Preface

This is the third edition of the *Child and Family Services (C&FS) Statistical Report* of the Working Group on Child and Family Services Information, presenting statistical data on child welfare services in Canada. The format of the report is based on statistical tables previously found in the *Compendium on Child and Family Services Information* and the report entitled *Child Welfare in Canada: the Role of Provincial and Territorial Authorities in Cases of Child Abuse*.

The *C&FS Statistical Report* presents data on a range of services to children and families, including protection services and adoption, with the main focus being on children in care. Each jurisdictional section provides statistics on services to children and families and, in some cases, expenditure data for departments responsible for child welfare. Data are provided for 1996-97, 1997-98 and 1998-99, and may be presented for the fiscal year, calendar year, for the month of March, or as at the end of March, depending on the reporting system for each jurisdiction. Provinces and territories have submitted statistics extracted from data systems developed to meet the administrative and case management needs of their respective jurisdictions. As such, there are extensive variations in the types of data collected and the manner in which they are reported. For instance, some data may refer to all allegations of child abuse and others to investigations only. Actual client data may represent the number of families or children. Therefore, **data for a given province or territory cannot and should not be compared across jurisdictions**.

Each jurisdiction has its own legislation providing for the protection of children. Services may be provided to a child in need of protection through several means. *Preventive services* may be provided by child welfare authorities with the agreement and co-operation of the family to help resolve difficulties. Formalized *voluntary agreements* may be negotiated between child welfare authorities and the child's family outlining each party's responsibilities towards the care and custody of the child; these are usually temporary in nature and may involve placement of the child outside the family home. Where a child is considered to be in imminent danger, child welfare authorities may *apprehend* the child. Where a child has been apprehended, or a voluntary agreement is not feasible or appropriate, a *child protection hearing* is scheduled. The court determines whether the child is in need of protection, and may issue an order concerning the care, custody and/or guardianship of the child.

Throughout the report, where provinces and territories were unable to provide data, the symbol "n/a" has been used. Following the statistical tables in each section, there appears a glossary of terminology defining such terms as child and children in care, and describing various legal statuses.

Table A provides the most recent post-censal estimates from Statistics Canada on the overall child population in Canada, by province and territory for children in various age groupings.

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Introduction

The data presented in this section were provided by the Child Welfare Division of the Department of Health and Community Services. Data are provided for the following areas:

1. *Investigations* - allegations of child abuse or neglect investigated.
2. *Child Welfare Cases* - number of child welfare cases by region including child protection, children-in-care, foster care, family support and adoption cases.
3. *Children not in Care*- cases where there is no transfer of custody or guardianship.
4. *Children in Care* - cases where there has been a transfer of custody and/or guardianship to the Director of Child Welfare.
5. *Adoptions* – children in care, relative and step-parent adoptions.

In addition, expenditures for the Department of Health and Community Services are included.

Newfoundland data should not be compared with data from other jurisdictions due to the limitations outlined in the Preface.

Glossary of Terms

- Child:** An unmarried boy or girl under the age of 16. A child who is in the Director's care at age 16 may have wardship extended to age 19. Financial and other services may be extended to age 21.
- Child in Care:** Child in need of protection under the *Child Welfare Act* and in care under the following legal statuses: Voluntary Care Agreement, pending disposition (those who have been apprehended and are waiting for the child protection hearing plus those under interim orders waiting for the judge's decision), consent to adoption, Order of Temporary Wardship (temporary ward), Order of Permanent Wardship (permanent ward), and Youth Care Agreement (youth under extended care who were in care on the day before their 16th birthday under an order or agreement).
- Voluntary Care Agreement:** Also called a Non-Ward Agreement, allows parents to voluntarily and temporarily give up care of their child to the Director of Child Welfare. The parents retain guardianship rights. The agreement is generally for up to three months and may be extended for an additional three months.
- Supervision Order:** Used when a child is found to be in need of protection but is returned to the care and custody of the parents or any other suitable adult. Guardianship is either retained by the parents or given by a Court to a third party under the supervision of the Director. The order is made for a maximum of 12 months and specific recommendations may be made by the Judge. The child is not considered to be in care.
- Order of Temporary Wardship:** Custody and guardianship of a child is transferred to the Director of Child Welfare. The parents must consent to any medical treatment required by the child. Orders cannot exceed 12 months.
- Order of Permanent Wardship:** Permanent wardship is granted only when the parents are incapable of providing guardianship; have no desire to, or are not available to provide guardianship; or there is an apparently irreversible history of abuse or serious neglect. When a child is made a permanent ward, the parents lose their custody and guardianship rights and the child may be placed for adoption.

Youth Care Agreement: Temporary or permanent wardship extended to age 19.

Consent to Adoption: Under *The Adoption of Children Act*, a parent may voluntarily relinquish a child to the Director of Child Welfare for the purposes of adoption.

Glossary of Terms

- Child:** A person actually or apparently under the age of majority (i.e., 18 years). Services may be extended to age 21 to a permanent ward.
- Child in care:** Those children who are in need of protection under the *Family and Child Services Act* who fall under the following legal statuses: Temporary Guardianship Agreement, Temporary Custody Agreement, Permanent Guardianship Agreement, apprehended, Permanent Guardianship Order, Temporary Custody and Guardianship Order, ward of another province, and children who have been in care, have returned home and are receiving post-care services (“follow-up to child in care”).
- Voluntary Agreement for Temporary Custody:** Temporarily transfers custody, but not guardianship, of the child to the Director of Child Welfare for a period of up to six months. A child under 13 may have the agreement extended for two additional six month terms; a child 13 or over may have it extended indefinitely to age 18.
- Voluntary Agreement for Temporary Guardianship:** Transfers the legal guardianship and custody of the child to the Director of Child Welfare for up to six months. Provisions for extension are the same as for a Voluntary Agreement for Temporary Custody.
- Permanent Guardianship Agreement:** The parents voluntarily and permanently transfer the custody and guardianship of the child to the Director of Child Welfare or agency.
- Supervision Order:** A child in need of protection is returned to the parents under the supervision of the Director of Child Welfare for a specified period not to exceed six months. The order may be extended for an additional six months. The child is not considered to be in care.
- Temporary Order for Custody and Guardianship:** Commits the child to the temporary custody and guardianship of the Director for a period of up to six months. The order may be extended for an additional six months.
- Permanent Guardianship Order:** The Director of Child Welfare becomes the sole guardian of the child until the child attains the age of majority, marries, is adopted or a judge terminates the order.

Data presented in this section, including the Child Abuse Register, are from Nova Scotia's Case Management System which is maintained by the Department of Community Services. Data are provided for the following areas:

1. *Protection* - services to all families/children considered to be "at risk" or in need of protection.
2. *Child Abuse Register* - contains information on victims and perpetrators of child abuse.
3. *Children in Care* - cases where there has been a transfer of custody and/or guardianship.
4. *Adoptions* - agency/ward and private adoptions.

In addition, expenditures for child and family services plus the Department of Community Services are included.

Nova Scotia data should not be compared with data for other jurisdictions due to the limitations outlined in the Preface.

Glossary of Terms

- Child:** A person under sixteen years of age. The permanent care and custody of a child may be extended until the child reaches age 21.
- Child in Care:** Any child who is in need of protection under the *Children and Family Services Act* who has had a transfer of custody and/or guardianship through a Temporary Care Agreement, a Special Needs Agreement, a Temporary Care and Custody Order (includes status during adjournments in child protection hearing), a Permanent Care and Custody Order, or voluntary relinquishment for adoption purposes.
- Child Abuse Register:** The province operates a Child Abuse Register for the purpose of recording both Family Court findings of abuse and Criminal Code convictions against children. The information is used primarily for child protection and screening purposes.
- Temporary Care Agreement:** Care and supervision of a child are transferred to an agency for up to six months; the parent retains guardianship. An agreement may be renewed for an additional six months.
- Special Needs Agreement:** A written agreement with an agency or the Minister for the care and custody of a child with special needs or for the provision of services to meet the child's needs. The parent retains legal custody under this type of agreement as well as authority for emergency medical treatment. The agreement may be for up to one year and may be renewed for additional one year periods.
- Court Application By Agency:** An agency may make an application to the court to determine whether a child is in need of protective services. Under an application, the child remains in the care of the parent or guardian.
- Taken into Care:** An agent may without warrant or court order take a child into care where there are reasonable grounds to believe that a child is in need of protective services and the child's health or safety cannot otherwise be protected.
- Supervision Order:** The child remains in the care and custody of a person other than a parent or guardian, under supervision of the agency or is returned to the family, under supervision of the agency, for up to one year. The child is not considered to be in care.

Temporary Care and Custody Order:

An agency retains temporary care and custody of the child for up to six months from the date he was taken into care or one year from the date he was found to be in need of protection. Maximum duration varies by age: for a child under 3 it is three months; for a child aged 3 to 11, it is six months; and for a child 12 or older it is one year.

Permanent Care and Order:

The agency becomes the child's legal guardian, assuming all **Custody** parental rights and responsibilities.



Introduction

3. *Adoptions* - departmental, private, international and special services.

Glossary of Terms

- Child:** A person who is, or appears to be, under 19 years of age. For child protection purposes, regulations define a child as actually or apparently under the age of 16, and include a disabled person actually or apparently under the age of 19. Services may be extended beyond age 19 for children in the permanent care and custody of the Department of Health and Community Services.
- Children in Care:** Children who are in need of protection under the *Family Services Act* and are in care under the following legal statuses: Custody Agreement, Protective Care, Supervisory Order, Custody Order, Guardianship Order or Agreement (voluntary relinquishment for adoption) (includes Post Guardianship Services Agreements) and wards from other jurisdictions.
- Custody Agreement:** Parent voluntarily agrees to transfer custody, care and control of a child (but not guardianship) to the Department for up to one year, with extensions made in exceptional cases only.
- Guardianship Agreement:** Voluntary relinquishment of a child for adoption.
- Protective Care:** A service which provides an immediate safeguard for a child's security and development.
- Supervisory Order:** Child remains at, or returns, home with supervision of the child and the child's family by the Department for up to six months. The order may be extended for further periods of six months each. Parents retain custody and guardianship.
- Custody Order:** Child is removed from the home, with custody, care and control (but not guardianship) transferred to the Department for the duration of the six month order. The order may be extended for additional six month periods to a maximum of 24 months.
- Guardianship Order:** Care, custody, control and all parental rights and responsibilities with respect to the child are permanently transferred to the Department. Post guardianship services may be extended to a child who is under a Guardianship Order at the age of 19, if enrolled in an educational program or not self-sufficient due to physical, mental or emotional disabilities.

Post Guardianship Services Agreement:

Services are extended to youths beyond age 19 who were in the permanent care and custody of the department provided they are in school or have special needs.

Protective Intervention Order:

A person the court considers to be a danger to the child's security or development may be prohibited from residing in the same premises as the child or contacting the child for up to six months.



Introduction

Data presented in this section are taken from the statistical data system maintained by the Association des centres jeunesse du Québec. In Québec, the age limit for receiving a report of neglect or abuse is up to and including 17. In addition, child protection reports may be made for adolescents with behavioural problems, unlike most other jurisdictions. Data are provided for the following areas:

1. *Investigations* – carried out under the terms of the *Youth Protection Act*.
2. *Youth Protection measures* – to ensure a child's security and development are not compromised.
3. *Child Interventions* – Director takes charge of the child's situation and either negotiates an agreement with the child/family or refers case to Québec Court, Youth Chamber.
4. *Adoptions* – both domestic and international.

Québec data should not be compared with data for other jurisdictions due to the limitations outlined in the Preface.

This information is provided by the Association des centres jeunesse du Québec. The Québec government is not participating in this initiative.

Glossary of Terms

- Child:** A person under the age of 18. Under article 64 of the *Youth Protection Act*, a child who has been placed outside the family home by Court order may continue to receive services until the age of 21.
- Child Intervention:** In Quebec, the Director of Youth Protection takes charge of the child’s situation and **not** the child. A child may receive services by voluntary agreement or by Court order, and may remain with the family (natural environment) or be placed in a facility (foster home, group home etc.)
The number of children in care may be estimated based on the number of children who are receiving services outside the family home.
- Voluntary Measures: (agreements)** The Director and the child’s parents may agree on the measures needed to prevent the child’s safety and development from being compromised. These include a full range of treatment, service and placement options. An agreement may last for up to one year if the Director feels that the situation will be resolved during that period. Otherwise, the case is referred to the Québec Court, Youth Chamber.
- Court order:** Where it is not possible to reach an agreement between the Director and the child’s parents, the case is heard before the Québec Court, Youth Chamber. The court imposes all terms and conditions. The measures that may be imposed include the full range of options available via voluntary agreements.



Introduction

Child Welfare services are provided by Children's Aid Societies (CAS's). There are 54 CAS's in Ontario (5 of these are Aboriginal CAS's). Each CAS is an independent non-government agency governed by a board of directors. The data in the following tables were provided by the Ontario Ministry of Community and Social Services (MCSS) and represent data from all Children's Aid Societies as well as Native Services provided on reserves under the following categories.

1. *Investigation and assessment* - investigations of reports that a child is or may be in need of protection.
2. *Protection* – active protection and prevention cases.
3. *Children in Care* - children who are in the temporary or permanent care of a CAS (court ordered or voluntary agreements)
4. *CAS Adoptions* - agency adoptions.

In addition, data is included for expenditures on child and family services and the entire Ministry.

The *Child and Family Services Amendment Act* (Child Welfare Reform), 1999, S.O. 2 (formerly known as Bill 6) was proclaimed to come into force March 31, 2000, except for Subsection 2(3); Section 11; Subsection 23(2); Section 27; Section 28; Subsections 30(2), (3), (5); Section 31; Subsection 33(2).

The amendments to the *CFSA Act* are intended to:

- Clarify that the paramount purpose of the Act is to promote the best interests, protection and well being of children.
- Expand the reasons for finding a child in need of protection to encourage earlier action to protect children.
- Make it easier for Children's Aid Societies to get the information they need to protect children.
- Allow evidence concerning a person's past conduct toward children to be used in child protection proceedings.
- Promote earlier permanency planning for children.
- Clarify and expand the duty to report.
- Provide for mandatory review of the CFSA at least every five years.

- Child:** A person under 18 years of age. The *Child and Family Services Act* stipulates that protection services are to be provided to a child under the age of 16. Care and maintenance may be extended to Crown wards to age 21.
- Child in care:** A child in need of protection under the *Child and Family Services Act* and in care under the following legal statuses: Temporary Care Agreement, Special Needs Agreement, Society Wardship Order (temporary ward), Crown Wardship Order (permanent ward), Extended Care and Maintenance, Temporary Order for Care and Custody, Parental Consent to Adopt.
- Temporary Care Agreement:** The temporary transfer of custody of a child to a Children's Aid Society, for a maximum period of six months. The agreement may be extended for an additional six months.
- Special Needs Agreement:** Parents having care and custody of a special needs child who are unable to provide the services the child requires may enter into an agreement with a CAS. The CAS may assume care and custody of the child in order to provide the services needed by the child. Sixteen or seventeen year olds who have been abused, abandoned or refused support by their parents may also enter into a Special Needs Agreement. The initial term of the agreement is one year and may be extended for one additional year.
- Parental Consent to Adopt:** Allows the parents to voluntarily relinquish an infant to a CAS for adoption purposes.
- Supervision Order:** A child remains in his community (in own home or other arrangements) under the supervision of a CAS. The order may last from three to twelve months. Indefinite extensions are allowed. The child is not considered to be in care.
- Society Wardship Order:** Places a child in the care and custody of a CAS for up to 12 months. The parent gives up guardianship of the child for the duration of the order.
- Crown Wardship Order:** Permanently transfers the care, custody and control of a child to a CAS.

Glossary of Terms

- Child:** A person under the age of majority (i.e., under 18 years of age). Care and maintenance of a child who is a permanent ward may be extended up to the child's 21st birthday.
- Child in care:** A child in care refers to a child in the care of an agency under *The Child and Family Services Act*. There are six legal statuses: apprehension (in or out of the home); Temporary Order of Guardianship; Permanent Order of Guardianship; Voluntary Surrender of Guardianship (usually for adoption purposes); Voluntary Placement Agreement; and, transfers from another jurisdiction.
- Voluntary Placement Agreement:** An agreement used by families who are unable to care for a child because of a family crisis, because the child has special needs or where a child 14 years of age or older is beyond the parent's control. The agency assumes responsibility for the child's care but there is no surrender of guardianship. The agreement may be renewed for an additional 12 months. For a child over 14, unlimited renewals up to his 18th birthday are permitted.
- Order of Supervision:** The child may be returned to or left in the parent's or guardian's home under agency supervision and subject to specified conditions. The court may impose any duration to such an order. These children are not considered to be in care.
- Third Party Placement Order:** The child may be placed temporarily or permanently with another person, with or without a transfer of guardianship. The court may impose any duration to such an order.
- Temporary Guardianship Order:** The agency may be appointed the temporary guardian of the child for a period ranging from 6 to 24 months (depending on the child's age), allowing for parents to resolve the problems which led to the child's removal from the home. Renewal provisions vary according to the age of the child.
- Permanent Guardianship Order:** An agency is appointed as the child's guardian and the parent's rights and responsibilities regarding the child are terminated.

**Voluntary Surrender of
Guardianship Agreement:**

A parent voluntarily transfers all rights and responsibilities
of parenthood to an agency.

Glossary of Terms

- Child:** An unmarried person under 16 years of age. A 16 or 17 year old who is unable to protect himself/herself from a dangerous situation may be apprehended in exceptional circumstances. Residential and/or financial services agreements may be made with a 16 or 17 year old youth for whom no parent is willing to assume responsibility. Services to a permanent ward or a child under a Long Term Care Agreement may be extended to age 21.
- Children in Care:** Children whose legal status is one of the following: Apprehension, Residential Care Agreement, Agreement for Services to 16 and 17 Year Olds, Temporary Committal Order (temporary ward), Long Term Order to Age 18, Permanent Committal Order, Voluntary Committal (voluntary relinquishment for adoption) and Extended Care Agreement.
- Residential Care Agreement:** Voluntary transfer of custody but not guardianship to the Minister of Social Services for any period of time up to one year. The agreement may be renewed for one additional year.
- Agreement for Services to 16 and 17 year olds:** An agreement providing residential and/or financial services to 16 or 17 year olds when there is no parent willing to assume responsibility for the youth or the youth cannot be re-established with his/her family.
- Temporary Committal Order:** The child is placed in the care and custody of the Minister for up to six months while the parent retains guardianship. The order may be extended for one additional year.
- Permanent Committal Order:** Custody and guardianship of a child is permanently transferred to the Minister of Social Services.
- Long-Term Order to Age 18:** When an older child (under 16 years of age) is in need of protection and is unlikely or does not wish to be adopted, he/she is placed in the custody of the Minister until age 18.
- Extended Care Agreement:** A permanent or long-term care ward who remains in school may enter into an agreement to extend services to age 21.

Voluntary Committal:

A parent of any age may voluntarily commit a child to the care of the Minister and relinquish all custody and guardianship rights.

- Child:** A person under the age of 18 years.
- Child in care:** A child who is need of protection and has one of the following legal authorities: Emergency Apprehension; Apprehension Order; Order to Extend Custody/TGO to 3 Years; Custody Agreement with Child; Temporary Guardianship Order; Interim Custody Order; Permanent Guardianship Agreement; or Permanent Guardianship Order.
- Care and Maintenance Agreement:** A child who was the subject of a Support Agreement With Child (services provided to a child in the home), a Custody Agreement With Child, a Temporary Guardianship Order, a Permanent Guardianship Order, or Permanent Guardianship Agreement at the time they turned 18 may have services provided for up to six months at any time until they turn 20. The agreement may be renewed indefinitely until the young adult turns 20.
- Custody Agreement:** A Director assumes temporary custody of a child for up to six months. The parent retains guardianship. The agreement may be renewed for up to six months at a time. The total time in temporary care (including temporary guardianship orders) may not exceed 2 years.
- Interim Custody Order:** Order giving the Director interim care and custody of a child during court adjournments.
- Permanent Guardianship Agreement:** A parent voluntarily relinquishes a child to a Director for the purposes of adoption. All parental rights are terminated. Custody and guardianship are permanently transferred to a Director.
- Permanent Guardianship Order:** A court assigns guardianship of a child to a Director. All parental rights are terminated. Custody and guardianship are permanently transferred to the Director.
- Temporary Guardianship Order:** Custody and guardianship are extended to a Director, with guardianship shared with the parent. The initial duration may not exceed one year and may be extended for one additional year. The total time in temporary care (including custody agreements) may not normally exceed two years. This term may be further extended to three years if ordered by the court.

Supervision Order:

A Director may supervise both the guardian and child in need of protective service in the family home. The initial order may not exceed six months but may be extended indefinitely. The child is not considered to be in care.



Introduction

1. *Child and Family Services* - family support services.
2. *Protection* - services to all families/children considered to be "at risk" or in need of protection.

Glossary of Terms

- Child:** A person under 19 years of age. Support and/or maintenance may be provided to former permanent wards or to a person who was party to a youth agreement until the person's 19th birthday for a total of 24 months until the person's 24th birthday.
- Child in Care:** Children in the care of the Director designated under the *Child, Family and Community Service Act* (temporary or permanent transfer of guardianship and/or custody) under the following legal statuses: Voluntary Care Agreement; Special Needs Agreement; Removal; Interim Custody Order; Temporary Custody Order; Continuing Custody Order; *Adoption Act* Ward; *Family Relations Act* Ward; ward of another jurisdiction.
- Voluntary Care Agreement:** Agreement between the Director and the parent that results in the placement of the child in a foster home for a short period while the parent deals with whatever difficulty has led them to be unable to care for their child on a temporary basis. The agreement may be made for a period of up to 3 months if the child is under 5 years of age or up to 6 months if the child is older. Depending on the age of the child, extensions of up to 24 months are possible.
- Special Needs Agreement:** Agreement between the Director and the parent of a special needs child where the parent requires additional support services to care for the child. The child is often placed in a specialized resource designed to respond to the child's special needs. Agreements are for a period of six months and can be renewed for periods of up to 12 months.
- Youth Agreement:** An agreement between the Director under the *Child, Family and Community Service Act* and a youth who needs assistance and who cannot, in the Director's opinion, be re-established in the youth's family, or has no parent or other person willing or able to assist the youth. The agreement may provide residential, educational or other support services, and financial assistance.
- Interim Order:** Short-term order made by a judge at a presentation hearing concerning the custody or supervision of a child.

Temporary Custody Order:

On the making of this order, custody and guardianship are transferred to the Director for 3 months if the child is under 5 years of age or 6 months if the child is 5-12 years of age, or 12 months if the child is over 12 years of age. If financially capable, the parents must pay maintenance costs.

Continuing Custody Order:

On the making of this order, the Director has sole custody and guardianship of the child; parents' rights and responsibilities are terminated. All continuing custody wards under 12 are considered for adoption.

Supervision Order:

When this order is made, the child remains with a parent or other person under the supervision of the Director for up to six months. Extensions of up to a year are possible. The child is not considered to be in care.

Adoption Act Ward:

A child whose parent voluntarily surrenders the child to the Director of Adoption for the purposes of adoption. The Director of Adoption becomes the child's sole guardian.

Family Relations Act Ward:

A child who is orphaned and has no legal guardian, by the operation of law, becomes a ward of the Director.

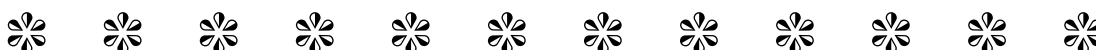

Glossary of Terms

- Child:** A person under 18 years of age. Care and custody may be extended to age 19 by the Director of Family and Children's Services.
- Child in Care:** A child in the care of the Director of Family and Children's Services under the following legal statuses: Custody Agreement (Temporary Care and Custody Agreement), Apprehension (includes court adjournments), Temporary Ward (Order for Temporary Care and Custody), Permanent Ward (Order for Permanent Care and Custody) and Agreement for Voluntary Relinquishment [i.e. for adoption] and Other (children from outside the territory being supervised in Yukon).
- Agreement for Temporary Care and Custody of a Child:** Voluntary agreement between a parent or guardian and the Director placing the child under the Director's temporary care and custody. An agreement may last for up to one year with provision for renewal for an additional year.
- Supervision Order:** The child is returned to the parent or person entitled to care or custody of the child with the Director of Family and Children's Services supervising the care of the child during the term of the order. The order may also include conditions regarding the conduct of the person(s) caring for the child. The child is not considered to be in care.
- Order for Temporary Care and Custody:** Temporarily transfers responsibility for the child to the Director for a specific term as determined by a judge. The court will issue such an order when it feels that the child's parent or custodian will be able to resume competent care of the child on expiry of the order.
- Order for Permanent Care and Custody:** Transfers the parents' rights and responsibilities for care and custody of the child to the Director.
- Agreement for Voluntary Relinquishment:** A child's parents voluntarily relinquish a child to the Director of Family and Children's Services for the purposes of adoption.

Glossary of Terms

Effective October 30, 1998 the *Child and Family Services Act* replaced the *Child Welfare Act*. Terminology has been included for both Acts.

Child and Family Services Act (Effective after October 30, 1998)

- Child:** A person under 16 years of age. A child who is in the permanent care of the Director may have guardianship extended to age 19.
- Child in Care:** A child who has been apprehended or is the subject of Plan of Care Agreement, Voluntary Care Agreement, Supervision Order, Temporary Custody Order, Permanent Custody Order (including extensions to age 19 and voluntary relinquishment for adoption).
- Plan of Care Agreement:** The Director assumes custody, but not guardianship, of a child for up to one year. The maximum term, including extensions, is two years. These children are considered to be at risk as defined in the *Child and Family Services Act*.
- Voluntary Care Agreement:** Voluntary Care Agreements include Voluntary Support Agreements (VSA) and the Support Service Agreements (SSA). The VSA provides support services to children from 0 up to age 16. The SSA provides support services for youth 16 up to 19 years of age. Children under VSA's are not at risk as defined in the *Child and Family Services Act*. The child's parent(s) retain custody and guardianship. The initial term is six months, with provision for additional six (6) month renewals. For youth 16-19 years old, their agreement to the proposed plan is required.
- Supervision Order:** Child stays at home, under the supervision of the Director. The parents retain custody and guardianship. The initial term is for up to one year, with provision for renewal for one additional year.
- Temporary Custody Order:** Custody and guardianship are temporarily transferred to the Director (temporary care). The initial order may be for up to one year; with extensions, the total term may not exceed 24 consecutive months.

Permanent Guardianship Order: Custody and guardianship of a child are permanently transferred to the Director. The initial order may be extended to age 19 if the child is still in school or handicapped.

Voluntary Relinquishment of a Child: Parent voluntarily relinquishes the child to the Director. The child is in the care of the Director but not apprehended. The matter is brought to court to obtain a permanent order.

Child Welfare Act
(Effective before October 30, 1998)

Child: A person under 18 years of age. A child who is in the permanent care of the Superintendent may have guardianship extended to age 19.

Child in Care: A child who has been apprehended or is the subject of Custody by Agreement, Voluntary Care Agreement, Supervision Order, Temporary Custody Order, Permanent Guardianship Order (including extensions to age 19 and voluntary relinquishment for adoption).

Custody by Agreement: The Superintendent assumes custody, but not guardianship, of a child for up to one year. The maximum term, including extensions, should be two years. However, special needs children may have the agreement extended indefinitely to age 18.

Voluntary Care Agreement: Provides services to 16 and 17 year olds living away from parent, who require financial and support services. These children are not at risk as defined in the *Child Welfare Act*. The child's parents retain custody and guardianship. The initial term is six months, with provision for additional six month renewals. The maximum term is two years.

Supervision Order: Child stays at home, under the supervision of the Superintendent. The parents retain custody and guardianship. The initial term is one year, with provision for renewal for one additional year.

Temporary Custody Order: Custody and guardianship are temporarily transferred to the Superintendent (temporary ward). The initial order may be for up to one year; with extensions, the total term may not exceed 36 consecutive months.

Permanent Guardianship Order: Custody and guardianship of a child are permanently transferred to the Superintendent (permanent ward). Permanent guardianship may be extended to age 19 if the child is still in school or handicapped.

Voluntary Relinquishment of a Child: Parent voluntarily relinquishes the child to the Superintendent. The child is in fact apprehended and the matter is brought to court to obtain a Permanent Guardianship Order.
