The objective of the Prairie Grain Roads Program (PGRP) is to provide a contribution to upgrade rural roads used for the transportation of grain in the Prairie provinces. The purpose of this program is to reduce the impact of federal reforms to grain transportation legislation on provincial secondary highways and municipal roads.

An Agreement Management Committee (AMC) has been established to implement the PGRP and includes representation from the federal and provincial governments, and the Association of Manitoba Municipalities.

The program is administered by Agriculture and Agri-Food Canada (AAFC), as represented by the Prairie Farm Rehabilitation Administration (PFRA).
