1. This Schedule “A” Elite Seed Potato Plan forms an integral part of the Crop Insurance Agreement and as such contains supplementary information specific for qualifying elite seed potato producers.

2. The purpose of this plan is to provide elite potato seed producers with the option to insure elite seed potatoes as a separate crop at higher Unit Prices.
3. Notwithstanding section 7 of the regulations, under this plan the insured may elect to insure one or more of the insurable potato crops listed in section 3, where all acres of the crop planted with qualifying seed are offered for insurance.
4. Coverage is restricted to 70% of the probable yield of elite seed for the crop insured under this section.
5. The probable yield for elite seed is determined by multiplying the probable yield figures for table and processing potatoes by the following factors:
 - (a) 0.8 for early varieties (70 - 110 days to maturity);
 - (b) 0.7 for medium varieties (110 - 120 days to maturity); and
 - (c) 0.6 for late and very late varieties (120 - 140 days to maturity).
6. To reflect the added risks the premium rates for a crop insured under this plan are 120% of the premium rate for the same crop insured at 80% coverage for table and processing potatoes.
7. Seed identified as nuclear (mini tubers), pre-elite, elite-I, elite-II, elite-III or elite-IV qualifies for insurance under this plan provided the post harvest virus test results show 5% or less total virus (PVY and PLRV).
8. The unit price selected depends on the class of seed planted and cannot exceed
 - (a) \$125.00 per cwt for nuclear (mini tubers) seed planted and expected to be harvested as pre-elite;
 - (b) \$40.00 per cwt for pre-elite or better seed planted and expected to be harvested as elite-I;
 - (c) \$20.00 per cwt for elite-I or better seed planted and expected to be harvested as elite-II;
 - (d) \$17.50 per cwt for elite-IV or better seed planted of the Russet Burbank and Shepody varieties and expected to be harvested as foundation or better; and
 - (e) \$13.00 per cwt for elite-IV or better seed planted of all other potato varieties and expected to be harvested as foundation or better.
9. To qualify under this plan, all acres must be planted by May 31 of the crop year, proof of seed class and post harvest virus test results must be submitted with the application, and all acres must be registered for seed certification with the Canadian Food Inspection Agency and meet all requirements and obligations under that program.
10. To avoid quality adjustment based on pre-existing conditions, all acres insured must pass as seed during the first Canadian Food Inspection

Agency field inspection after June 30 of the crop year; the insurance on any acres that were rejected during or before the said inspection will be deemed null and void, and any premiums paid on these acres will be refunded.

11. The potato tops on all acres of the insured crop which retain a seed classification of Foundation or better by August 10 of the crop year must be completely dead on or before the said date to qualify for quality adjustments after the said date.

12. Production to count will be adjusted for quality by multiplying measured production at the final classification with the following factor: “(Unit price listed in section 8 for final class harvested) / (Unit price at which the crop was insured)”.

13. Excess production in one seed classification within an insured crop will reduce the indemnity payable on the shortfall in production to count in another seed classification by an amount equal to the excess production in cwt multiplied by the Unit Price for that seed classification.

14. Any Stage II losses will be calculated using the sliding scale from 50% to 75% of insured value as described in section 24 and Schedule A - Part V and full offset between Stage II and Stage III will apply except for late blight cases meeting conditions in clause 24(5.1)(b).

16. Schedule A of the regulations is further amended by the addition of the following:

Part XIII - ORGANIC CROPS

1. This Schedule A Organic Crops Supplement forms an integral part of the CROP INSURANCE AGREEMENT and as such contains supplementary information specific to Processing Peas.

2. If an insured changes from producing crops using standard management practices to using organic management practices, the probable yield calculation will be adjusted as follows:

- (a) the benchmark yield for the crop will be reduced to 70% of the calculated benchmark yield; and
- (b) historic production to count for the insured when standard management practices were used, will be adjusted to 70% of the originally recorded values.

3. The insured must be certified by a Certification Agency which adheres to the Canadian Organic Advisory Board standards.

EXPLANATORY NOTES

In these regulations

SECTION 1 revokes the definition of by-pass acre.

SECTIONS 2, 6, 7, 9, and 17 enable the removal of processing peas as an insurable crop. The processor is no longer purchasing this crop.

Amendments in **SECTIONS 2, 7, 9 and 17** enable the inclusion of broccoli and cauliflower as insurable crops. These crops were previously

protected under the Agricultural Insurance Act - Commodity Diversification Risk Protection Regulations. Field Peppers are new.

Amendments in **SECTIONS 4 and 13** update the regulations for the shift in responsibility from Agriculture and Agri-Food Canada to the Canadian Food Inspection Agency.

SECTIONS 3 and 5 clarify which groups of crops may be insured separately and the grouping that is used for calculating discounts and surcharges on premiums.

SECTION 7 clarifies the options when a Stage II loss occurs.

SECTION 8 adds field peppers for final indemnity for Stage III losses.

SECTIONS 10, 11 AND 14 are housekeeping amendments and for clarification purposes only.

SECTION 12 corrects standard moisture content for barley to be consistent with the new standard set by the PEI Grain Elevators Corporation.

SECTION 13 specifies both the seed class required for insurance and the impact on probable yield of the post harvest virus levels in the seed planted, and the relative production to count for commercial potatoes based on quality requirements for the end use.

SECTION 15 updates the Elite Seed Potato plan to reflect more appropriate options taking into account the changes in the production requirements due to the concern about virus levels.

SECTION 16 enables producers who wish to grow organic crops to insure eligible crops at a reduced probable yield. There is some concern

if crops like cole crops and potatoes can be grown successfully using “organic” standards and what the implications are for regular growers regarding disease and insect control.

THIS PERMIT is further subject to the condition that any change proposed to the work which is approved by this Permit, must first be brought before the Heritage Coordinator of the Department of Community and Cultural Affairs to determine whether the change is sufficiently minor to be deemed to fall within this Permit. Should that person decide it is not minor in nature or effect, this Permit shall expire immediately and the Permittee shall cause the work on the project to cease.

EXPLANATORY NOTES

- SECTION 1** defines the terms used in the regulations.
- SECTION 2** determines the term of office of Board members, appointment of the Chairperson and quorum.
- SECTION 3** sets out the criteria for entry into the register of heritage places.
- SECTION 4** provides for initiation of the designation process and for service, contents and amendment of a Notice of Intention to Designate Heritage Place.
- SECTION 5** prohibits changes to a site that is subject to a Notice of Intention for a period of 120 days from service of the Notice.
- SECTION 6** provides for a Notice of Objection to be to filed.
- SECTION 7** allows the Minister to designate a heritage place where there are no Notices of Objection filed and specifies details of publication and service.

SECTION 8 requires the Minister to consider Notices of Objection and allows the Minister to designate the site or cancel the Notice of Intention to Designate, and specifies details of publication and service.

SECTION 9 provides for the temporary designation of a site where there is risk of imminent damage to the site, and specifies contents and service of the notice, and limits its effect to 45 days.

SECTION 10 deals with an appeal from a designation to the Commission.

SECTION 11 sets out the powers of the Commission on the appeal.

SECTION 12 gives the notice requirements where the Commission has varied the designation.

SECTION 13 provides for revocation of a designation by the Minister and notice requirements respecting revocation.

SECTION 14 requires that one year elapse before a new Notice of Intention can be issued respecting a site where a Notice of Intention was cancelled, or a designation was revoked.

SECTION 15 requires a person proposing to change a heritage place to apply for a Heritage Permit and sets out the conditions under which the Minister may issue a Heritage Permit approving work or demolition of a heritage place and specifies the conditions that may be placed on the permit.

SECTION 16 provides the conditions under which a municipality may be declared a Municipal Board under the Act and the parts of the Act that may apply to a municipal board.

SECTION 17 requires the forms in Schedule A to be used and allows a Municipal Board to change them as necessary.

SECTION 18 provides for service of notices by registered mail or publication in a newspaper.

Schedule A contains prescribed forms.

**LIQUOR CONTROL ACT
REGULATIONS
AMENDMENT**

(Approved by His Honour the Lieutenant Governor in Council dated 11 July 2000.)

Pursuant to section 8 of the *Liquor Control Act* R.S.P.E.I. 1988, Cap. L-14, the Prince Edward Island Liquor Control Commission, with the approval of the Lieutenant Governor in Council made the following regulations:

1. The Liquor Control Act Regulations (EC704/75) are amended by the addition of the following:

MICRO-BREWERY LICENSE

- 50.7** (1) In this section “micro-brewery” means a free-standing brewery that produces less than 15,000 hectolitres of beer per year. Definition, micro-brewery
- (2) An application for a micro-brewery license shall be Application for license
- (a) in a form as required by the Commission; and
- (b) accompanied by a non-refundable application fee of \$25.
- (3) The Commission may issue a micro-brewery license where Approval of license
- (a) the premises, furnishings, equipment and all other facilities of the micro-brewery are, in the opinion of the Commission, of a high standard; and
- (b) the Commission has received a fee of \$200 from the applicant.
- (4) Every person holding a micro-brewery license shall Federal requirements
- (a) be licensed as a brewer by the Government of Canada;
- (b) manufacture beer in accordance with the *Food and Drugs Act* (Canada); and
- (c) hold a valid license issued pursuant to the *Excise Tax Act* (Canada).

- Alcohol content (5) The holder of a micro-brewery license shall not manufacture beer with an alcohol content in excess of 6.5% alcohol by volume.
- Record of production (6) The holder of a micro-brewery license shall
(a) ensure that proper metering devices are attached to the brewing equipment to mechanically record the total amount of beer manufactured; and
(b) report to the Commission, in a form and according to any conditions required by the Commission, the total amount of beer manufactured.
- Packaging (7) The holder of a micro-brewery license shall package beer only in suitable containers that have been approved for that purpose by the Commission.
- Conditions (8) The Commission may
(a) impose terms and conditions on a micro-brewery license; and
(b) subject to the Act and these regulations
(i) refuse to issue,
(ii) suspend, or
(iii) cancel
a micro-brewery license.
- Books and reports (9) The holder of a micro-brewery license shall
(a) keep and make available for inspection by the Commission any books and records required by the Commission; and
(b) make any reports required by the Commission.
- Retail outlet (10) Subject to the terms and conditions of the micro-brewery license, the holder of a micro-brewery license may operate a brewery retail outlet on the premises of the brewery for the display, sale, tasting, and storage of beer produced and bottled at the micro-brewery.

2. These regulations come into force on July 22, 2000.

EXPLANATORY NOTES

This amendment will enable the licensing and operation of micro-breweries, which shall be restricted to producing 15,000 hectolitres of beer, or less, per year.
