

FODDER

COMMODITY CHARACTERISTICS

Fodder such as hay, straw, grasses and silage intended to feed ruminants, swine or horses.
Grains, seeds and cereals are NOT regulated.

PROCEDURES

- A) Imported from United States of America - NO RESTRICTION** - for Animal Health as per Section 54 of the Health of Animals Regulations.
- B) Imported from Countries other than United States of America - PROHIBITED-** as per Section 54 of the Health of Animals Regulations.

Note: Hay, straw or fodder intended to be used as feed for species other than ruminants, swine and horses may be imported without restriction if Customs Commercial Invoice (CCI) or other satisfactory documentation that indicates the intended use and the species.

This directive does not apply to products regulated under Section 55 of the Regulations (when used for packaging).

IMPLEMENTATION:

This general import directive supersedes all specific or general directives.

This directive relates to AH import requirements and does not remove any obligation to the Canadian importer to comply with the import requirements of other Canadian Food Inspection Agency (CFIA) programs and/or other departments such as Plant Protection and Feed and Fertilizer Divisions of Plant Products Division, CFIA.

If not prohibited by another CFIA program, the documents mentioned above may be provided by fax to the IPC, prior to importation i.e. AGRI-PARS.

Imported products are subject to inspection fees of \$14.95 Agriculture - Planning, Reporting and Accountability Structure (AGRI-PARS) or \$25.25 (regular) with the exception of the United States of America, whereby no inspection fees are applicable.
