A Love that Kills is a powerful documentary that tells the story of Monica, a nineteen-year-old woman who was murdered by her former boyfriend. Monica's mother speaks passionately throughout the video telling viewers about her daughter's life and tragic death. The video helps to identify the warning signs of partner abuse, especially in young people, and the damage it causes emotionally and physically. It will help generate discussion and action and is appropriate for use in Health, Guidance, Family Law or Social Studies classes.

This video provides a detailed explanation of community services available to Kelsey, a deaf/hearing impaired woman, who is seeking safety from family violence. This video addresses violence in lesbian relationships as well as violence against women with disabilities. The video provides a dramatization of an abusive relationship between two women with hearing impairments and then details the possible steps that could follow, including contacting the police, finding a shelter, and beginning to regain a sense of self and security.

Saputjinik is a video account of an Inuit family's attempt to end the cycle of domestic abuse and child maltreatment. Actors lead us through the model of the Family Group Decision Making Experience, as implemented, in a small northern community. The family draws upon traditional strengths of Inuit culture. This video highlights some of the problems and emotions encountered by both the family and organizations involved in the process. *Saputjinik* is an Inuktitut word that, translated loosely, means 'healing each other'.

- **Seen... But Not Heard: A Docu-Drama About the Serious Emotional and Physical Effects on Children Who Witness Their Mothers Being Abused**


The film focuses on the emotional problems and psychological damage inflicted on children who have to deal with fear, anger, constant disappointment and inappropriate responsibilities. It also shows what it is like to go to a shelter. The film includes explanations of the children's behaviour from health professional, Dr. Peter Jaffe, and comments from victims and an abuser. The film describes the kinds of behaviour children in these situations display that teachers or school counsellors should be aware of, stressing the need for witnesses and victims to seek counselling.

- **Themes of Defense**


Nine dramatic vignettes that illustrate how abusive men rationalize or deny their violent behaviour. The video deals with the repeated themes of those rationalizations: the relationship blamer, the evader and minimizer, the great communicator, the depressed and compliant, the denier, the alcohol blamer, the guilty, the born-again and the super-cooperative. Each scene is followed by a discussion with Dale Trimble, a therapist who has worked with abusive men for over fifteen years, and who developed the concept for this program. The video and accompanying materials will teach professionals in the field how to respond to each of these themes in a way that increases the man's responsibility for his behaviour. The program also describes the dangers of working with these men and stresses the importance of keeping women and children safe. The video and training materials constitute a two to three hour workshop.

The next day a court order is delivered—Bill is demanding custody of the children. Linda panics. Should she run or should she stay and fight?

Judges, defense lawyers and prosecutors, police, parole officers, teachers and students of law enforcement, social agencies that help women—these are the intended audiences of this video. This resource addresses the revictimization of women at the hands of the justice and social systems after these women have already been the victims of the crime of domestic violence. The video is a consciousness-raising tool about this systematic discrimination and gender bias. *Unbalanced Scales* helps viewers identify specific policies, procedures, and practices which may appear neutral but which, in actuality, have an adverse impact on women. Finally, it generates suggestions on ways to address this problem.

- **What About Us: A Group Counselling Tool to Help Children Cope with the Experience of Having Witnessed Their Mothers Being Abused**

This video, which is related to *Seen... But Not Heard*, examines the importance of group therapy and counselling for children who have witnessed their mothers being abused. Dramatic scenes of family life in an abusive situation and of group therapy sessions show why the children need to talk about their problems, fears and anger. The film shows the development of inappropriate behaviour, and how counselling can help children cope with and talk about their experiences, learn better methods to deal with anger and fear, and how to plan escapes from future violent situations.

It also encourages victims to tell someone they trust in order to get help.

- **Abuse and Neglect in Long Term Care: Intervention and Prevention**

This video is part of an innovative educational package for intervening and preventing abuse and neglect of residents in long term care facilities (LTC). Actors in the video are actual LTC residents, staff, and volunteers. The video aims to increase awareness about the diverse forms of abuse and neglect and to promote sensitivity to the potential for abuse and neglect to occur in LTC. Married for fifty years, Auguste and Blanche have become the victims of extortion at the hands of their children. The violence escalates a few weeks before Blanche dies. The children take Auguste's money and subject him to physical and mental abuse, his grandchildren blackmail him and the rest of the family are indifferent and refuse to acknowledge his predicament. By chance, Auguste finds the help he needs to deal with his situation. He then helps other victims find the resources they need to end the abuse.

The video follows three "typical" composite cases. Each case models the role of a professional who discovers a case of abuse, recognizes the complex circumstances that influence it, acknowledges her/his inability to address the complexities and then makes a referral to the multi-disciplinary team. We then see the group in action, consulting on the case and making recommendations.

This short drama is about the emotional abuse and neglect of the elderly. Locked in her room day after day, a woman who lives with her son and his family while away her time watching television. Except for an occasional visit from her granddaughter, she is virtually ignored. The daughter-in-law resents having to put aside her career plans to take care of her husband's mother and wants to place her in a nursing home. The granddaughter, upset about growing domestic conflict and the treatment her grandmother is receiving, implores her parents to get professional counselling.
