Introduction

The National Clearinghouse on Family Violence (NCFV) is a resource centre for Canadians seeking information and resources about violence in relationships of kinship, intimacy, dependency or trust. It is operated by Health Canada on behalf of all member departments of the Family Violence Initiative of the Government of Canada.

The 2003 edition of the NCFV Publications Catalogue provides descriptions of more than 100 publications produced through the Family Violence Initiative. The catalogue is divided into five sections (Child Abuse and Neglect, Child Sexual Abuse, Woman Abuse, Abuse of Older Adults, and Family Violence). An alphabetical index of all titles and an order form are provided at the end of the catalogue.

Publications listed in the catalogue include **overview papers** with introductory information on a variety of topics. Examples include *Abuse of Children with Disabilities*, *Adult Survivors of Child Sexual Abuse*, *Financial Abuse of Older Adults*, and *Woman Abuse*.

The catalogue also lists **handbooks** and **manuals** intended for professionals, such as the *Handbook for Health and Social Service Providers and Educators on Children Exposed to Woman Abuse/Family Violence*. Other handbooks and manuals are designed to promote awareness among specific population groups, such as the *Booklet for Service Providers who Work with Immigrant Families - On Issues Relating to Child Discipline, Child Abuse and Child Neglect* and *A Resource Guide on Family Violence Issues for Aboriginal Communities*.

Further, the catalogue includes **reports** and **studies** that contain a wealth of factual information, including graphs, tables and statistics on family violence in Canada. This year's additions include the most recent editions of the Statistics Canada publication *Family Violence in Canada: A Statistical Profile* and the updated Human Resource Development Canada publication *Child Welfare in Canada*.

All publications listed in this catalogue are available to the public, free of charge, in English or French, and selected titles are available in other languages. NCFV publications are also available on line at www.hc-sc.gc.ca/nc-cn.

In addition to this Publications Catalogue, the NCFV publishes a bi-annual newsletter, a video catalogue, and a quarterly conference listing. The NCFV also maintains a comprehensive reference collection of books and journals, which can be accessed through Canadian public libraries.
