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# Message from the Integrated Resource Management Implementation Committee Chair

On March 28, 1999, the government of Alberta released the policy *Alberta's Commitment to Sustainable Resource and Environmental Management*. I am pleased to be involved with the implementation of this policy, which will form the cornerstone of the province's natural resource management approach into the next century.

As the chair of the Integrated Resource Management Implementation Committee (IRMIC), I am directly accountable to the Sustainable Development Coordinating Council to put this policy into action.

One of the first actions of the IRMIC was the creation of the Integrated Resource Management Division within Alberta Environment. This division's mandate is to focus the efforts of four key Alberta government departments, which include Agriculture, Food and Rural Development; Economic Development; Resource Development; and Environment.

This is the first Annual Report on the Implementation of Alberta's Commitment to Sustainable Resource and Environmental Management, for submission to the Sustainable Development Coordinating Council. Of particular importance during the year was the completion of the following:

- Regional Sustainable Development Strategy for the Athabasca Oil Sands Area;
- initiation of the Northern East Slopes Sustainable Resource and Environmental Strategy; and
- initiation of the Integrated Landscape Management process through the Alberta Chamber of Resources.

In the coming years, we will maintain our focus on implementing the commitment to sustainable resource and environmental management on a cross-department basis.

I am very pleased with the rapid response of companies and government agencies as they work cooperatively toward integration at the operational and policy level.

# Introduction

This is the first Annual Report on the Implementation of Alberta's Commitment to Sustainable Resource and Environmental Management.

In 1999, the Alberta Government identified Integrated Resource Management (IRM) as one of the mechanisms to implement the above-mentioned policy. Four government departments (Agriculture, Food and Rural Development; Economic Development; Resource Development; and Environment) are charged with incorporating IRM into their business.

For almost 30 years, the Alberta Government has embraced the concept of Integrated Resource Management. Over the years, IRM has evolved and now must address cumulative effects. IRM is an interdisciplinary and comprehensive approach to decision-making for natural resource management.

In February 1999, the Sustainable Development Coordinating Council approved the document "Alberta's Commitment to Sustainable Resource and Environmental Management – Implementation Plan". This document included a table that outlined the range of tasks that needed to be completed by the four responsible departments. This annual report reflects what the status is for each of those tasks. The table provides information on the subject area, the associated tasks to be completed, the responsible agency, the proposed completion date as outlined in the February 1999 Implementation Plan and what action has taken place as of June 2000.

Almost 300 examples of integration have been identified. They include a variety of Land Management Plans, Protected Area Plans, Water Management Plans, Air Quality Plans, Species Management Plans, Framework Plans, Conservation Initiatives and Environmental Impact Assessments. The report "Highlights of Integrated Resource Management in Alberta – Year 2000" details some of these good integration examples.
