If you are designated as a Protected Person, including Convention Refugees, you are now eligible for student financial assistance from the Government of Canada.

In today's job market, education brings personal success. It holds the key to a better job and a higher income, while helping us to gain a better understanding of the world around us, play a more confident role in Canada, and lead more satisfying lives.

In the 2003 federal Budget, the Government of Canada announced that the Canada Student Financial Assistance Act will be amended to make Protected Persons eligible for financial assistance available through the Canada Student Loans Program (CSLP). The CSLP includes the Canada Student Loan for Full-time Students, the Canada Student Loan for Part-time Students, the Canada-Ontario Integrated Student Loan for Full-time Students (in Ontario), and Canada

If you have been designated as a Protected Person, this change means that you are now eligible to apply for federal student financial assistance.

# Before You Apply

You must ensure that you have the following papers:

☐ A copy of your **Protected Persons Status** Document (PPSD), which must be valid for the entire period of study. For example, if your school year ends in April 2004, your PPSD needs to be valid until at least the end of April 2004.

- ☐ A copy of your **Social Insurance Number (SIN)** card showing a 900 series SIN. If you do not have a SIN card, you must get one before you can apply for student financial assistance from the Government of Canada. Like your PPSD, your SIN card must be valid for the entire period of study.
- If your SIN card was issued before March 30, 2003, it will not have an expiry date printed on it. These cards will automatically expire on April 3, 2004. If your SIN card was issued on or after March 30, 2003, it will have an expiry date for your reference.
- If you don't have a SIN card, or have one that will expire while you are in school, you can visit your local Human Resource Centre of Canada (HRCC) or contact the Social Insurance Registration office by calling I 800 206-7218 or visiting its Web site at www.hrdc-drhc.gc.ca/sin-nas/010\_e.shtml.

## How To Apply

- ☐ Get an application form from the student financial assistance office in the province or territory in which you live\*\* or educational institution you plan to attend. These offices will also be able to answer specific questions you might have about your application.
- ☐ Ensure that all your required papers are up-to-date before applying for student financial assistance from the Government of Canada to avoid any unnecessary delays. Applications received without the appropriate documentation will **not** be processed.
- ☐ Confirm that your school is on your province's or territory's list of designated institutions.
- ☐ Visit CanLearn at www.canlearn.ca or check out your provincial or territorial student financial assistance Web site for more information or a list of designated institutions.

\*\* Quebec, Northwest Territories and Nunavut do not participate in the Canada Student Loans Program, but operate their own student financial assistance programs.

## Submitting Your Application

Once you have your valid PPSD, SIN card, and your student financial assistance application, you must submit them to the financial aid office at your school, or your provincial/territorial student financial assistance office for processing. This office will determine if you are eligible and the amount you will receive.
