



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1.1 Resource Rationale

This edition of Opportunity Trails: An Atlantic-Wide Connection has been published by the Atlantic Canada Opportunities Agency (ACOA) to help educators access organizations and resources that promote various aspects of entrepreneurship development. 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2.1 Section Overview

This section of *Opportunity Trails* highlights information and strategies to enrich the physical learning environment for both entrepreneurship educators and their students. The section explores how entrepreneurs learn and operate within the real world of business and then links this process to educational practices that reflect the desired parallel between entrepreneurship and entrepreneurship education.

2.2 Entrepreneurship in Action

Factors attributed to starting and operating a successful business can help educators establish a learning environment that nurtures the development of important entrepreneurial attributes. The learning process entrepreneurs undergo to establish and maintain a business has traditionally been a naturally occurring progression for many individuals. Research undertaken at the Durham University Business School indicates that successful entrepreneurs develop essential knowledge, skills and qualities through a combination of their experiences and environmental stimuli. In the world of business, these attributes often include creativity, commitment, problem solving, flexibility, trust, networking, planning, risk-taking, perseverance, self-confidence and a strong sense of ownership.

The 'small business learning mode', as outlined below, necessitates the application of these fundamental attributes and amplifies the significant role education can play within the context of entrepreneurship development.

Small Business Learning Mode



2.3 Learning Styles & Retention Rates

In addition to the 'small business learning mode', it is also significant to understand the basic underpinnings of how individuals learn and retain knowledge. This information is relevant for entrepreneurship educators because it can be applied in the creation and validation of an educational framework best suited to meet the needs of pre-aspiring and aspiring entrepreneurs.

2.4 Entrepreneurship Education



We are at last coming to realize that the most important resources in Canada are not in the ground or in our oceans.

They are in our classrooms.

For many young people the awareness, knowledge and skills required to start and sustain a business venture have not evolved from their personal experiences or environmental stimuli. Entrepreneurship education provides a focused avenue for determining whether these pre-aspiring and/or aspiring entrepreneurs would like to undertake a career in business. Given this scenario, it becomes extremely important for educators to purvey a learning experience that will facilitate the continuing development of key attitudes and skills within an environment that reflects, as closely as possible, the knowledge required to be successful in the real world of business.

Entrepreneurship education offers students an opportunity to build upon their abilities, experiences and interests in a manner that might have otherwise gone unrecognized. Through entrepreneurship education, learners can discover and develop entrepreneurial knowledge, skills and abilities that will encourage them to identify, create, initiate and manage venture opportunities.

In an educational setting, the ability of students to recognize their entrepreneurial potential will likely be impacted by their exposure to various content-related resources and business-related pedagogy. Nurturing the transition from a culture of learner dependency to that of an entrepreneurial learning culture will ultimately encourage a sense of greater ownership, self-confidence and empowerment among students.

The desire to pursue a career in entrepreneurship will hopefully be the direct result of students' experiences and adventures in your entrepreneurship class or program!



2.5 Entrepreneurial Teaching

Every time the teacher does something for the learner, a learning opportunity is denied to the learner. Often this denial takes place because it is assumed the learner is incapable, yet the constant making of such assumptions compounds this incapacity. All teachers need to do is take every opportunity to say, "I will not do this myself, but instead I will provide the support that others need to do it"

One of the major challenges of entrepreneurship education is integrating learner needs with effective teaching strategies to increase the likelihood that students will be able to cope with the realities associated with entrepreneurship. To facilitate the type of learning that parallels the 'small business learning mode', an emphasis needs to be placed on...

Nurturing Ownership...

Students need opportunities to demonstrate initiative and take greater responsibility for their learning, including their mistakes and achievements. Promoting student ownership in entrepreneurship education will help increase levels of student engagement, confidence and empowerment.



Students can develop a greater understanding of curriculum content when they learn in a hands-on environment and have opportunities to apply entrepreneurial concepts and knowledge in an authentic context (i.e. venture creation).



Encouraging teamwork and networking strategies to develop ideas, plan and solve problems is a powerful learning process that students need to apply to meet challenges and needs related to entrepreneurship.



Assessment strategies should validate the importance of performance, skill development and content knowledge whereby entrepreneurship students are able to learn from their successes and mistakes on a regular basis.



Educators who infuse an entrepreneurial approach in the delivery of entrepreneurship programs and curricula often assume the roles of coach, facilitator and learner. Within this setting the learning partnership between the teacher and student is often dynamic and fluid, whereby an effective balance between conventional and entrepreneurial instructional strategies is utilized.

2.6 Assessing Teaching Styles

Being able to quickly assess the type of teaching approach educators use in entrepreneurship education can be a valuable indicator of how closely the 'small business learning mode' is being supported within the classroom and/or program at any particular moment in time.

The Teaching Approach Inventory is a simple tool designed to help educators identify entrepreneurial teaching strategies that can be infused within a particular lesson, unit or program. By calculating the number of checks for each of the twenty inventory questions, entrepreneurship educators can provide themselves with a general sense of where they are on the Teaching Approach Continuum.



A. Experiential Zone

Are students encouraged to:

- undertake hands-on challenges in an effort to meet curriculum outcomes?
- explore and draw upon their interests and experiences?
- become actively involved in planning/implementing a venture?
- learn entrepreneurial knowledge beyond the confines of the classroom?
- apply entrepreneurial skills and qualities in a real-world setting?



B. Ownership Zone

- □ take greater responsibility for overcoming challenges?
- develop strategies and project ideas to achieve curriculum outcomes?
- be creative, take risks and expand their comfort zone?
- identify personal and course-related goals within the context of entrepreneurship?

C. Collaboration Zone

- work effectively in a team-based environment?
- □ learn from the opinions and feedback of others?
- network with peers and other community-based resources?
- respect their teacher as a learning partner?
- manage various human resource requirements to complete learning tasks?



D. Evaluation Zone

- □ learn from guided reflection?
- participate in performance-based assessment?
- assess their peers?
- assess themselves?
- review goals and objectives on a regular basis?

2.7 Benefits of Student Venturing

If students are to become actively engaged in entrepreneurship education it is important to provide enriched learning opportunities that are related to the venture creation process. Learning activities such as creating a business for a day, miniventures and other venture creation initiatives all foster a deeper awareness for the requirements of a long-term business venture. Perhaps the most important outcome derived from student venturing within an entrepreneurship curriculum or program is that it promotes...



Student venturing encourages networking with organizations and individuals that can provide resources, expertise and feedback required for the planning and implementation of a venture idea. When students have reality-based challenges they will extend their efforts to find new and creative ways to fulfill their needs.



Student venturing establishes a clear sense of purpose for curriculum content. It enables the application of new knowledge, skills and attitudes and results in a level of understanding that can best be achieved through experience.



Student venturing often means that students will experience new anxieties and pressures. Dealing with the unknowns related to entrepreneurship will ultimately help them expand their comfort zone and allow them to demonstrate some important attributes of entrepreneurs.



Student venturing activities help promote an 'I can do it!' attitude and provide an experience that can be drawn upon when introducing new concepts. Increasing levels of self-esteem and confidence through action can also personalize the perceived role entrepreneurship can play in students' future endeavours.



2.8 Breaking Down Barriers

Entrepreneurship education...is an adventure in reality. The classroom walls recede as the home, community and the free enterprise system become learning labs. The teacher becomes the facilitator rather than the holder and dispenser of knowledge. We all learn by discovery and through trial and error. There are no standard, carved-in-stone teachers' guide answers. Students and teachers learn from each other. Parents, entrepreneurs from the community, inventors, bankers and artists ...all become visiting professors.

If educators are committed to nurturing an entrepreneurial culture then they must strive to extend learning beyond the walls of the classroom by utilizing resources, people and organizations to help bring greater meaning and relevance to entrepreneurship education.

To help you develop an 'open air' learning environment you might want to consider the following ideas:

Use the Technology

Encourage students to go on-line to find information, organizations and resources they can use to meet their immediate and long-term needs. Use the phone, fax, and email to connect with people who can help.

Open the Door

Open your classroom to community stakeholders who have needs or expertise in various areas of entrepreneurship.

Collaborate with your students and share the responsibility involved in planning for a guest or a community-based venture



Whenever possible, encourage students to explore and cultivate their entrepreneurial potential within the context of the business community. For example, students can interact with entrepreneurs, development organizations, implement a business venture or undertake market research.

3.4 Entrepreneurship Organizations, Programs & Resources

Centre for Entrepreneurship Education & Development (CEED)

CEED is a division of the Nova Scotia Department of Education that has a broad mandate covering many areas of entrepreneurship development. CEED's mission is to nurture entrepreneurship by undertaking, creating, coordinating and acting as a catalyst in entrepreneurship education, research and program design, professional development and community entrepreneurship. CEED provides entrepreneurship development opportunities for educators and students within the Atlantic region through a variety of professional development and resource-related initiatives.

CEED Public School Initiatives:

Entrepreneurship: A Way of Life - High School - (Resource Package)

This comprehensive resource package provides experiential activities and resource materials to compliment the Entrepreneurship 12 high school curriculum in Nova Scotia. It can also serve as a valuable resource for high school entrepreneurship courses in other provinces.

<u>Introduction to Entrepreneurship - Grade 9 - (Resource Module)</u>

This module was created as an interdisciplinary unit to support and enrich the grade 9 Atlantic Studies course offered in Nova Scotia.

The Best Lemonade Stand - Middle School - (Program)

This program is suited for middle school students who want to learn about starting and operating their own business. It is an experiential one-to-four week program that consists of thirteen modules educators can use with their students.

Workplace Experiences Program for Educators - (Program)

CEED has developed and piloted a workplace experiences program designed to help teachers transfer personal experiences from the business world back to their classroom. This Program helps students become aware of the realities of current workplace environments and encourages them to develop relevant employability skills and attitudes in all areas of their curriculum studies.

Leading Edge II - (Resource Package)

Leading Edge II is a comprehensive video resource package showcasing Atlantic Canadian entrepreneurs and comes complete with sample activities and lesson plans. The creation of this resource was a partnership initiative between the Anglophone divisions of the four Departments of Education in Atlantic Canada.

Venturing through an Integrated Curriculum - (Independent Study Program)

The mission of JA is to inspire and educate young Canadians to value free enterprise, understand business and economics and develop entrepreneurial and leadership skills. JA offers a variety of educational programs to school age children and youth through classroom and extra-curricular initiatives.

Current JA Educational Programs:

JA Elementary School Program - (Ages 10-11)

Business Basics uses fun and colourful activities to help young students learn about the relationships between organization, management, production and marketing. Children also learn about the role of small business in their community.

JA Middle School Programs - (Ages 12-14)

The Project Business Series explores personal economics, making sense of business and Canada's role in the global marketplace. In the personal economics component, students

assess personal skills and interests and examine education and career possibilities. In the remaining components they examine the inner workings of business and understand the influence of consumers, competitors and government with a local and global perspective.

Economics of Staying in School (ESIS) is designed to help students develop positive attitudes toward education and their future by allowing students to explore the relationship between education and personal goals, learn about the costs of living independently and examine possible careers to match their goals and lifestyle occupations.

JA High School Programs - (Ages 15-19)

JA Student Venture offers students the opportunity to experience the risks and rewards of entrepreneurship. Students run their own classroom-based business by producing a product or providing a service.

JA Business Game provides students with an opportunity to enhance their Analytical and decision-making skills by playing the JA Business game. This business management simulation makes economics come alive.

Global Learning of the Business Enterprise (GLOBE) offers participants the opportunity to establish joint venture trading companies with companies from other classes. The program teaches the value of international trade and the practical skills necessary to function in a global market.

The Company Program, JA's only after class program, offers students the opportunity to learn about the process involved in the organization, operation, and completion of a fiscal cycle for a business.

The Y-Enterprise Centre in St. John's Newfoundland has been working in partnership with the Newfoundland and Labrador Department of Education to provide support for entrepreneurship education within the public school system.

The St. John's Y-Enterprise Centre currently offers the following initiatives:

Enterprise Olympics Conference - (High School Conference & Competition)

This three day event gives Enterprise Education students at the senior high level, throughout Newfoundland and Labrador, the opportunity to celebrate their business innovation through two competitions: *The Enterprise Showcase Competition* and *The Business Plan Competition*.

The provincial *Enterprise Showcase Competition* is designed to simulate "real life" trade shows. Students who have developed a product or service are encouraged creatively design a well-planned exhibit and to use their communication skills to "sell" their concept.

The intent of the *Business Plan Competition* is to promote sound business planning and to provide a meaningful learning experience for participating students. Students who are selected to attend the conference are required to present their business concepts/plans to a review panel.

Entrepreneurship educators throughout Atlantic Canada might find the Enterprise Olympics Teacher's Guide useful for adaptation in their own community.

Market Your Thoughts - (Grades 7-9 Competition)

Market Your Thoughts is a business essay competition offered to all students in grades 7-9 throughout Newfoundland and Labrador. The competition requires that students identify a business opportunity that might be viable in the province of Newfoundland and Labrador. The Market Your Thoughts competition encourages students to become entrepreneurial in the way that they think and act.

<u>Creating Businesses: Guiding Youth Towards Entrepreneurial Success - (Student Resource)</u> This student resource was developed as a supplementary classroom resource so that young people would have the opportunity to use it as a guide and workbook in the development of their business plans.


