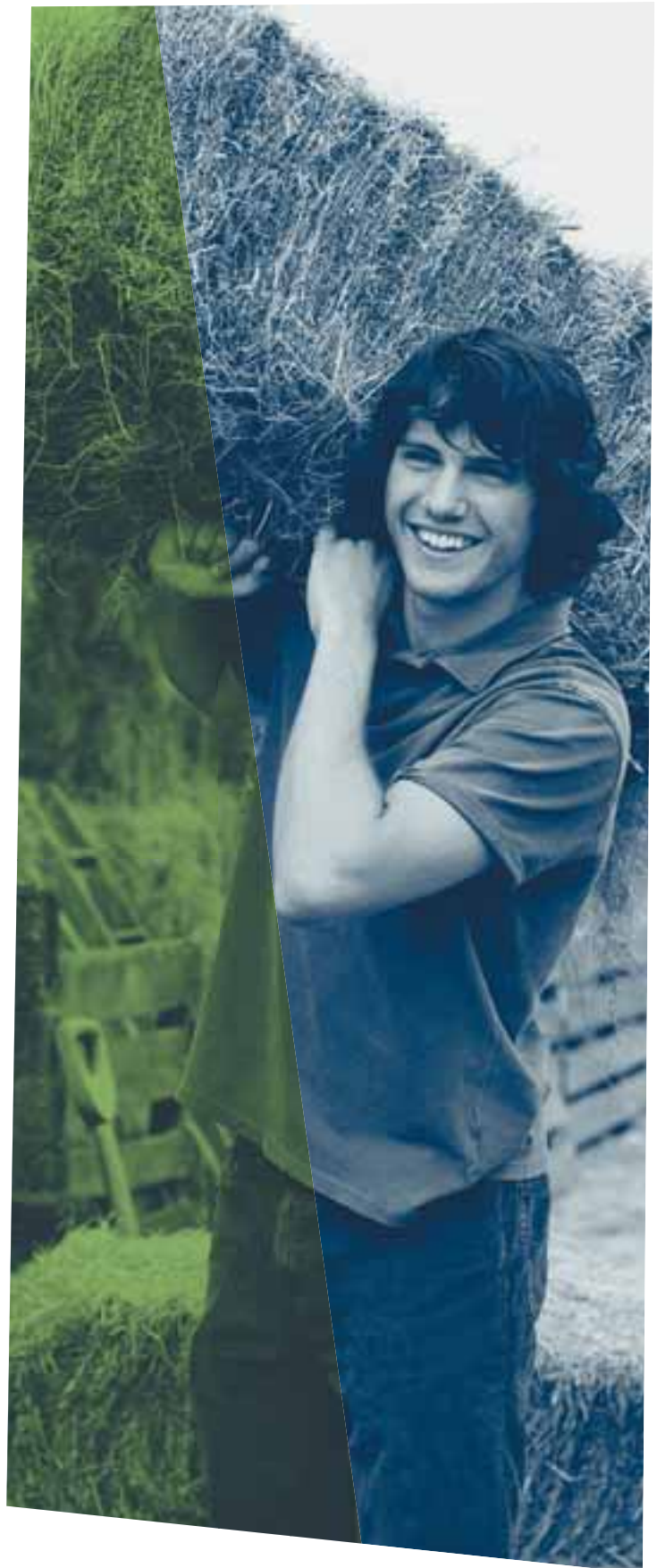
Alberta Green Certificate Program

This certificate is offered by Alberta Agriculture, Food and Rural Development, in partnership with Alberta farm businesses and Alberta Education. It operates as a worksite-based skills development program for people interested in careers in agriculture at the technician, supervisor or farm manager levels. Specializations include Cow-Calf, Feedlot, Dairy, Beekeeping, Swine, Sheep, Crops and Irrigated Crops. Those completing the Green Certificate technician level qualify for 16 or more high school credits. High school credits can be obtained for this program by taking the Green Certificate course as an off-campus education program, similar to work experience courses. In addition there are articulation agreements between the Green Certificate program and three agriculture diploma-granting colleges (Lakeland College, Lethbridge Community College and Olds College) and with NAIT's Fairview campus. These agreements allow students to learn the application of agriculture science and technology in the work world before, during or after completing academic programs at these colleges.

Green Certificate Program representatives are located in each of the five regions: Fairview, Westlock, Lethbridge, Olds and Vermilion. For more information, visit www.agric.gov.ab.ca/greencertificate

Your Personal Circumstances

If you can't attend a program full-time, are there other ways to take the program? Yes! Many post-secondary institutions allow students to enrol part-time or to take all or some program requirements by distance education.

Part-time studies are an option worth considering if you cannot make the financial or time commitments required to attend a post-secondary education program full-time. Part-time studies are also a good way to try out a program to make sure it meets your needs and wants before you commit to full-time studies. However, succeeding at part-time studies requires persistence and careful planning. It takes determination to continue taking courses long after the full-time students you started with have finished the program. Completing program requirements may also require juggling your schedule to take required courses at the times they are offered.

Distance education programs and courses come to you instead of you going to them.

The words "distance education," "distance learning," "correspondence," "homes study" and "independent study" have almost identical meanings. They describe situations where most or all of the learning occurs outside the traditional classroom. In many cases, students and teachers may never even meet.

Generally, distance learning materials are mailed to the student. After completing the assignment, the student returns them to the school for correction, grading, and comment. Corrected assignments are sent back to the student. This exchange forms the link between student and instructor. Many post-secondary schools offer the services of a tutor for distance learning programs. Tutors help students understand course content, discuss exams and assignments, and schedule workshops/seminars, lab sessions, or discussion and self-help groups.

In addition to submitting assignments, students may be expected to:

- listen to radio programs or audio tapes
- watch television programs, films or video tapes
- surf the Internet
- participate in teleconferencing sessions
- communicate with instructors and other students by telephone or via the Internet.

An increasing number of post-secondary institutions are offering distance education programs to give students more freedom and flexibility in their studies. However, some may not offer complete programs by distance education, and those students may need to take the remaining courses in their program on campus. In some cases, students must transfer the credits they earn in a partial program to another post-secondary school which offers the distance education courses needed to complete the program. What Post-Secondary Programs are Offered and Where?

Certificate, Diploma, Applied Degree, Degree...What's the Difference?

People sometimes use terms such as certificate, diploma, applied degree and degree to mean the same thing. However, there are some important differences in the way these words are used in Alberta's post-secondary education system.

Alberta Journeyman Certificate programs

Apprenticeship programs

- are available in 51 designated trades in Alberta
- involve registered apprentices completing a specified number of on-the-job training hours and periods of technical training at an approved training provider, followed by the successful completion of industry examinations
- enable certified journeymen and completing apprentices who successfully write an Interprovincial Standards (Red Seal) exam to work in other Canadian jurisdictions where the designation is recognized.

Alberta Occupational Certificate programs

The six designated occupations have varied requirements for certification based on industry standards. Formal training requirements are the responsibility of industry and may be provided through one or more of the public institutions or private providers.

Certificate programs

- prepare students for entry into specific occupations
- involve one year or less of full-time, hands-on study at a college or technical institute
- require completion of some high school studies (often specified grade levels and subjects) for admission.

Exception:

Universities also offer a variety of certificate programs. These certificate programs, composed of university-level courses, may require high school graduation, some post-secondary education or mature student status for admission.

Diploma programs

- prepare students for employment in a particular field or group of occupations
- involve two years of full-time, applied study at a college or technical institute
- require high school graduation (often with specified grades and subjects) for admission.

Exceptions:

- Many colleges also offer general studies or liberal arts programs at the diploma level.
- University-level diploma programs involve the equivalent of one year of academic study beyond a bachelor's degree and may be applicable to related master's degree programs.

Applied Degree programs

- provide enhanced career preparation that applies to a broader range of career and employment opportunities beyond entry-level in an industry
- are offered by some public colleges and technical institutes
- are four-year programs (usually a two-year diploma plus two additional years) consisting of six semesters (about three years) of academic studies and at least two semesters (about one year) of related paid, supervised work experience in the industry
- have admission requirements that may be similar to those of diploma programs. In addition, completion of a related diploma program may be a prerequisite for admission to an applied degree program.

Bachelor's Degree programs

- are offered by universities, selected colleges, and private institutions authorized to offer accredited degree programs
- involve the equivalent of three or four years of full-time study (the length of program varies by discipline and by institution)
- generally have entrance requirements that include a minimum average in specified Grade 12 subjects, including English 30. Admission to faculties with enrolment limits may require marks higher than the specified minimum average.

Exception:

Athabasca University has an open admissions policy for students 16 years of age and older.

Master's Degree programs

- involve a minimum of two years of full-time university study beyond the bachelor's degree level (there are time limits for completing degree requirements)
- require a completed bachelor's degree for admission. Applicants who have a three-year undergraduate (bachelor's) degree are generally required to complete an additional qualifying year
- may require completion of a thesis or a course-based (non-thesis) program.

Doctoral Degree programs

- require two or three years of full-time university study and research beyond the master's degree level (there are time limits for completing degree requirements)
- involve planning and carrying out high quality research to advance knowledge in the student's major field of study
- include the preparation and defence of a dissertation on an approved topic.



Programs Chart

You can use the following Alberta post-secondary education programs chart to find out:

- which publicly funded institutions offer programs of interest to you
- how long it takes to complete each program if you attend full-time
- the type of credential you earn when you graduate from the program (for more information, see the **Certificate, Diploma, Applied Degree, Degree...What's the Difference?** section).

Only institutions that are funded by the provincial government or have accredited degree programs are included.

How to read the chart

The chart lists various programs of study available through post-secondary institutions in Alberta.

The post-secondary programs are grouped into broad subject categories such as:

- Computer and Information Technology
- Health Care, Medical Studies and Technologies
- Sciences
- Trades and Industrial Training.

Look through all the categories to see which one would likely include the program of studies you're interested in. For example, a program of studies in genetics will be found in the Sciences category, while a program dealing with computer maintenance and repair will be found in the Computer and Information Technology category. You may have to search around a bit within the categories to find the exact program you want.

Collaborative programs

Programs marked with a number sign (#) are collaborative programs. These are programs that are offered by two (or more) institutions working together. Often, one institution does not have the mandate or program approval to offer a program that awards a particular type of credential but does have government approval to offer the beginning portion of such a program. The other institution offers the entire program and/or the completion portion of the program. Depending on the collaborative arrangement, students may attend classes at either institution or take the beginning portion at one institution and complete the program at the other institution. For example, students in the collaborative Bachelor of Nursing program offered by Red Deer College and the University of Alberta can complete all of their degree requirements in the city of Red Deer. Red Deer College offers its own courses for the first, second and third years of the program. Fourth year courses are offered by the University of Alberta but are taken at the Red Deer College campus. The University of Alberta awards the degree.

Choosing a Program

When you've identified programs that could get you started in the direction you want to go, you'll probably have a number of questions about those programs, such as:

- What are the entrance requirements?
- Is it a "quota program" with limited enrolment? If so, what marks are generally required to gain admission?
- Does the program start in September, or are there other possible entry dates?
- What are the application deadlines for each program?
- Does the program include a work experience component? If so, is it volunteer work or are students paid for their work? Who is responsible for arranging the work experience?
- What percentage of graduates find related employment?
- How much do tuition, books and supplies cost?

The best source of information about a particular program is the institution that offers the program. You can contact post-secondary institutions directly and request print materials or look for the information you need on their websites. (Post-secondary institution telephone numbers, mailing addresses, fax numbers, e-mail addresses and website addresses are listed in the **Contacts** section.)

The Alberta Learning Information Service (ALIS) website at www.alis.gov.ab.ca is the Internet gateway to information about adult learning in Alberta. It provides access to a broad range of information as well as links to many post-secondary institution home pages.


If you don't have ready access to the Internet or you would like to browse through program information from a variety of institutions, check out the career counselling offices and libraries in your area. Labour Market Information Centres have collections of post-secondary institution calendars and are located in Alberta Human Resources and Employment service centres throughout the province (see **Contacts**).

After you've used print and Internet resources to gather some basic information about your program options, it's a good idea to talk to people connected with each program, such as:


- program graduates
- representatives of applicable professional associations or licensing bodies
- employers likely to hire program graduates
- program instructors.

Finding and contacting these people may take some determined networking, but it's well worth the effort. For example, if employers tell you that they prefer to hire graduates of a different program, that's definitely something you want to know before you enrol!

Sometimes, several institutions offer very similar programs (e.g. university transfer programs are offered by several colleges in the province). You will want to research the various institutions before you decide which one to apply to. There are descriptions of some of the post-secondary institutions in Alberta in the next section.



Some programs have application deadlines that are much earlier than you might expect (see Application Deadlines 2007-2008).



Which Post-Secondary Institution(s) Should I Attend?

If Only One Institution Offers the Program You Want...

Your choice of which institution to attend is obvious. Or is it? Maybe not, if:

- appropriate transfer programs are available at post-secondary institutions closer to home
- an educational consortium offers the program or transferable courses at a location near you
- appropriate e-Campus courses are available.

Transfer programs

What is Transfer and Transfer Credit?

Transfer is the movement of students between post-secondary institutions. Transfer credit is the credit received for prior post-secondary studies. You may be able to take up to two years of post-secondary education at a closer institution (the “sending” institution) and get credit for those studies from the institution that offers the program you want to complete (the “receiving” institution). However, there are two important things you need to know before you enrol in a transfer program.

1. Admission to the receiving institution program is competitive and the number of students who can be admitted may be limited. Therefore, admission is not automatic after completion of a transfer program.

2. You are responsible for the planning and consultation required to make sure that you will receive credit for all of the courses you take at the sending institution.

To decide which courses to take at the sending institution:

- check the transfer program advice in the sending institution’s calendar
- check the receiving institution’s calendar to get the most current program advice
- check the Alberta Transfer Guide to be sure the courses you select will transfer.

What is the Alberta Transfer Guide?

The *Alberta Transfer Guide* (or *Guide*) lists course and program transfer agreements in the province for a specific academic year. It also contains a wealth of admissions information. It is available free of charge from the registrar’s office at post-secondary institutions.

The Guide is published each June; however, because transfer agreements are created and updated regularly throughout the year, learners and advisors are encouraged to use the *Online Alberta Transfer Guide (OATG)*—www.acat.gov.ab.ca—for the most up-to-date information. **The OATG is the official statement of transfer agreements in Alberta.**

Why would I use the OATG or the Alberta Transfer Guide?

The *Guide* is a tool to assist in planning your post-secondary studies and moving between post-secondary institutions in Alberta, the Northwest Territories and Nunavut.

- Use the “By Course” information to plan a university transfer direction, or to find out how a few courses taken at one post-secondary institution transfer to another post-secondary institution
- Use the “By Program” information to plan a ladder series of credentials.

There is also a wealth of useful admissions information, such as:

- academic upgrading courses
- how grade 12 courses from other provinces are accepted for admission
- how advanced placement and international baccalaureate courses transfer to post-secondary institutions
- click on Common Questions to learn more about transfer credit
- click on Search the Online Alberta Transfer Guide to determine how your courses or program will transfer within Alberta.

Consortium programs

A consortium is an association of post-secondary institutions providing a range of programs and courses in communities not served directly by a single institution. All programs offered at consortium locations meet the same standards and have the same entrance requirements as those offered on the main campuses of the institutions

that deliver the programs. The programs offered may change from year to year depending on the needs of local students.

There are four community consortia in Alberta:

- **Big Country Educational Consortium** serves the Cereal, Drumheller, Hanna, Oyen, Stettler, Three Hills and Youngstown areas
- **Chinook Educational Consortium** serves the Claresholm, Crowsnest Pass and Pincher Creek areas
- **Pembina Educational Consortium** serves the Drayton Valley, Fox Creek, Rocky Mountain House, Westlock and Whitecourt areas
- **Yellowhead Region Educational Consortium** serves the Edson, Grande Cache, Hinton and Jasper areas.

Types of programs offered by community consortia include academic, administration, business trades and university transfer. There is also an Aboriginal consortium.

e-Campus courses

e-Campus Alberta is a partnership of 15 public colleges and technical institutes developed to increase access to post-secondary learning opportunities. By using the flexibility of on-line learning, students can select courses from any of the partner colleges or institutes and complete the course work on-line from home, the workplace, or a community learning centre. The e-Campus system is based on a lead/partnership model. The “lead” campus is the college or institute that offers the course and sets the admission requirements. The student’s closest local college or institute is the “partner” campus. It provides important services such as library resources, financial advising and educational planning. Consult the institution’s calendar or website for admission requirements and course details.

You are in the fortunate position of being able to choose the one(s) you want to apply to.

The following descriptions of post-secondary institutions in Alberta that are publicly funded or offer accredited degree programs provide some basic information about each institution. For an overview of different types of institutions in Alberta, see the section **College, Technical Institute, University...What's the Difference?**

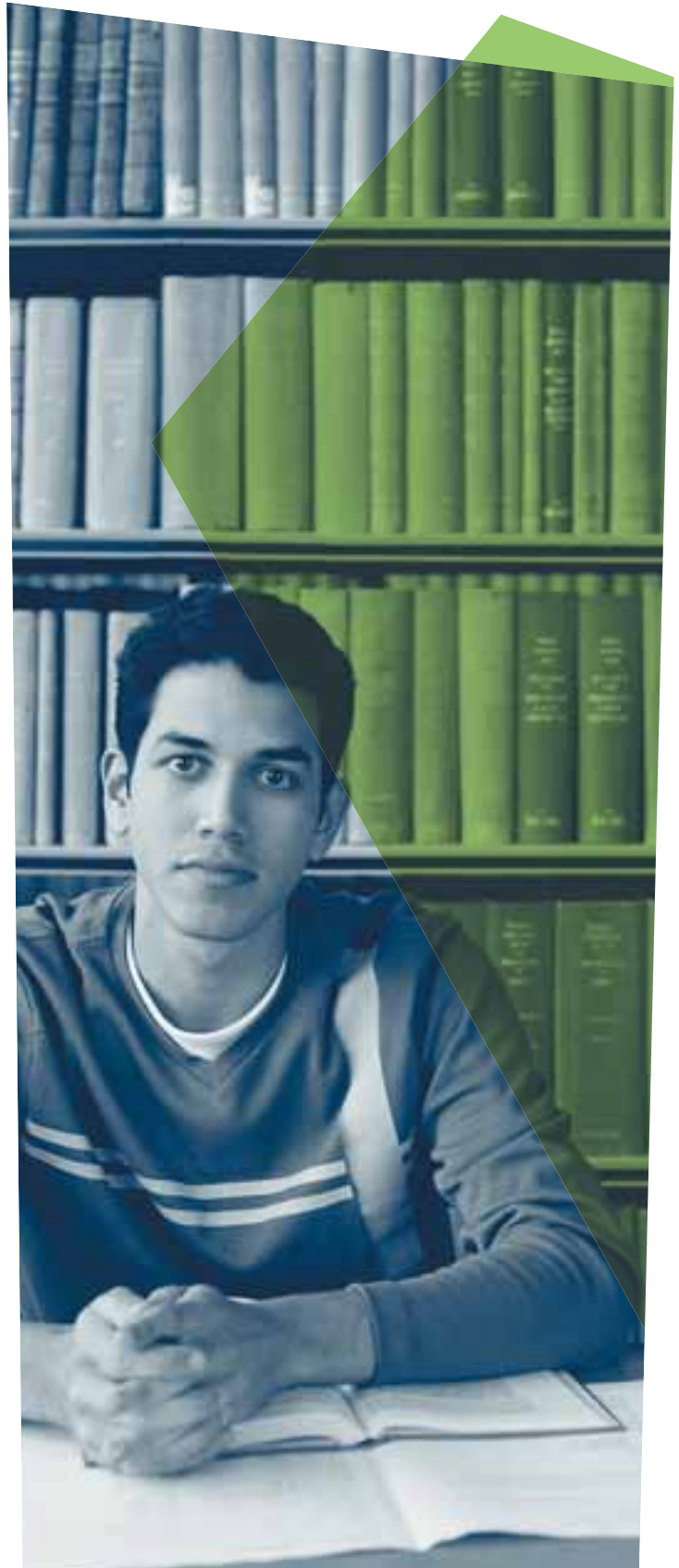
Your choice of institution may be influenced by:

- location (how close it is to your home)
- size (whether you prefer the learning environment at a smaller or larger institution)
- type of institution (e.g. religious affiliation)
- the institution's academic reputation in your subject field
- costs (e.g. tuition, books, accommodation)
- the types of student services and facilities offered (see the **Features Chart** section).

Most post-secondary institutions have open houses or information sessions in the spring. It's a great opportunity to have a look around, experience the learning environment, ask about program content and find out what student life is like. Many institutions also sponsor or participate in career fairs, where you can meet with faculty, industry representatives and current students.

College, Technical Institute, University...What's the Difference?

Wondering how a private college differs from a university or a public college, or how a public college differs from a technical institute? Here's an overview of the post-secondary education system in Alberta.

Public colleges

Alberta has 14 publicly funded, board-governed colleges. They may offer academic upgrading, continuing education, job readiness, apprenticeship and one-year certificate programs as well as two-year diploma and university transfer programs. Some offer applied degree programs. Some also offer undergraduate academic degree programs comparable to those offered by universities.

- Public colleges are located in Calgary, Edmonton, Fort McMurray, Grande Prairie, Grouard, Lac La Biche, Lethbridge, Medicine Hat, Olds, Red Deer and Vermilion. Some of these public colleges also have additional campuses in Brooks (Medicine Hat College), Fort Chipewyan (Keyano College), Lloydminster and Sherwood Park (Lakeland College) and Slave Lake (Northern Lakes College).
- Public colleges tend to have smaller classes than universities and offer students a close-knit learning environment.
- Those colleges that offer university transfer programs provide students with the option of beginning university studies at an institution closer to their homes.

Technical institutes

- Two of Canada's finest technical institutes are located in Alberta: Northern Alberta Institute of Technology (NAIT) in Edmonton and Southern Alberta Institute of Technology (SAIT) in Calgary.
- Technical institutes offer one-year certificate, two-year diploma, applied degree, apprenticeship and continuing education programs.
- Technical institutes respond to labour market needs and offer programs tailored to workplace requirements.

Universities

- Alberta has four excellent universities: three are campus-based and one is a distance-learning university.
- Alberta's universities are located in Athabasca, Calgary, Edmonton and Lethbridge.
- University populations in Alberta range from 5,000 to over 30,000 students attending one institution.
- Universities offer a wide range of degree programs through various departments and faculties.

Note: The following post-secondary institutions also offer degree programs:

- Grande Prairie Regional College, Grant MacEwan College, Lakeland College, Lethbridge Community College, Medicine Hat College, Mount Royal College, Olds College, NAIT and SAIT offer applied degree programs.
- Eight private colleges offer degree programs (see **Private colleges offering accredited degree programs** below).
- There are 10 non-resident institutions with approval to offer degree programs in Alberta.

Private colleges offering accredited degree programs

Alberta has eight private institutions that grant bachelor's degrees on recommendation of the Campus Alberta Quality Council: Alliance University College (Calgary), Canadian University College (Lacombe), Concordia University College of Alberta (Edmonton), DeVry Institute of Technology (Calgary), The King's University College (Edmonton), Canadian Nazarene University College (Calgary), St. Mary's University College (Calgary) and Taylor University College and Seminary (Edmonton).

As these programs are now monitored by the new Campus Alberta Quality Council, a list of the accredited degree programs can be found at www.caqc.gov.ab.ca under "Recommendations".

Private institutions

- Alberta also has independent religious institutions that offer programs leading to degrees in divinity. These programs are not approved or regulated by government, although in some instances students enrolled in these programs may be able to apply for student financial assistance. Some of these institutions are affiliated with post-secondary institutions in Alberta, colleges in the United States, Canadian or American Bible colleges/theological schools or associations. For information about these offerings, please contact the colleges directly.
- Currently, there are also approximately 150 private institutions in Alberta offering vocational programs licensed under the Private Vocational Schools Act. For a listing of licensed programs, call the Private Institutions Branch of Alberta Advanced Education at (780) 427-5609, visit your nearest Alberta Human Resource and Employment service centre (see the **Contacts** section) or check out the EDinfo section on the ALIS website at www.alis.gov.ab.ca/edinfo
- Licensed programs offered by private institutions respond to current labour market demand. These programs prepare students for employment in a wide variety of occupations.
- Program-specific job placement data is available at the institution that offers the program.

The Banff Centre

- The Banff Centre is a publicly funded institution that provides advanced continuing education opportunities in fine arts, management studies, language training and environmental training for people who already have academic credentials or professional experience in their discipline.

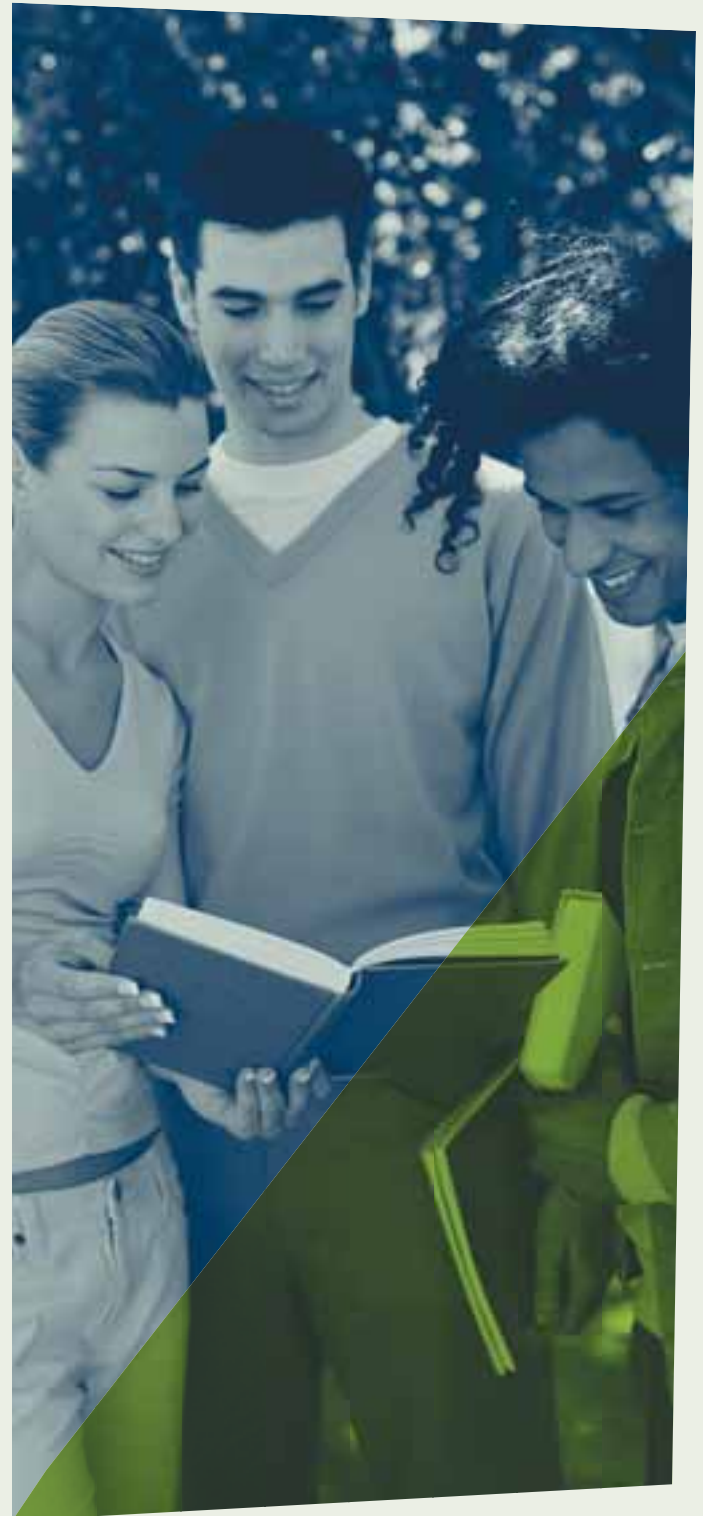

How Do I Get There From Here?

Once you've decided:

- what type of program or training option would be best for you
- which post-secondary institutions offer that type of program and
- which post-secondary institution(s) you want to attend,

there are two remaining questions:

- How will you pay for your post-secondary education?
- How do you apply for admission to the program(s) of your choice?

How to Pay for Your Post-Secondary Education

Most post-secondary students pay for their education through some combination of the following strategies:

- savings from jobs, gifts or investments
- studying full-time during school terms and working during summer breaks and/or working part-time throughout the year
- studying part-time and working full-time
- living with their parents and/or receiving financial assistance (gifts or loans) from their parents or other family members
- finding out about grants, bursaries or scholarships for which they might qualify and applying for them
- taking co-operative education, apprenticeship or applied degree programs that include periods of paid employment
- applying for a government-sponsored student loan
- applying for a bank loan.

Bursaries

Bursaries are non-repayable awards given by universities, colleges and other sources to students who demonstrate financial need.

Grants

Grants are usually non-repayable awards based on need, provided by provincial or federal governments or private corporations.

Scholarships

Scholarships are cash awards given to students selected primarily on the basis of academic excellence. Some scholarships also recognize extracurricular activities, athletic ability or other achievements. Scholarships may be provided by government, educational institutions or from the private sector.

Sources of awards

Don't overlook the possibility that you may be eligible for awards, even if you don't have the best marks in your class. To begin looking for money you won't have to pay back later, visit your high school guidance office or the awards office at the post-secondary institution you plan to attend. Ask to see the awards information, particularly directories that list awards from different sources. Another excellent source of information is the Alberta Learning Information Service (ALIS) website at www.alis.gov.ab.ca Click on Scholarships and Bursaries then click on the Alberta Scholarship Programs and Scholarship Connections. You can search for information on over 300 scholarships, grants, bursaries and awards.

You and your family are probably connected in one way or another with a number of clubs, organizations, societies, foundations, associations, unions and

companies that may offer awards for post-secondary students. For example, a large employer may offer bursaries for children of employees if the children have achieved a specified minimum average in their last year of high school. Find out what you might be eligible for by talking to family members and checking awards listings.

Government-sponsored student loans

Government-sponsored student loans are funds advanced to students attending post-secondary institutions on the understanding that the money will be repaid after studies are completed.

Apply early—at least six weeks before your program begins—to ensure that you have the results of your application before starting school. If you will be starting a post-secondary program in September, it’s a good idea to submit your student loan application to Students Finance by May 31. However, applications will be processed throughout the year.

The booklet *Money 101* is a great resource for figuring out how much money you will need to further your education and for exploring various strategies for financing your education. *Money 101* is available in high schools and career counselling centres across the province, through the Alberta Career Information Hotline (see **Contacts**) and on-line at www.alis.gov.ab.ca/careershop

How to Apply for Admission

Applications for admission procedures vary somewhat from one post-secondary institution to another. For example, some institutions require you to submit an official transcript of your high school marks along with a completed application form and the application fee (if any). Other institutions require that the transcript be sent directly from the issuing body.

You **cannot** order transcripts by telephone. However, an automated telephone line at (780) 427-5732 provides details about the required information to complete your request. If you are calling from outside the Edmonton area but within Alberta, you can call toll-free by dialing 310-0000, then (780) 427-5732. There is a fee for each official transcript.

Application forms and instructions are available from the post-secondary institution(s) you would like to attend. Most institutions also supply information about admission requirements and application procedures via the Internet.
